Now it's time to apply mortar or adhesive to the back of each piece of stone veneer or faux stone, and then press it into place on the prepared surface. The stones are typically arranged in a pattern to create a cohesive look, and it's important to maintain uniform spacing between the stones.

Finally, after the pieces of stone have been placed, the joints between them need to be filled with mortar or grout. This helps to stabilize the stones, further protects against moisture, and ensures that the final result is both visually appealing and long-lasting.
