Arvid Nathaniel Wallin had a surprisingly long career at Bethany College, but his legacy went far beyond Lindsborg's boundaries.


Born September 18, 1884 in Bethesda, Iowa to Johan "John" Svensson Wallin and Sofia Nilsdotter Lindberg-Wallin, Arvid was the youngest of seven, though would have been ten without previous infant deaths.


His father, John, came to America from Sweden in 1864 at the age of 21. His mother, Sofia, came to America from Sweden in 1865 and both lived in Geneseo, Illinois. A year later, Dec. 1866, they were married and in 1872 moved to Bethesda, lowa. Arvid's father and older brothers

farmed until 1895, when his parents retired and moved ten miles north to Stanton (now home of the Swedish coffee pot and cup water towers).

Arvid and his brother, Nathan,





While family was visiting Lindsborg for the two brother's 1905 graduation, Arvid's

brother-in-law decided to buy property

and make Lindsborg their home. Carl G.

No matter where Arvid lived, he was active with Lutheran churches, often as their organist. This sometimes called for special performances, like the 1927 organ dedication concert for the new "Two Tower" Salemsborg Church.


with Hugo Kortschak, a renowned violist

with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra.

Another relative of Arvid and Nathan that made quite a name for himself was their cousin, John Edward Wallace Wallin (1876-1969), who had written his first of

many books in 1905 and presented a copy to Arvid. His field was Psychology and sometimes frequented family gatherings.

After completing the courses at the Cosmopolitan

School of Music, Arvid was sought out to come back to Bethany College as a teacher in the piano

department. The fall of 1909, 25 year old Arvid picked up where he left off with the Oratorio Society, Messiah Lutheran Church, and other musical programs as an accompanist. The Thomas Johnson family took him in as a lodger for those first few years.



June 26th, 1912, Arvid and Esther Theodora Ranseen mar-

ried in Chicago, where she was born and raised. The Ranseen name was familiar in Lindsborg though as Esther's sister, Anna or Mrs. Henry G. Johnson had lived there and were visited by family. Coming back to Lindsborg a married couple, Arvid had bought a house on north Main St.

While his piano recitals always drew rave reviews and sold-out performances, Arvid's voice shouldn't be overlooked. In 1914 and 1915 Arvid was a soloist in the Messiah! His tenor voice offered many opportunities both in singing and teach-

ing. January of 1914 the College (male) Glee Club signed a fourteen week tour in the Midwest from the Eastern Chautauqua Bureau, which Arvid became Director. He also sang in and directed the Bethany



Male Chorus and provided tenor to the Song-Cycle Quartet.

Two months after being a soloist at the 1915 Messiah in Lindsborg, Arvid participated in a smaller scale Messiah in Stanton, Iowa held at their church, once again providing tenor as a soloist.

Arvid did have a life outside music, he won a doubles tennis tournament, teamed with Anton Anderson the summer of '15, and he was a member of the Lindsborg Gun and Camera Club, which in-

cluded many Bethany faculty.

By 1917-1918, WWI was taking hold, Arvid registered for service, but most likely due to his profession and age wasn't called to war.

Esther, his wife, got involved by becoming President of Lindsborg's first Red Cross Branch. Farmer's State Bank offered space for six months, then as the war progressed extended the free offering. The Red Cross met upstairs of the bank and immediately set out to make surgical dressings to be shipped out for the troops.

Despite the war, music continued and was a much needed relief. Arvid became Director of Bethany Symphony Orchestra. August 5th,1918 gifted the Wallin's with their first daughter, Jean. She grew up to be an English teacher and church choir director.

In 1920, Arvid accepted a position at the Horner Institute of Music located in Kansas City, where, he taught piano for the next three years. During this time Arvid became organist for the First Lutheran Church in KC, but still visited Lindsborg frequently.

The summer of 1923 Arvid and family moved back to Lindsborg and he immediately was hired back as a Professor of Piano. The family moved to 747 N. Second St., the house he would spend the rest of his life.


July 4th, 1926 gifted Arvid and Esther with their second daughter, Ruth. She would grow up to be a music teacher and wife to Bethany trumpet player, Roger Thorstenberg.


Arvid remained very active with the Messiah Lutheran Church as organist and in 1934 initiated a Christmas Candlelight Service which became a tradition.


Arvid held the position of assistant director of the Bethany Oratorio Society Chorus under Brase for many years, so when Hagbard Brase chose to retire after the 1946 Messiah, Arvid was the natural to take over as conductor. The 1947 Messiah was a success, but illness was getting the better of Arvid during the 1948 performances. During the Palm Sunday performance, Arvid became ill and fortunately Brase was

sitting in the audience and left his seat to quickly take over. Arvid came back a few times, but ultimately had to leave most of the second half to Brase.

September 7th, 1948, Arvid Wallin passed away in his home. While his time as Conductor was cut short, his legacy remains long and wide-spread. Volume 10, Issue 4
