#### **VETTE GAZETTE**

Fellow Cascade Corvette Club members Jeff & Susan Homolka have been on a long-planned, extended trip to Australia and New Zealand. Their adventure began before the current crisis hit our shores. As news of the pandemic swept the world, their dream tour began to turn into a nightmare. First came the news that New Zealand was closing it's borders to all travel. Soon, word came that visitors needed to leave Australia immediately. Thus began a turbulent time of airline bookings and cancellations, set-backs and whirlwind scrambling to get out of country and on the way home.

Jeff & Susan are now in "self-quarantine" for 14 days, safe in their own home!

We aren't exactly sure, due to the time changes and date changes, but we think it took us about 48 hours of travel to get home from Melbourne, Australia.

We return home with a profound sense of gratitude, awe and happiness. It felt like we were trying to out-run a tsunami and indeed we were. Doors were slamming closed in front of us and behind us the entire way.

As soon as things started to unravel, we began making plans to return. Just to be sure, we had two extra flights booked as backups. All of those through Fiji Air (1) and Qantas (2) were cancelled on us. In desperation we searched for alternative flights. Found 2 through Singapore air, but as soon as we made those, we got a notice that they had just been cancelled. Made a reservation on Air New Zealand. It was cancelled.

Found one on Emirates for 4 x the cost they usually charge. It stuck. Our 7th try was a winner. I am pretty sure they felt guilty about jacking up their price at the last minute, because they upgraded us to business class on the first flight and to first class on the second flight. That part was VERY nice.

The day we left Tasmania to go back to Melbourne so we could catch our flight, their governor-type person announced that there would be no more travel allowed for foreigners after midnight and that their borders would be closed for 6 months. We must have been on one of the last flights out.

Oddly our Emirates flight was booked with a fuel stop in Singapore. Just one hour though and we were off to Dubai, where we had to change planes with a 5 hour layover. I have been to the Dubai airport before and was not worried because they have miles of seating upstairs and down. However, they closed off ALL the upstairs seating and all of the airplane lounges, so everyone was crowded into the limited spacing downstairs. There were not enough chairs for all the people and many of us resorted to sitting on the ground to find some distance from others.

Then it got worse. We got a notice that our flight from San Francisco to Seattle was cancelled. So I made a reservation and checked into one headed for Portland. The only flight to Eugene from there left about the same time we would land, so I booked a car rental instead.

Due to new regulations from the USA, folks in Dubai were scrambling to figure out how to meet them before boarding us onto our 16 hour flight to San Francisco. They needed a large radius of space to individually thermal scan each of us. Instead of doing it at the logical point after each person present their boarding pass, they decided to clear our waiting area, set up the scanner there and crowd us into a 20 by 40 foot space in the hall. This was for one of those huge airbus A380, 600 passenger planes, which was full.

Panic set in. We were packed as tight as a mosh pit, no way to maintain space, aged and babies crowded up against two or three other people everywhere. We tried our best to comfort each other, but it was hard. One father with a baby and toddler looked like he was ready to cry. When masses of 20 somethings crowded to get in front, I finally yelled out, "please let the babies go first!". A few others yelled out "yes! And the elders too!". It helped for a while but not long. Finally we made it on board, wiped off every surface we could reach and relaxed. While reading the news updates on that flight we learned that Singapore was no longer allowing passenger transits. We must have been one of the last flights allowed through there.

Our plane had been delayed from leaving Dubai, which meant we probably would miss our flight to Portland due to the need to get our bags, go through border control, customs and back through security. Indeed we got off the plane in San Fran at the exact time they started boarding for Portland. They probably wouldn't wait because it was on a separate reservation and they had no idea we had just flown in from another country.

Luckily, there were few people to go through border control and customs. We hit security with 8 minutes before take off. You know when the door to a plane is closed they can't reopen it. San Fran is big and we started running. We heard our names on the overhead, "last call and 1 minute before the doors closed". We ran harder. With me waving my lap top over my head and shouting "we're here! we're here!". Wheezing and panting, we made it! There were 7 people on the plane, 3 others back from New Zealand, 2 others from the states and us trying to get home. Everyone had a story to share.


When we got to Portland I saw a message on my phone that no one who had traveled out of the state in the past 14 days could rent a car in Portland. I suggested we just check the gate for Eugene because it was leaving 15 minutes late and was close by. They said we could get on if we had a boarding pass, which we did not have. I could not buy one for that flight because it was too late to purchase. But I bought one for 2 days later and they used that to change us onto the flight. This time they held the doors open because they knew we were at the gate trying to get on. There were 4 people on this flight, each with a story to tell.

Just as I turned my cell to airplane mode I noticed a message that Emirates was no longer flying passenger flights. We must have been on one of their last flights.

When we arrived in Eugene there was a taxi so we grabbed it, but told him we would load our bags for his own protection. On the way to our place he said there were just a couple of them driving still, but that their boss said as long as someone needed them, he wanted to have folks available to drive. We were grateful and Jeff tipped him very well.

Our kitty was delivered outside our door shortly thereafter for a no-contact hand off (Thanks Parker, Krystyne and Aaron). We desperately needed the pet love.

We are amazed that we made it. This was an act of God as well as all the other gods and goddesses in the universe and we thank them all. Its crazy here, but there's no place like home.



At the time I am writing this newsletter (3/24/20), we don't know when we will be able to resume our lives as we knew before COVID-19. The decision has been made to cancel all April club meetings and the Valley River Center car show is up in the air. I expect to add current news about the show before you receive this newsletter.

Congratulations (again) to Don & Charlene on the purchase of a beautiful 2016 Long Beach Red ZO6 coupe.




