SVHA Info

Our founding Swedes came to America under warnings of drought, Indian slaughters, and unsettled Civil War. But when Olof Olsson and the passengers of the

SS Columbia came across the ocean June of 1869 they were

greeted with a rainbow.

After the founding of Lindsborg February 20th, 1869, the United States of America set out to revamp its currency, or paper money. The Civil War had prompted the first "legal tender" notes in 1862, simply called green backs due the color created in the printing process. Green was chosen over black as it represented stability. Printers in the private sector quickly replicated these notes so in 1865 President Lincoln established the Secret Service to battle ongoing counterfeiting.



In 1869 a new series of notes was introduced, adding features to deter counterfeiting. These were labeled rainbow notes due to the fading colors used in the back-

ground, which was quite new technology for that time. All Swedish immigrants coming to the USA exchanged their Riksdaler Riksmynt currency for these rainbow notes. It wasn't until 1873 before Sweden reformed their currency standard and introduced the Krona.



The \$10 note above and \$20 note to the left are examples of the 1869 US "rainbow" currency, which ranged from \$1 to \$1,000 notes.

In case you're wondering, neither of these two notes featured a President. The \$10 has Secretary of State Daniel Webster and the \$20 features Alexander Hamilton, the first Secretary of Treasury under President George Washington, and founding member of the USA.

Funny trivia, the \$10 note has a second name to collectors, the jackass note. Turn it upside down

ZIMMERMAN—AKA THE ZIM

Motorcycle enthusiast, activist, politician, these are just a few words that describe Phil Zimmerman. Phil had five sons with his wife Ethel, Eugene, second to youngest, lived a very short 9 years of life as a result of drowning. Stanley and Vic were born in Marion, KS., the other three, Phil R., Eugene, and Julian were all born in Lindsborg.

Phil E. Zimmerman was born in Missouri April 6th, 1879 and followed his parents to Kansas in his late teens. At the age of 21 he married a (young) Ethel Blanche of Chase, KS. and ran a general store. Phil was a natural salesman, and around 1908 met the Hagstrom Bros., who at the time was building a large factory in Lindsborg. They wanted Phil to be their traveling salesman, so he packed up the family and moved to a house on 2nd street in Lindsborg. Within one year Phil was promoted to Advertising Manager then in another year became General Manager of the factory.

William Hagstrom brought the first motorcycle to Lindsborg in 1902 and had a passion for anything motorized. Phil also became quite an enthusiast and around 1910 help start the Kansas Short Grass Motorcycle Club. Even though it was a Kansas-based club, he was able to set up multi-state rides, mainly out west and promoted them heavily. As a result, the club soon became "the most famous motorcycle club in the world!"

In 1913 Phil got word from Governor Hodges that his proposal to add motorcyclists to the Kansas National Guard had been accepted. The concept was to enlist four companies of twenty-five men each to be sworn in, and their name was to be "Minute Men".

Around 1915 the club started phasing out, but Phil, or "Zim" as he was nicknamed, kept his enthusiasm going by leaving Hagstrom and becoming a traveling representative for Excelsior Motorcycles. When the war (WWI) broke out Zim filled out his card but was considered disabled from an injury during the Spanish-American War, so he started his own war. Zim traveled all over the USA in sales, and saw these organizations forming. He would come back to Kansas and go all over giving speeches and warning business men and farmers of these "Balshevik" groups (Russian Socialist), notably the NPL or Non-Partisan League and IWW or Industrial Works of the World. Zim was quoted in 1913 as saying "Motoring is my passion and the short grass club and Mrs. Zim are the twin shrines at which I worship. Politics, not of the office-seeking variety, is my weakness, and I have penchant for supporting men who cannot be elected." What he didn't know was that he would enter that ring in a manner of speaking later on.

In 1922 Zim was elected Manager/Sec. of the Automobile Trade Association of Kansas, and in 1925 was appointed Kansas Hotel Commissioner, which is when he moved to Topeka. Zim remained in Topeka through to his death, and while there was active in many causes. He was a strong supporter of veterans' organizations, founded the National Society of Long Fellows, was an organizer for the National Republican League, and created many horticultural projects like distributing flower seed packets throughout the world. Phil "Zim" Zimmerman passed away Dec. 8th,

1965 from a long illness. One of his sons, Vic, became an illustrator after attending Lindsborg schools and Bethany College. Even the President of the USA gave a nod to his talent. Here is one that is close to home, from 1924.


