The second South Willamette Valley Honor Flight of the year occurred from September 26 through September 30. Several current and past members of Cascade and Beaver State Corvette Clubs participated, including Larry Thomas, Stan Czerniak, David Kuntz and Roger Maurer. If I missed anyone I apologize. Trip started in Eugene with a send off ceremony and an escort out of town that included motorcycles leading the way and Corvettes bringing up the rear. There were at least a dozen Corvettes involved.

A total of 60 veterans were honored with a flight to Washington DC to visit memorials and museums honoring veterans. Every veteran was accompanied by a guardian. Those numbers along with several volunteer organizers and staff members made for a total of 135 participants.

Veterans were flown to Washington DC on Friday by Alaskan Airlines using a plane painted specifically for use on Honor Flights. Touring on sites began early Saturday morning with a trip to Arlington National Cemetery for the changing of the Guard. Next was a trip the National Mall to visit the World War II, Lincoln, Washington, Korean and Vietnam Memorials. Later in the day were a visit to the Navy Memorial and Museum, A dinner banquet was provided that evening by the Loudon Elks Lodge. At the dinner, the veterans received mail call and each were awarded with an American flag that had flown over the Capitol.


Sunday included visits to the Smithsonian Air and Space Museum, the Airforce Museum, the Marines Museum and the Army Museum. Following that was the trip home.



Valentine's Day Dinner


Once arrangements (date, time & location) have been determined we will notify the entire club. Tentatively looking at Feb. 13 (Feb. 14 is the club meeting night).

It's November and for many of us, time to put the Corvette to bed for the Winter soon. Because I don't have any other technical things to write about this month, I'll talk a little about some things you might like to do to store your Corvette.

Some of these are proven effective and some are up for discussion. You decide what works for you, these have worked for me.

Engine Oil - two schools of thought on this one. Do an oil & filter change just before storage so the engine does not have acids & contaminants in the oil all winter. Or wait until the car comes out of storage in the spring to start with fresh oil. Later generations of Corvettes will see a decline in oil life percentage over time even if you are not driving the car.

Tires - I usually pump up the pressure to 35-36 pounds and check this monthly. Some people like to park the car on carpet squares or tire cradles. Our winter temperatures are (generally) mild enough we don't need to worry about flat-spotting.

Fuel - some say fill the tank to the top, other say 1/4 tank. Some use Sta-Bil, some like to use non-ethanol in the tank.

Battery Tenders - YES !!

Mice - dryer sheets in the engine compartment, in the exhaust tips and under the car. Change them monthly, they're cheaper than re-wiring your car! And mouse traps at any entry points into your garage and near each tire. Kill the little ******s!!


