




What Guides Us: Our Mission & Vision

We are excited about the future as we continue to move forward!


MISSION

5 Summer Safety Tips

Hot summer days can be enjoyable, but they also come with risks. Here are five practical tips to help you stay safe, cool, and healthy this season:



1. Stay Hydrated

Drink water regularly throughout the day, even if you're not thirsty. Avoid too much caffeine or alcohol, which can dehydrate you.



2. Dress for the Heat

Wear light-colored, loose-fitting clothes and a wide-brimmed hat when outdoors. It helps your body stay cool.



3. Plan Around the Heat

Try to do errands or take walks early in the morning or in the evening. Midday sun is the strongest from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m.



4. Keep Cool Indoors

Use fans or air conditioning. Close curtains during the day to block heat and open windows in the evening if it cools down.



5. Watch for Warning Signs

Signs of heat exhaustion include dizziness, nausea, and heavy sweating. If you feel unwell, ask for help right away.



Air Conditioner Tips & Reminders

If your air conditioner isn't working properly, please let the office know right away.

Reporting problems early can help avoid uncomfortable days when the weather gets hot.



Avoid turning your air conditioner on and off throughout the day. It works best when it runs steadily. If you wait until your home is already hot, the unit may struggle to catch up.

Stay cool and let us know if you need assistance – we're here to help!

- The U.S. flag has been changed 27 times! The current 50-star version has been in use since 1960, after Hawaii became the 50th state.


Resident Joke Submissions Wanted!






