What Insurance Should I Have?

Please make sure that the insurance you obtain as a resident is for contents only. We have come across 2 residents who have been paying insurance as if they owned the home. This unfortunately cost them thousands in unnecessary insurance costs. We understand typical contents insurance costs \$100 to \$150 yearly. If you are paying much more than this, consider calling your insurance agent to make sure they understand what insurance you require. The agent can call the office if more information is needed.

The Census is Coming

The U.S. Constitution mandates that a census be performed every 10 years. The first census was performed in 1790. The census not only determines the number of seats each state has in the House of Representatives but is used to determine such things as the allocation of certain funding and services.

According to the website pa.gov/census, every household will have received their invitation to participate in the census. This year responses can be made by mail, phone or on-line. The staff is trying to coordinate a presentation from a Census representative to provide further information.

Landscaping Changes

Penn Outdoor Services will be performing a significant amount of the required landscaping work this year.



The work will include spring cleaning, weeding and edging of mulch beds, placement of new mulch, application of spring and fall lawn fertilizer and weed control, shrub pruning according to the season, tree trimming and fall leaf cleanup. Penn will also continue in the cutting of grass. We believe outsourcing this work to Penn is more cost effective, will be completed in a timelier manner and will provide professional consistency in the care of our landscaping. The landscaping staff that remains will focus on matters related to aesthetics such as flower planting, decorating and other projects to enhance the beauty of our community as well as maintaining other exterior amenities on our grounds.

Penn will begin their initial work starting in March. Mulching is expected to commence in early April. The staff will do its best to communicate the upcoming work activities to be completed by Penn. Work orders can still be made by contacting the office. Please also direct any concerns or issues with any work activities being performed by Penn, to the office. This will be a learning experience and the feedback is important. The staff appreciates the residents' patience during this transition and are excited about the opportunities this will ideally provide to focus on site appearance issues.




The Bookmobile is here the 2nd & 4th Monday at 10 AM in the SRC parking lot.

Visiting the Amazing Ringing Rocks Park near Pottstown, PA

While there are many boulder fields scattered throughout Pennsylvania, there are very few that possess a very specific property: they ring when they are hit with a hammer. In fact, these fields are quite rare with only a handful known in the entire world. However, in Montgomery County, PA, you'll find Ringing Rocks Park.

Ringing Rocks Park is located in Lower Pottsgrove Township. This is one of three publically-accessible ringing rock fields in Pennsylvania. Not only are these fields incredibly beautiful, but they do indeed ring when you hit them with a hammer (Make sure you bring a hammer with you from home when you visit the park). The park not only features this great ringing rocks field, but also a baseball field, picnic pavilions and even a rollerskating rink.

The ringing rock field was figured discovered in the 1740s, making it the oldest documented of the three fields in Pennsylvania. For the next 150 years, it was somewhat of an attraction for locals, though it wasn't widely known.

In the 1890s, a group of local businessman created the Ringing Rocks Electric Railway Co. and started to build a small trolley park around the field. Over time, the park grew and both rides and an observation tower were added to the site.

In the 1950s, the park was purchased by the local fire department. They shut down the amusement park, but the area remained a popular spot for locals to visit.

The field here is only about 100 feet from the parking area, and the rocks on the edge of the field generally ring pretty well, meaning that almost anyone can visit the field and those that can't leave the car could see and hear someone hitting the rocks from the parking area.

Of course, while you don't have to go into the rock field to find ringing rocks, carefully walking through the rock field and banging on a variety of rocks is a ton of fun. As you move through the field, you may find a few duds, but overall, the rocks here ring really nicely, and it's fun to hit different rocks to hear different sounds.

If you happen to be having trouble finding rocks that ring, look for spots that have obvious damage from being hit by hammers. These spots are especially easy to find near the edge of the field.



If you are wondering why the rocks ring at the park, no one is quite sure. While significant testing has never been done, it has been shown that rocks removed from the field no longer produce an audible ringing noise. Because of that, it's thought that the sound is caused by a combination of the makeup of the rocks and the resonance of those rocks against the others around them.
