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#### LINDSBORG SWIMMING-SAND PIT TO CEMENT POND

"Come on in, the water's fine", that's music to our ears on a hot summer day. Finding a place to bath or cool down was never an issue in the early days, with the river being so close, but the river in those days wasn't restricted by man-made lakes or irrigation so often flooded or was running too fast.

One of those "natural swimming holes" in the river was under the Union Pacific bridge, there were shallow areas near there, but was over most kids' heads directly under the bridge. Carl Wallerstedt shared a story in his book "The Second Generation" about how the boys would swim naked under the bridge and when a passenger train rolled over they would get out, bare-naked, and wave to the passengers. Since they were kids, most people smiled and waved back.

A little ways past where South Main St. ends, there was a sand pit. It was about fifty feet from the river, but the river water filtered through the sand to fill this pit up. The more sand that companies sucked out, the bigger the filtered pit would get. It was good sand, so local sand companies leased it from property owners, Alfred and Axel Clark. In 1916 when the Meridian Road construction was under way tons of sand came from this pit for the highway. Sometimes the companies faced theft or vandalism, and tried to place bans

on people swimming there, but Lindsborg people had a better idea.

In 1919 talks became serious about Lindsborg getting a swimming pool, M.T. Blomgren proposed a plan to put in a 50'X100' pool just east of his coal office on Lincoln St. He claimed they could use the water waisted at the ice plant to keep it full. Blomgren claimed 3,000 gallons of water was waisted every hour at that plant. In the meantime, the sand pit kept getting sand sucked out, and groups started having picnics and swimming parties. These groups included businessmen, Bethany College students, and in 1920, the Lindsborg Swimming Club.

The Sand Pit also started drawing in people from neighboring towns, it seemed cool, clean water with a sandy beach was appealing and word spread. By July 1921, Marion Norstrom and David Young took charge of adding a diving board and swing rope.

At this time, McPherson was also trying to get support for adding a pool, and out of retaliation placed a column in their newspaper stating Lindsborg swimming pool was closed due to a Typhoid outbreak. A few days later, Lindsborg News-Record responded that the water has been tested and found to be 98% pure, and fit to drink. The pool had never closed.

By the spring of 1922, more than \$500 had been donated to creating "Recreation Park". That contributed to the building of men's and women's dressing rooms, check stand, refreshment stand, the tow-

er for high diving, a spring board, rope swing, and a slippery slide. William Hagstrom laid out the plans and oversaw construction of a new road getting to the sand pit, it was an extension of Riverside Drive. This all resulted by the creation of the "Riverside Recreation Club" in March, a contract was drawn up between the club and Christian and Ehnstedt, for a period of three years at \$225 per year to lease the swimming pit. Alfred Clark, owner of the property, was a member of this club, but the pit was also still leased out to the sand company.

Later that summer, the county health inspector visited the sand pit and stated the water was in excellent condition.

This inspection was requested due to planning the first "Water Carnival", which took place August 13, 1922. It was estimated that over 1,000 people came, from as far as Wichita to wit-



ness the greatest swimming hole in the state. It profited \$212.40 which was needed to offset costs in maintaining the new park and swimming pool.

The sand pit was 300' wide and 500' in length by the time it became Lindsborg's official swimming pool in 1922. Water and sand was still being pumped out, which meant new water was being filtered underground to keep it full and clean. What it had in volunteer support, it lacked in big financial support. In March 1923 a petition was presented for Lindsborg city to buy the 44 acres owned by the Clarks and take over the park with \$10,000.00 in bonds, by the time it came up for a vote the amount had dropped to \$7,500.00, but was overwhelmingly voted down. It was decided the Lindsborg Recreation Club should elect directors to get better organized, William Hagstrom was elected President, Dr. Arvid Pihlblad Vice-President, C. Bergstrom Secretary, and C.M. Norstrom Treasurer.

The Rec. Committee continued on, and raised enough money to build a shallow kiddie beach on the east end, more changing rooms, and an arch at the entrance. Safety was always on their mind, so the Red Cross was asked to provide "Life Saving Classes" to older kids who were good swimmers. What we know as "life guards" were called "life sav-

ers" back then. July 29th, 1923, the 2nd annual water carnival was another success, with many prizes given out to kids in several categories.

1924 was even bigger for the park, organizations, businesses, and Lindsborg citizens were sending in

letters of support, the Mayor provided a proclamation, but still, when it came to vote again to buy the 44 acres (listed for \$6,500.00) and run the park, it once again failed. Despite the city taking over, the pool continued to draw in hundreds of swimmers and picnickers. A manager had been hired, Red Cross continued holding safety classes, and the water carnival was another success. River-

#### RIVERSIDE RECREATION PARK ENDORSEMENTS

At a meeting of Emil Pinkal Post No. 140, American Legion, Monday evening, May 12th, the organization voted to endorse the proposed purchase of the park site to be voted upon at the coming special election. Committee

side Recreation Park changed to Lindsborg Recreation Park during the year as well.

The next swimming pool project came September 1947, when a vote to approve \$61,500.00 in bonds for a cement (pond) swimming pool across from



the Smoky Valley Flour Mills. The Lindsborg Municipal Swimming Pool was much smaller than the sand pit, but also had filtered city water with chlorine added. This pool cooled countless people for the next forty six years.

The '47 pool was in desperate need of major renovation by the early 1990s, 1993 saw a proposal for a complete new water park at the cost of \$750,000.00. The bond passed and plans were drawn up. August 22nd, 1993 the pool closed for the year, work started the next day on the new design. It was hoped to have it completed by May or June '94 for the new season.

Once again, Lindsborg had the best pool in the state! Thor's Revenge, a 153 foot super slide clenched that status. Throughout the late 1990s, Salina newspapers wrote many articles complaining that their residents prefer Lindsborg over their two municipal pools.

This year, 2025 the pool has been going through some renovations, and taking longer than expected. Please be patient, it won't be long until someone says, "Come on in, the water's fine."


