

We met Carole several months ago when she visited the MCJDC as a member of the Medina Community Citizen's Police Academy class. Upon learning about the good things that go on in our building with, and for, our youth, Carole kindly and graciously offered to volunteer her time to conduct yoga and mindfulness with our youth. Guess what? She recently did just that! Some of our kids enjoyed it so much that upon their release they went out and bought Lavender oil and oil diffusers (she shared some oil with them during her classes)! We had kids talking about her yoga session for several days. Thank you Carole for being so generous and overall just plain fantastic!



Inspiration Academy - Huge Success!

A total of 12 people across Medina County participated in our third annual Inspiration Academy. Inspiration Academy is four, weekly two-hour sessions. Each participant receives a binder with information about the MCJDC and the services offered to our youth. Topics covered during the program include logistics, inspiration, safety/security, and mind/body/soul programs.

Education at the JDC

Did you know our youth attend school year round?

- We contract with Medina City Schools for two teachers and one paraprofessional.
- Youth go to school from 8:00 am to 2:00 pm Monday through Friday, operating under the Medina City School schedule.
- Summer School: 8:00 am to 12:00 pm, Monday through Friday
- We have 21 computer stations for online schooling.
- Schools can send their work to us for youth to complete while in our care.
- If the youth do not have work sent to them, they work off of a curriculum created by teacher Jim Thomas.
- We might note that our teachers love it here so much they have both been here since we opened in 1999!

What Happens When a Resident Leaves?

What goes through your mind when a youth leaves detention? You may be thinking, what type of environment will they be returning to? What personal items did they have going in and what will they be leaving with? At the MCJDC we want our youth to be successful, which means we want them to have resources that will help them be successful even after they leave our building. Below is a small list of items that are placed in our youth's personal property when they are released.

They Receive:

Suicide Prevention Coaster - A resource they can use if they or anyone they know are feeling alone. Generously provided by the Medina County Suicide Prevention Coalition


Website Resource Card - Has 22 websites that can help our youth to increase their well-being, happiness, optimism, positive thinking and decrease their negativity.

An Inspirational Card - Developed by Officer Regina Hogg in 2016

This card contains a poem and words of wisdom created by Officer Hogg because of her heart for our youth and their future.

Book Mark - Titled, "Take These Words to Heart," which is a quote by Shannon L. Adler.

Journal - When a youth is detained, they receive a journal that they are permitted to write in during designated times. They can share what they have written in their journal with our social worker or counselors and no one else. Once it is determined that an individual is leaving our care their journal is placed in their personals, so they can continue writing upon release if they choose.



Connecting Through Music

When Superintendent Stollar found out recently that one of his residents enjoyed playing guitar, he asked the young man if he would like to play for several staff members and fellow residents. The youth eagerly accepted the offer, so several staff members gathered together to listen (Maddy, our student music therapy student even came in to hang with the group!). Stollar lent the youth one of his personal guitars and for about the next 20 minutes they jammed with a very pleased and proud young man, who thanked them several times for this opportunity to highlight one of his talents. *"What a great way for us to see our kids, and for them to see us, in a different and very positive context!"*, commented one staff member. The young man is learning to play in his church's band and we wish him all the best!!



Children's Center Kits

The MCJDC partners with the Children's Center of Medina County to provide toiletry kits for the residents. These kits include various hygiene items and the residents receive these kits when they leave the MCJDC. Sometimes having proper hygiene items can be a challenge for the residents and these kits help get the residents off on the right foot!



Youth Fulfillment Coordinator - Jaclyn Balliet

We welcome one of our newest employees - Jaclyn Balliet! Let us give you a snapshot of her and just a few of her job responsibilities.



Jaclyn will be averaging 20 flexible hours per week during which she will work on improving the current services we provide for our kids as well as researching and bringing in new services. Of course, this will involve meeting and interviewing new folks to ensure they are properly vetted to work with our youth to work them into our daily schedule. The vast majority will be volunteering their time. Jaclyn will also be coordinating our art and music therapy, prepping for and working special events, updating our lobby informational monitor, and trying to obtain grants and other funding.

Jaclyn has been busy with not only these duties but has also found some yoga instructors (from Cultivate Yoga) for the MCJDC and artists to help design and paint this year's mural for our annual Art Experience event (Sept. 26th). She has also been able to get more than 20 yoga mats donated from the Northeast Ohio Sri Lankan Community. Jaclyn is BIG on donations and is working on other items and supplies that will benefit the youth. Additionally, she has met with numerous individuals not only inside Medina County but surrounding counties as well who all want to help us. All good stuff for our kids and our community!

A couple of random facts about Jaclyn; Jaclyn coaches t-ball and softball, has three beautiful children and is a Life Coach at her Mindful Healing practice in Lakewood when she isn't working at the MCJDC. Sergeant Promotion: Sergeant Jason Gordon


Jason Gordon has recently been promoted to Sergeant!


