

Compassion Fatigue

You might not think of it this way, but there is a price we pay because we care about the people around us. And while we show concern for all those we serve, there are times we are impacted more deeply.

Compassion fatigue is the weight we may feel due to situations we respond to

every day. While not every call has an emotional impact on us, compassion fatigue can be more prevalent when we have a strong connection to trauma survivor. This can be the case when we see someone we know in the eyes of our patient or when we have been in situations like the call we are on.

While the fact that we hurt because we care is a reminder that we are very human, compassion fatigue is something we must pay close attention to. It is a form of stress that we must learn to manage and not allow to pile up on us.
