

Route 66 ‘The Mother Road’ The SDC 100th Anniversary Celebration.

Cyrus Avery can be credited with getting the Road from Chicago to Los Angeles underway in 1925, with the idea of creating an organized, numbered road rather than the hodgepodge of local roads with a variety of names and numbers. The next year, it began with federal matching funds, and during the Depression, it received assistance from the Civilian Conservation Corps and the Works Progress Administration. By 1938, it was all “paved”. It was an all-weather road, even if some parts were gravel. The great migration of the 1930s saw many desperate people drive it with what vehicles they had. Many of those vehicles did not make it all the way, and many people perished along the way. John Steinbeck referred to it as ‘The Mother Road’ in his book about a family named Joad in his great epic work, “The Grapes of Wrath.’ They were desperate people. But they were the people, and they just kept on and did not give up. They were heading west, just as people did in the mid-1800s, with nothing but hope and resolve, just as did the folks who left Europe earlier for America in a bid to survive.

Times got harder during World War II, when gas was rationed, and most drivers were allowed only 3 gallons of gasoline per week. Civilian traffic was greatly reduced while military traffic increased exponentially. The many traffic convoys to and from places like Ft Leonard Wood were dependent upon Rt. 66. After the war, many people began to move west again for jobs, and much of the infrastructure we see remaining today was developed at that time. Tractors replaced mules on farms, which reduced the need for farm workers. Whereas at one time our country had 43 workers on farms for every person living in the city, after the war, we reached a point where there was one farm worker for every 43 people living in a city. Many people wanted the new consumer goods available, and their route to obtaining them led them to seek work in the burgeoning West. Until President Eisenhower began developing the interstate highway system in the mid-fifties, roads such as Route 66 and the Lincoln Highway were the common choice for transportation.

There were many changes to Route 66 over the years, and we will follow the oldest of the routes that followed the earlier path developed in the Southwest by Edward Fitzgerald Beale for the US military. Just think of what it must have been like to travel west toward an uncertain future in the thirties. Now think of what it must have been like if you were Black and had to live with towns having sunset laws requiring you to be out of town by sundown.

On our Studebaker Drivers Club route, I have made each day's run reasonable and checked that the overnight stops offer a variety of hotels/motels, ranging from the Hampton Inn, where Sheryl and I stay, to Motel 6 and Super 8. And we have a special arrangement with the Tee Pee Drive Inn in Sapulpa, OK, to stay there. Plus, there are many historic motels along the route, including the El Rancho in Gallup, NM. It will be a great journey! Please join.

Route 66 Hotels we used – Look for the Brown 1956 Studeolet pickup

If my wife were taking the trip, I would be in the Cadillac and staying at Hampton Inns. All of these towns offer a wide variety of lodging, from high-end to budget, and even original Route 66 places. However, my wife can no longer ride far in the pickup, so I follow the majority's request on some of the tours I have led, and I shall be staying at Wyndham Hotels. Membership in the Wyndham Rewards Program gets you discounts and rewards.

The exception is the historic El Rancho Hotel in Gallup, NM, which is a must-do whenever in Gallup. These are the hotels where I shall be if you have any questions, ideas or suggestions. I plan on departing by 8:00 am each day. My cell # is 970 209 7814 Steve

I do not plan on resort-style stops when I am just staying the night and leaving early in the morning. I do not endorse any of these hotels/motels, except the El Rancho, which is an experience and has a very good restaurant. - Steve

General Itinerary, turn-by-turn details are linked to each day with interesting stops along the way.

- May 11, 2026, Day 1, Chicago to Springfield, IL, 410 miles and about 7 driving hours.
 - We will start at 8:30 am, May 11, at The Navy Pier, then at Adams and Michigan Ave. by the Chicago Art Institute, where the lions are sitting, and at the Rt66 signage that begins and ends in Springfield, IL. This is the longest day in miles and driving hours. This day is for getting out of Illinois and closer to where much of Rte. 66 history begins.
- May 12, 2026, Day 2, Springfield, IL, to Sullivan, Missouri. 226 miles and about 7 driving hours.
 - The horseradish capital of the world, a giant catsup bottle, the historic Chain of Rocks Bridge, the Gateway Arch, and more!
- May 13, 2026, Day 3, Sullivan, MO, to Miami, Oklahoma. 270 miles and about 6 driving hours
 - Missouri, through Kansas, then into Oklahoma, with many stops along the way.
- May 14, 2026, Day 4, Miami, OK to Sapulpa, Oklahoma, 125 miles and under 3 hours driving.
 - There is a lot to see here, so we built in some time. The Blue Whale, Totem Pole Park, Big Bill the Muffler Man, and Heart of 66 Auto Museum are a few. A gathering is planned in Sapulpa; details to come.
- May 15, 2026, Day 5, Sapulpa, Ok, to Elk City, Oklahoma. 250 miles and about 6 hours of driving.
 - Pyramids, Motorcycles, a round barn, a Rt 66 museum in Clinton, and the National Route 66 Museum in Elk City, both worth the time.
- May 16, 2026, Day 6, Elk City, OK, to Tucumcari, New Mexico. 290 miles and 6 hours of driving time
 - Don't miss getting a photo of your Studebaker Lark in Lark, Texas, with the local signs; try a 72-ounce steak at The Big Texan; visit Cadillac Ranch; and much more. In Adrian, TX, you are about halfway through the route.
- May 17, 2026, Day 7, Tucumcari, NM to Santa Fe, New Mexico. 215 miles and 5 hours of driving.
 - The Town of Escalante in Espana is considered the first town in what became the United States. See the amazing Miraculous Staircase at Loretto Chapel—the oldest church at 401 Santa Fe Trail dates from 1610.
- May 18, 2026, Day 8, Santa Fe, NM to Gallup, New Mexico. 20 miles and just over 4 hours of driving time

- Owl Rock, restored 66 dimer and beautiful scenery. There were other 66 routes over the years, including some that bypassed Santa Fe and went through Los Lunas, way to the south, then up toward Gallup. There are many old pueblos whose ruins can be seen today along the southern route, and over time, many villages began banning non-natives from entering, and some still do.
- May 19, 2026, Day 9, Gallup to Flagstaff, Arizona. 215 miles and just over 4 hours of driving time
 - The Petrified Forest, Standing on the corner in Winslow, Meteor City, Twin Arrow, and many stops of interest.
- May 20, 2026, Day 10, Flagstaff, AZ to Kingman, Arizona, 170 miles and about 3 hours of driving time.
 - Williams is where the train to the Grand Canyon starts, old cars and interesting places in Seligman, and Valentine at the Hackberry General Store.
- May 21, 2026, Day 11, Kingman, AZ to Victorville, California, 282 miles and just over 5 driving hours.
 - Donkeys in Oatman, amazing scenery, and the California Rt 66 museum in Victorville.
- May 22, Day 12. Victorville, CA, to Santa Monica Pier and the end of the road, 135 miles and 5 hours of driving, depending on traffic. Congratulations! You Made It!

From the SDC, our thanks go to Steve and Sheryl Fitzgerald for creating these route instructions, tracking time and mileage, and for their willingness to lead our group. Steve noted that: Total miles on the old Road is about 2,532 miles and fifty-one hours of driving time at the speed limit. Stop whenever and wherever you wish and see what you wish. You will not see everything, but imagine driving it in a vehicle from the 1920s or older. Much of the road was gravel or just dirt in the early years. During the heart of the Great Depression, it was mostly paved. They probably did not have potholes as bad as those on the Interstate in New Mexico today.

Steve plans to leave 100 Adams Street in Downtown Chicago at 8:30 am on May 11th and arrive at Santa Monica Pier in the morning of May 22. He will take Sheryl to the Orange County airport, then return to the pier for the rest of the day. Anyone wishing to join Steve as he returns to Colorado on the old roads is welcome to do so. His drive home to Colorado via Death Valley and the lesser-known roads of Nevada and Utah, as the other routes to the north are usually closed due to snow in May.

Day 1 Chicago to Springfield, Ill. This day is for getting out of Illinois and closer to where much of Rte. 66 history begins. This is the longest day in miles and driving hours.

Not great for many cars back in the day.

Golden Shores 19.8 31 A retirement community. The Arch Bridge carries water. You may go through Topock

Crossing into California. Still on day 11

Needles, CA 13.4 19 from I-40, use exit 13. Often quite hot. Old Ore Wagon

Goffs 29.4 31 Hopefully, the road and bridge work is finished

Fenner 10.1 11 Lots of bridges to Barstow, many closed

Chambless 40.6 60

Amboy 6.0 8 Cinder cone volcano. Lots of lava rock.

Bagdad, near the Bagdad Café of movie fame, is not much left around here

Siberia 15.0 16 Folks do not get sent there for re-education.

Ludlow 13.2 15 Chevron station is not cheap - but it is there.

Newberry Springs 32.4 37 Stay north of I-40 and RR tracks

Daggett 11.9 15 Once a popular supply destination from Death Valley Tom Mix and John Muir hung out here

Barstow 10.8 14 Growth due to commuting Angelenos, some murals

Lenwood 5.6 11 Losing identity due to the growth of Victorville

For the day, it has only been 133 miles for about four hours of driving, depending on traffic and wrong turns. If lost, just keep heading west-southwest. My family, like the Joad's, turned off at Mojave and went to the San Joaquin Valley. Tehachapi Pass is still a struggle.

END OF ROUTE 66

Total miles on the old Road, as close as I could come to it, has been 2,532 for about fifty-one hours of driving time, because when forced to use Interstates, I went at about the speed limit, ok, a bit over it. Realistically, plan for sixty hours of driving time. BUT stop as you wish and see what you wish. You will not see everything, but just imagine driving it in a vehicle from the twenties or older. Much of the road was gravel or just dirt in the early years. During the heart of the Great Depression, it was mostly paved. They probably did not have potholes as bad as those on the Interstate in New Mexico today.

We plan on leaving 100 Adams Street in Downtown Chicago at 8:30 am. We need to arrive at the Pier in the morning, then take Sheryl to John Wayne Airport in Orange County, after which I shall return to the Pier for the rest of the day. I will then drive home to Colorado via Death Valley, and the lesser-known roads of Nevada and Utah, as the other routes to the

north are usually closed due to snow in May. Anyone wishing to join me on the way to Colorado on the old roads is welcome to do so. It is a great ride.
