As we move through the summer months, our youth stay hard at work continuing their education. Each year we receive grant money through Medina City Schools to keep our teaching department staffed part-time during the summer. Monday through Friday our youth have the opportunity to attend class from 8:00am to 12:00pm. Without both of our teacher's and paraprofessional's hard work and dedication this would not be possible. This summer some of our youth are continuing with their online school program, others are completing work towards earning a math and language arts credit and some are studying to complete their General Equivalency Diploma (GED).




Youth Garden

She worked hard to turn over the soil from last year and find the perfect spacing so the garden can prosper with fresh produce for donations. All our youth who have earned Honoree status or Level 3 on our positive behavior system are permitted to work in the garden throughout the summer. The goal of this program is to give the kids an opportunity to take care of something in addition to themselves, to contribute to the community, and learn basic gardening skills. This year the garden consists of mammoth sunflowers with marigolds, cucumbers, strawberries, beans, corn, pumpkins, lettuce, peppers, eggplant, squash, sweet potatoes, and broccoli.
