~The Whelan Family Tree: A Living Legacy~

In a moment of profound reverence, Cavell staff was privileged to welcome its oldest alumna, Gloria Whelan, in September of this year. At the venerable age of one hundred, Whelan offered a wealth of heartfelt recollections from her time at camp in 1933-1934. Her words painted vivid pictures of swimming, singing, horseback riding, and the profound connection she forged with the natural world and fellow campers.

Accompanied by her daughter, Jenny Nolana, also a former camper from the 1960s, Whelan regaled her audience with tales of early morning dips in the lake, campfire sing-alongs, and learning to ride horses. Yet, the most meaningful theme of her narrative was the enduring love for people and nature which she nurtured

at Camp Cavell.

A renowned author and National Book Award winner, Whelan's children's and young adult fiction often draws inspiration from personal experiences. Her works, including historical fiction set on Mackinac Island and in communist Russia, as well as short stories published in various literary journals, are a testament to her creative spirit.


Following her time at Camp Cavell, Whelan acquired a property up north and transformed it into a conservancy. When she learned that Camp Cavell was also shifting its focus towards nature conservation, she was intrigued by this and

invited her daughter along to visit.

The reunion was a sacred moment for both Whelan and the Cavell community. As she shared the original Camp Cavell song, it was evident that the camp's spirit and traditions have remained steadfast through the decades. Her visit served as a poignant reminder of the enduring impact our camp can have on its campers, even many years later.

Bridging the past & the present

In a series of unexpected circumstances, I was recently led to the charming location of Camp Cavell. Sorting through old photos, I came across an unfamiliar image. Turning the snapshot over, I saw my mother's handwriting and was intrigued by the details scribbled on the back; "Camp Cavell, Lake Huron, M.E.E.A., 5-10-85, weekend."

Having my own deep love for the Port Huron area, I was surprised I hadn't heard of this place before. Curious, I did a deep dive into researching this particular event and discovered the acronym was short for "Michigan Environmental Education Awards." Even more surprised she would endure the back roads for close to three hours (she never set wheels on a highway) all the way to Lexington, I drove to East Lansing to view the historical collections at Michigan State University, where the original materials are stored.

A long-time environmental advocate and Girl Scout leader, it wouldn't be so unusual for her to gravitate towards an opportunity to expand her outdoor knowledge. This informative conference covered everything from wilderness skills, kayaking safety, and understanding birds of prey to nature art, outdoor special education, and storytelling around the campfire. But why this specific one? Passing away when I was still a young adult, I never quite got to know my mother as much as I would have liked. But finding this picture at the exact same age she was when she stepped foot on the grounds of Camp Cavell was serendipitous.

At this time, there was many significant changes in my life. I was feeling a bit untethered missing my mom and void of significant purpose. Yet, this trail of clues afforded me a reason to make a deeper connection with her via Camp Cavell, as I walked the trails and beach in search of the bridge in her photo. Gratefully, the exploration gave me the opportunity to discover just how special this lakeside camp is.
