When Thomas and Isabella Abercrombie immigrated to the United States from Scotland in 1848, little did they know their children, grand children, and great-grand children would contribute so much to a Swedish community forming north-west of their farm.

Alloch Almeron, or A. A. Abercrombie, was born March of 1868 in Spencerport, NY. As an infant, the family made their way westward and by 1877 bought a farm north of Galva, KS, in the eastern part of McPherson County. A.A. found he loved learning books, and completed all required courses at home and the local public school.


In 1886, while "Old Main" was being constructed at Bethany College, A.A. enrolled in the School of Commerce, completing it in 1888, followed by enrollment in the College of Liberal Arts. It was during a Latin recitation class that he was sum-

mand to President Carl Swensson's office. Dr. Swensson had a keen way of watching students and when a sudden vacancy occurred in the School of Commerce for a teacher, he thought of A.A., who was a "Summa Cum Laude" graduate and possessed the qualities needed. As a teacher, A.A. took advantage of summer breaks and furthered his studies in Illinois, quickly becoming Principle of his School of Commerce. During his nineteen years with Bethany Colultimately lege, taught management accounts; Professor of Commercial Law; Penmanship; Rapid Calculations; Bookkeeping; and Business Practice. Because of his business expertise he was often coaxed to work with Lindsborg businesses and on occasion did briefly. Though teaching didn't pay as well as the commercial world, no material assets were comparable

to spiritual values. A.A. married Ellida Ellison of Marquette, KS. in 1892, and had four children, three girls and one boy. Ellida would become Superintendant of Lindsborg public schools and Old People's Home. **Both** A.A. and C.A. (Chet), father and son, would play a role in Farmer's State Bank of Lindsborg as well. A.A. served as Director of the bank from 1908 until his death, he also organized the Messiah English Lutheran Church and served on the Board of deacons. Alloch also served many years as city council, city clerk, and even assistant Postmaster.

Alloch A. Abercrombie passed away Dec. 10, 1918 of lung fever at the age of 49

years.



#### ABERCROMBIES—131 YEARS OF LINDSBORG GROWTH CON'T.

Chester, or C. A. Abercrombie was simple known as "Chet" to the locals. He was born 1908 in Lindsborg and practically lived his entire life at Farmers State Bank.

At the age of ten Chet got a job at the Lindsbora News-Record for a brief time, at twelve he was hired as a janitor of the bank and within one year became a remittance clerk. He continued his education while working, fulfilling his requirements for graduation and like his father, attended Bethany College.

At the age of eighteen Chet was afflicted with Polio, and missed months eight from work. All this time he kept a cheerful and optimistic attitude, which carried through his life. After miraculous healing he resumed work and school, being promoted to Bookkeeper at the bank in the early 1930s.

Chet climbed the ladder over the years, becoming 2nd assistant cashier in 1934 and being elected to the Board of Directors

1944. He became Cashier and Secretary for the BOD 1946, and a year later Executive VP. It was about this time he also found a wife, Doris Ann, and would bring two boys into the family to add to Doris' older daughter.

April 6th, 1950 bank President Ebba Fornberg passed away, ending a long chapter with the bank. She was most revered for keeping the bank together during the great depression, making it the only surviving bank in Lindsborg. Another President was elected in though, giving Chet an opportunity to continue to prove himself. By 1954 it was decided to secure property on Main St. north of it's current location to build a new, modern bank. The job was tasked to Chet and he made it happen by the next year. The original bank property was sold to the city of Lindsborg and it still holds it's and CVB offices in it today.

August 1957 Chet was elected President, and his wife Doris to

BOD Secretary. Over the years the bank saw huge growth, and by 1979 Chet reached the mandatory retirement age for directors.

In appreciation for Chet's 58 years with the bank, he was honored with the title of Director Emeritus on January 23, 1979. Retirement would not last long though as he passed away April 29th, 1980.

Chet was just as active in the community as well, serving as city treasurer many years and other civic activities.

Two boys grew up in the shadow of their father, Chet Abercrombie, Chris and Jim (Biff). Both grew up in Lindsborg schools, both were Swedish Dancers, and both attended Bethany College. While both also

left Lindsborg for careers, Chris came back and made this historical association one of his passions in life.

Chris Abercrombie served as President of the Smoky Valley Historical Association for many years and because of his background in broadcasting completed many video interviews with Lindsborg's historians and people of interest. He was always fascinated with Coro-Heights nado took the initiative to get it placed on the National Historical Register, and most recently securing a grant from the Kansas Heritage Trust Fund for improvements to Coronado Heights. That phase has been completed, and we are working toward financially supporting phase two, which is drain-



age reconstruction and road repair. Chris Abercrombie passed away this past quarter, as with previous board members and supporters of the Smoky Valley history, he will be missed.

Work continues on! Both Coronado Heights and Höglund Dugout are visited year-round from locals and tourists. 
