PLAY BALL...BASEBALL IN THE SMOKY VALLEY

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America's favorite pastime, as baseball has been dubbed since the 1840s, is the one sport that unifies the masses. It served as a relief during the Civil War, both North and South played ball, and all you needed was an open patch of land, a makeshift bat and ball.


The Swedes settling in the Smoky Valley didn't have knowledge of this sport, but they were quick to learn and very competitive. Lindsborg saw it's first organized ball club in 1876 with the Alerts, a team made up of doctors, city officials, and business men. They played local teams like Saline County Bulldozers, Salina Smoky Valley Club, McPherson Nine, Roxbury Resolutes, and Liberty Lone Star Club.

By the 1880s, virtually all towns had at least one club, which they formed clubs, not teams, due to the fact there were no sponsors, no financial backing for gear. The first half of the 1880s showed a massive growth, Lindsborg had four clubs or teams alone. The Dudes, Muffers, Snoozers, and Bethany Academy. Other teams included McPherson Boomers, Assaria Hornets, Marquette Monitors, and Empire Black Legs.

Sweden didn't adopt baseball until early 20th century, but the first Swedish born professional player came in 1885, named Charlie Hallstrom. Charlie, aka "Swedish Wonder", was born in Jönköping 1864. His family came to America and he showed how well Swedes can play. He played one season (1885) with the Providence Grays.

There were two types of games with our local clubs, friendly or match. Friendly games allowed short-handed teams to borrow players from the other team, match games often had a purse, typically \$100 to \$150 to the winner, which was a lot of money in the 1880s. It wasn't unusual to have games scheduled for Thanksgiving and New Years Day as there wasn't a "baseball season". No picnic or cele-

bration during the summer could go without a game or two though. Like this 1887 Marquette celebration with a \$100 purse baseball game. During the early 1900s, towns were getting creative with fundraising, and would

baseball games. Lindsborg adopted "Leans vs Fats" for this purpose. The May 1909 exhibition game was to fund maintenance of the Bethany Athletic Field, and was made up of respected business men. Lemonade, popcorn, and peanuts were on

hand for the enthusiastic crowd. E.M. Weddle served as umpire and the "Fats" won 16-8. More importantly money was raised and the diamond got some upgrades. Lindsborg High School

added baseball around 1899 and played Marquette and Salina HS, and on occasion even Bethany College in those early years. Bethany College baseball was going strong in the early 1900s, but failed to consistently keep the program going over the years. The photo below is the 1910 team. Star players like Art Runbeck, Reginald "Ridge" Runbeck, and Del Lundgren contributed to many enjoyable games through high school, college, and various city teams. "Ridge" later coached at Bethany College and became a Bethany Hall of Famer.



The most famous local baseball player was Del Lundgren, born 1899 in Lindsborg. Like the Runbeck brothers, Del was a star player in every sport offered through Lindsborg High School and Bethany College. Lundgren and the Runbeck brothers played in the same Lindsborg clubs 1919-'22, when

Lundgren turned pro with the Salina Millers. The

Pittsburg Pirates picked him up in 1924, then he was drafted by the Boston Red Socks 1925. Through bad coaching decisions and the "Curse of the Bambino" Lundgren only played three seasons before being traded back down to the minors. In his entire professional career, Del played 56 major-league games and 202 minor-league games.




Bethany College joined the inter-collegiate league in 1908 but struggled to keep baseball going. Competing with track, football spring training, and WWI left baseball "in the dust". It wouldn't be until 1948 when baseball was officially added to Bethany's spring program.

Spring 1919 Lindsborg citizens were called to help get Bethany Athletic Field back in shape for summer baseball, calling for teams, wagons, trucks and a good supply of men. The same method used in building the first road up Coronado Heights. Lindsborg businesses pulled together and formed the Lindsborg Baseball Association that fall, selling season passes to fund equipment for the next year. Many teams switched to Sunday games, which Lindsborg had a city ordinance preventing this kind of Sunday activity. Scheduling the season was a problem, and the association was forced to offer \$1.00 refund to every season pass holder.

The next spring a petition was signed to permit Sunday baseball, there were many signatures, including some opposition. The city council reported they would stand with the majority, but the association found land 1/2 mile east of the college, just outside city limits. So the new Association Baseball Field was built allowing games any day of the week.

July 1966 the Lindsborg diamond got lit up. American Legion/Lindsborg Grain team played Hutchinson Cessna for the first "lighted" game, to a loss of 7-6. \$14,000 in bonds added night baseball, but changed the sport forever.

Today, baseball is played by all ages, boys and girls. From T-Ball to the majors, baseball will always be "America's Favorite Pastime".


