I attended another firefighter funeral recently.

It took dozens of people hours of time to get everything prepared. The room had to be set up. An order of service had to be prepared. Words of reflection were written and rehearsed.

The uniform, helmet, and gear of the deceased had to be gathered and displayed. A shadow box was created showing items from years of service.

Honor Guard, family, and friends spent hours on the road to travel to the venue. A procession was coordinated. Lunch was served.

Here was the thought that was prominent on my mind...

We will be there when you die. Let us be there to help you live!

What if all the time and effort that had been used for the firefighter's funeral had been used to help keep that firefighter alive? What if hours had been spent talking with the firefighter? What if the travel that was done was getting the firefighter to a place of help?

Why do we spend more time planning funerals than planning retirement parties?

Because firefighters don't reach out for help.

But that needs to change!

We refer to the brotherhood and sisterhood of the fire service. Indeed we are our brothers' and sisters' keepers. But what does that mean? I believe two answers are found in Ecclesiastes 4:9-10.

"Two people are better off than one, for they can help each other succeed. If one person falls, the other can reach out and help. But someone who falls alone is in real trouble."

If one person falls, the other can reach out for help.

Picture someone walking along, then stumbling. What is necessary for you to be able to reach out and help them? You must be near to them, close enough to catch them before they fall.

But there's a second part to this. The Bible says, "But someone who falls alone is in real trouble."

Even considering the closeness of the brotherhood, some of you are choosing to be alone. The Bible says you in real trouble. Real trouble because you have isolated yourself; real trouble because the hands that could reach out to help you simply aren't close enough.

Have you ever considered that the whole emergency system is based on someone picking up the phone and calling 911? What if they didn't call? We have trained personnel, modern equipment, and the latest technology ready to assist if only they would call.

Don't you see it's the same for you? You need to let us know you need help.

And make no mistake, it will be the toughest call you'll ever make. But help is on the other side.

You need to know that you are not the only person who struggles; struggles with depression, struggles with anger, struggles with relationships, struggles with substances – struggles with thoughts of taking your own life.

Just like the 911 system, we have trained personnel, modern equipment, and the latest technology ready to assist you if only you would call.

We do all this because you are worth it; you have value. How much value? Well, the value of anything is based upon what someone is willing to give in exchange for it. Perhaps you've held an antique in your hands wondering what it's worth. You could take it to a dealer and get it appraised, but in reality, it's worth is only fully recognized when someone actually purchases it.

So what's your value? What are you worth?

To me?

To God?

If the value of anything is based upon what someone is willing to give in exchange for it, then try to calculate your worth based on what Jesus exchanged for you. Consider how great your value is knowing Jesus was willing to die for you.

1 Peter 1:18-19

For you know that it was not with perishable things such as silver or gold that you were redeemed from the empty way of life, but with the precious blood of Christ.

Romans 5:8

But God showed his great love for us by sending Christ to die for us while we were still sinners.

Life is hard. Hard because of the struggles you experience. Hard because of the trials you face.

But life is also good. Good because of those you have walking alongside of you. Good because God loves you and sees you as one who has incredible worth.

We will be there when you die. Let us be there to help you live!

I'd like to think that the biggest thing my dad did was raise three good kids; kids who would grow up to make a difference in their own individual way. I'd also like to think that the biggest thing that I will do is invest in each of you.

What impact will you make on the world? What difference will you make? What legacy will you one day leave behind?

Mom and I have attempted to set you up for success. We've tried to give you a solid foundation from which you can leap forward into your futures. I subscribe to Frank Reagan's philosophy that, "Life is a series of adventures launched from a secure base."

The most significant part of this foundation is the aspect of faith. In fact, after all is said and done, one verse sums it all up for me. It's found in 3 John 4. "I have no greater joy than to hear that my children are walking in the truth."

I will continue to grow in my faith so I can lead you to grow in yours. I will continue to challenge and encourage you to seek God's plan for your life. I will celebrate success with you and stand by you through defeat.

Because after all, you are my legacy.
