
## **Dobcross raises funds for MNDA**

#### FOOTPATH AND FOOTBRIDGE UPDATE

Firstly thank you to the local residents who have let us know of possible funding opportunities. Sadly I was subsequently advised by Oldham's Bridges Section Manager that he could not continue to have any further debate with me about a replacement bridge because of other commitments and priorities. He did however 'open the door slightly' to the possibility of accepting some private funding but that still wouldn't speed up the provision of the bridge.

Given this situation it would appear that we will have to go it alone and I started exploring what I called 'A Community Funded Interim Bridge', the idea being to raise funds locally for a minimum standard bridge that could be installed as soon as possible and then when Oldham have their funds in three years' time, or longer, they can decide to keep the bridge (it will have a 25 year life) or install their own. The proposed bridge would look like the one across the River Tame at Gatehead (behind Fresca) but be 2 metres longer.

Planning permission would be required and also a permit from the Environment Agency but more importantly Oldham would have to agree, as would the Newbank Directors as access over their land is required. However, as explained below the structural integrity of one of the existing abutments is in doubt and I believe that it is now unrealistic for the local community to follow up the option of an interim bridge. DVC has agreed with this assessment, which means that Oldham will have the task of sorting out all the issues, and seeking

the necessary approvals and funding in three years' time!

The structural issues came to light following a meeting I had with the preferred bridge supplier on site in August. We found that the abutments were covered with soil and weeds, so armed with a spade and wellies I went back in the evening to clear them off and



to view them from the river. The one on the SE side (garden centre) looks fine but the one on the NW side has 'octopus-like' tree roots growing under it and has been slightly undermined. This could be the reason the bridge was closed in 2015 and although the abutment isn't showing any signs of movement I suspect that significant additional works will be required to strengthen it and to protect the river bank from further erosion. This would result in a project costing £20,000 just for the bridge and in addition, several thousand pounds more for the remedial works.

The next best option is to put **stepping stones** in as a temporary measure to open up the footpath route, at least for able bodied walkers, until Oldham have the resources and budget to put in a permanent bridge. The cost of stepping stones at about £6,000 is significantly less than a bridge and

has much less risk. There are stepping stones just downstream near Limekiln and also in Uppermill. This option will still require various approvals but DVC has agreed that I follow it up, but with the proviso that a bridge is still the desired objective.



The two most important initial requirements are that Oldham agrees to maintain the stepping stones and access paths, and that Newbank Directors agree to this temporary route on their land. A formal submission has been made to Oldham and we await their response.

As an interesting footnote, Oldham's Bridges Section has recently arranged the reconstruction of a small bridge over the Wall Hill Brook, on Brook Lane near Brook Cottage, Tame Water.

## **Nature Notes**

There have been very few butterflies about this year. The cold,

wet spring meant few tortoiseshells or peacocks survived their winter hibernation to lay eggs for the second generation, and the only species which seems to have been successful locally was the ringlet.



This meant there were few caterpillars around in May and June for young birds to feed on. Young bluetits in particular always suffer when there is a shortage of caterpillars, and very few from the first brood survived. There can be nine or more chicks in a brood so the parents don't usually lay a second time, but this year there have been one or two more successful later broods.

We notice moths less than butterflies as so many species are nocturnal, but anyone who has been out driving late on a warm summer evening will have noticed that they see very few moths in the headlights these days. However, I did find four large caterpillars feeding on the leaves of a plum tree in August, which I was told



were probably from an Eyed Hawk-moth.

On the plus side, there is a large species of dragonfly called the southern hawker which has been spreading northwards due to



climate change and I have seen several around Dobcross this summer. They have green, blue and yellow markings on their bodies, and unlike most dragonflies they can be seen away from water. As the name 'hawker' suggests, they feed on

smaller insects which they chase and eat on the wing


