Now that classes are underway in Bethany College's 136th year, A reflection on the founder and his family is surely in order. SVHA President Chris Abercrombie wrote a splendid bio on Dr. Carl Swensson:

The Reverend Doctor Carl Aaron Swensson, founder of Bethany College and its second president, was born in Sugar Grove, Pennsylvania in 1857. In 1879 at 22 he answered the call to be pastor of Bethany Lutheran Church in Linds-

borg, replacing the Reverend Olof Olsson who had lead the group of Swedish settlers to the Smoky Valley in 1869. Olsson had moved to join the faculty of Augustana College Rock Island, Illinois. Within six months of his arrival Swensson proposed the establishment of a Lutheran school in Lindsborg. The congregation enthusiastically endorsed their new pastor's plan. portion of the church's land in the northeast section of Lindsborg was set aside for the new institution. In his book Bethany in Kansas author and historian Dr. Emery Lindquist describes Swensson as "...not only a dreamer but a dynamic man of action".

On October 15, 1881 ten students, all at least 12 years' of age and each paying a tui-



tion fee of \$5.00, gathered in the sacristy of Bethany Lutheran Church for the first classes. The list of enrollees shows that Bethany was a coeducational institution from the beginning. J. A. Udden was hired as the teacher for the Bethany Academy.

Swensson worked tirelessly to promote and fund the new academy. A frame building, now part of the Heritage Square at the Old Mill Museum complex, was purchased and moved to the location of the present-day Presser Hall.

brick building, was constructed in 1883. Lane Hart served as the colbuilding, from dorm rooms to cafeteria to class and practice rooms until the large 5-story Old Main opened in 1886. Old Main was razed in 1968 to make way for the Wallerstadt Learning Center class room and library buildings. Lane Hart, ultimately used as a girls' dorm, was declared a fire danger and razed in the 1980's.

lt's interesting note that Dr. Swensson was so persuasive and charismatic that he was able to get the town's people to move their cemetery from the site he wanted for Old relocating the Main. bodies a mile east in what is now Elmwood Cemetery. To raise badly needed funds for

Lane Hart, a 3-story the new Academy Dr. declared: "A Swede is Swensson and his wife Alma called a reof hearsal Handel's oratorio "Messiah" in December 1881. Even though many of the volunteer singers had trouble with the English words Mrs. Swensson was a patient teacher and had the chorus and orchestra ready for a number of performances in the Smoky Valley during Holy Week of 1882. Thus was born the Bethany College Oratorio Society that has presented Handel's masterpiece every Holy Week but one. That year's rendition was interrupted by the Spanish flu epidemic but made up later in the year keeping the yearly performance record intact.

> Α die-hard Republican, Swensson is quoted as having

the best Europe, an American is the best thing in the United States and a Swedish American Republican is the best thing in the world." --Carl Aaron Swensson to a Republican rally in Moline, Illinois.

The sad news of Dr. Swensson's death. while on a trip to Los Angeles to promote Bethany College, was received on February 14, 1904. He was only 46 years' of age.

* Carl and Alma were married September of 1880 and had two children. Bertha Maria Fredrika, born in 1882 and Annie Hilma Theodora in 1885. Annie "Theo" as she would be called, became a successful and beloved Professor at Bethany as well.


Mrs. Swensson believed in equal rights. She took an emphatic stand for women suffra-

aettes. Also. when Gov. Henry Allen's chauffeur, who was African-American and was told he couldn't stay in Lindsborg, Mrs. Swensson offered him a room in the

Parsonage, he was not allowed to accept it though. Being an impeccable hostess, which was expected of an important pastor's wife, she entertained a variety of people, important and just regular folks and did so with a style she learned in Sweden. Alma lived to be 80 and died of a stroke in 1939. This photo was taken by Life magazine photographer Herbert Gehr just months before her death. Alma Swensson Hall was dedicated May 30th, 1949 as a memorial to this fine lady.


