CELEBRATING OUR FAITH – APRIL 10, 2022

PALM SUNDAY OF THE PASSION OF THE LORD APRIL 10, 2022



On **Palm Sunday**, we usher in Holy Week with palm branches in hand, remembering the triumphant entry of our Lord into Jerusalem, and the beginning of the week that leads us to the commemoration of the Passion, Death and Resurrection of our Lord – the Paschal Triduum.

On that first Palm Sunday, "A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road." In ancient times, palm branches symbolized goodness and victory. It was common

practice in the ancient world to welcome home a king or war hero by laying out a path of branches for him to ride or walk over. With this same purpose, palm was used by the people of Jerusalem to honor Jesus, their King, as he arrived in victory and triumph, but most did not understand what kind of king Jesus would be. Again, at the end of the Bible, people from every nation raise palm branches to honor Jesus (Revelation 7:9).

In Jesus' time, military rulers usually road into the cities on horses. Jesus came on a donkey. The donkey was a symbol of peace, and those who rode upon them proclaimed peaceful intentions. This was a sign that he was a leader who would triumph with love and compassion, and not with military might. His was a kingdom that would grow in the hearts of people who put their faith and trust in God.

Even as the coatless multitudes waved the palm branches and shouted for joy, they missed the true reason for Jesus' presence. They could neither see nor understand the cross.

CHRISM MASS – TUESDAY, APRIL 12TH, AT 12:00 NOON



Archbishop Dunn invites you to join him and priests of the Archdiocese for the annual Chrism Mass on Tuesday, April 12th, at 12:00 noon at Saint Mary's Cathedral Basilica. This special Mass will also be livestreamed (<u>www.halifaxyarmouth.org</u>).

The Chrism Mass is held during Holy Week in every Catholic diocese. During this Mass, the priests, deacons and representatives of the entire diocesan community gather around their Bishop, who blesses the Holy Oils for use in the

coming year. These are the Oil of the Sick, Oil of Catechumens, and the Sacred Chrism. Whenever the Holy Oils are used in a diocese, the ministry of the Bishop who consecrated them is symbolically present.


The Chrism Mass reminds us of our oneness in Christ through Baptism and its holy anointing, made possible by the ministry of the Bishop and his priests. The Chrism Mass is also a key moment in which the unity of the Bishop with his priests (together, they form the presbyterate) is manifested and renewed. During the liturgy, the entire assembly is called to renew its baptismal promises; deacons and priests also renew their vow of obedience to the local Bishop and their commitment to serve God's people. At the end of the Chrism Mass, the Holy Oils are brought back to parishes of the diocese for use in the coming year.

The Good Friday Collection on April 15th is requested by the Holy See to help maintain the Christian sites of the Holy Land and to support the Church in the pastoral, educational, and social works that contribute to a sustained Christian presence in the land where Jesus Christ walked. DIVINE MERCY NOVENA AND CHAPLET



Between 1930 and 1938 Christ appeared to Sister Faustina, a Sister of Mercy in Poland, who initiated the Divine Mercy devotion. On Good Friday, 1937, Jesus requested that Blessed Faustina make a special **Novena** before the Feast of Mercy, **from Good Friday through the following Saturday**. He gave her a chaplet to be recited and said that it was appropriate to pray the chaplet at three o'clock each afternoon (the Hour of Great Mercy). She was canonized on April 30, 2000, the Sunday after Easter, the Feast of Divine Mercy. For information on how to recite the Chaplet, visit:

POPE APOLOGIZES TO INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES

On April 1, 2022, Pope Francis expressed "sorrow and shame" for the abuse and lack of respect for Indigenous identities, culture and spiritual values in the residential school system. His apology came as a part of his final address to the delegation of Indigenous People that came to meet with him from March 28th to April 1st. He said, "I ask for God's forgiveness, and I want to say to you with all my heart: I am very sorry. And I join my brothers, the Canadian bishops, in asking your pardon."

Members of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops (CCCB) were also part of the delegation. "We are deeply grateful to each of the Indigenous delegates who travelled with us to the Holy See to share their experiences and desires for a brighter future for their people," said CCCB President, the Most Rev. Raymond Poisson. "The Holy Father has heard first-hand the stories of those who suffered at the hands of Catholic Church members, and has responded with compassion, remorse, and a genuine desire for truth, justice, and healing." The Holy Father's apology was informed by private encounters with 32 Indigenous Elders, knowledge keepers, residential school survivors and youth from across Canada. Delegates shared a range of lived experiences including from their time in residential schools, the resulting loss of culture and language, and complex relationships with the Catholic faith that continue to this day. Through shared prayers, the exchange of gifts and the telling of powerful stories, Pope Francis was moved by their courage, their commitment and their resilience in the face of suffering. He emphasized his shame for the Catholic Church's role in the residential school system, and re-committed to visiting with them on Canadian soil.

Residential Schools: We are sorry. We apologize. (Part 3 from the Diocese)

Considering the generally cordial relationships the early missionaries enjoyed, one might ask the reasons for the Catholic Church's involvement in residential schools. In a day and age when missionary work was hard and involved great effort to reach a small number of people, the unfettered access to the minds and lives of children was a tempting proposition. Involvement by "Rival Christian Providers" also served as a strong motivator. Though more and more resources shifted to the schools, missionary outreach to the people "on the land" continued to receive strong sup



outreach to the people "on the land" continued to receive strong support.

As for the government, the various churches that were contracted provided the cheapest labour. The churches had already built a certain amount of trust and respect, each with a particular People. Their involvement made the whole idea more sellable (both to the indigenous and non-indigenous peoples).

We are sorry for the misuse of power that was exercised while the Catholic Church gained unfettered access to the minds and lives of Indigenous Children over successive generations. We apologize for ridiculing indigenous cultural and religious practices, discouraging indigenous languages and belittling indigenous identity, each act an assault on the human person.
