Teamwork. It's impossible for only a few to carry the load when an event like this requires everyone


to step in where they can. Of course, we all have work, family, and other commitments, but many Marines make light work.

Critics' Thumbs Down!!

"Religious farce" and "Desecration" were among the heated barbs hurled at a new "sacred oratorio" that premiered in Dublin, Ireland in 1742. An oratorio is a musical composition, typically based on a religious narrative, and the one that provoked the firestorm of protests was Georg Friedrich Handel's "Messiah." It was controversial because it went straight to the heart of "sacred" religious territory. Its most infuriated critics were clergymen who objected to scripture being quoted in playhouses. Among the most heated critics was Rev. John Newton, who, following a performance

of the work in 1784, fired off more than 50 sermons assailing the oratorio as a trivial amusement "no better than a profanation of the name and truths of God" and no less than a second "crucifying of the Son of God." The opposition was so persistent that "**Messiah**" was performed in an established church only once during Handel's lifetime (1758).

The story follows the rise of a Christ-like figure named al-Masih, or Arabic for "the Messiah." "*Messiah*" quotes scripture from both the Old and New Testaments. Isaiah 9:6 prophesies a child being born. Luke 2:10-11 pronounces prophesy fulfilled. John 3:16 highlights Gods love.

As we enter this Christmas season remember the Gift that God gave us – His Son, born to eventually die for our sins. As we pray in this Christmas season, pray for our First Responders, pray for our Nation's leaders, pray for our military that they may be safe. I pray for each of you daily.

On behalf of Linda and I, Merry Christmas. Keep Christ in Christmas, and please be safe.

HISTORY OF THE MARINE CORPS BALL



November 2025 marked two key milestones for the Marine Corps. First, 2025 is the 2050th anniversary of the U.S. Marine Corps. Detachment 1081 celebrated this milestone on November 8, 2025 with our brothers of Detachment 1473. 2025 also marks the 100th anniversary of the Marine Corps Ball. We all know the origins of the Marine Corps. It was founded in a bar called Tun Tavern, and Marines kept bars near and dear ever since. Though we

all celebrate the ball, most don't know its origin or history. This piece lifts the veil on that history.

The annual Marine Corps Birthday Ball is a celebration of Marine Corps history, traditions and camaraderie. And like the Corps itself, it is rooted to Philadelphia. It represents where the Marine Corps started and where it is now; while giving us a glimpse of the past, present and future. Throughout the world on 10 November, Marines celebrate the birth of their Corps – the most loyal, feared, revered, and professional fighting force the world has ever known.

In 1921, the 13th Commandant, Gen. John A. Lejeune, issued Marine Corps Order No. 47. This order summarized the history, mission, and tradition of the Corps, and directed that the order be read to all Marines each year on 10 November to honor the founding of the Marine Corps, thereby formally establishing November 10th as the Marine Corps' birthday. Soon after, Marine commands began to not only honor the birthday but also celebrate it. In 1923, informal commemorations were held at various locations. The Marine Barracks at Ft. Mifflin, PA held a formal dance. Marines at the Washington Navy Yard staged a mock battle on the parade ground. At Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, the Marine baseball team played a Cuban team, winning 9 to 8.

The first "formal" Birthday Ball took place in Philadelphia in 1925. Guests included the Commandant, the Secretary of War, and a host of statesmen and elected officials. Prior to the Ball, General Lejeune unveiled a memorial plaque at Tun Tavern, the birthplace of the Marine Corps. An evening of celebration took place at the Benjamin Franklin Hotel.

Over the years the annual Birthday Ball grew, taking on a life of its own. In 1952, Commandant Gen. Lemuel C. Shepherd Jr. formalized key observances, most notably the cake-cutting which honors the passing of tradition from the oldest to the youngest Marine. Current Marine Corps policy mandates that the first piece of cake must be presented to the oldest U.S. Marine present and passed to the youngest Marine representing the passing of tradition from generation to generation. Among the many such mandates is the reading of the Commandant's birthday message to the Corps. Today, the annual Birthday Ball is a global celebration and, like the U.S. Marine Corps itself, has evolved from modest origins to the dignified function it is today. In addition to celebrating Marine Corps history and traditions, the Marine Corps Ball symbolizes the camaraderie among Marines. On 10 November, regardless of where Marines are stationed or deployed, you will always hear "Happy Birthday Marine."
