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Pastor's Meditation

As I've sat here quarantined in my home for nearly three weeks; a victim and prisoner to the dreaded Covid-19/Delta virus, I've had time to read and meditate on various things. One such thing was the middle section of the LCMS' Reporter this month. The article was entitled, "Are Pastors Really Necessary?" This article grieved me that such a topic and such a question would ever need to be asked. Was it really being asked, and were they really looking for an answer to the question, or was it simply rhetorical? I assume that if you also read the article, you would see that it leans toward the latter of being rhetorical. So, why are you grieved if it was rhetorical, Pastor Cody? The answer is obvious...of course, we do! Right, right, right, I get it, but to even have to ask the question is painful. It's painful because there are churches and denominations a plenty who would answer the other way around...of course, we don't need pastors. We don't need pastors because we can just use someone among us here at the church to get up and PREACH for us each week. The inherent problem right there is that "Someone" is usually, if not always, "appointed" as Brother Tom, Brother Rob, Brother So-in-So, and they have no formal theological training whatsoever. But culturally speaking, this is the trend today and has been for quite a while now. You see, American Evangelicalism is vehemently against educated clergy because they don't want someone, i.e. the pastor...telling them, or put better...teaching us what we have to believe. They say this because everyone is content to learn the Bible for themselves. So many want to "experience" God's Word for themselves and let it speak directly to them. This can be dangerous.

Friends in Christ, this is a dangerous path to be on in the Church. We need pastors in the Church for this very reason. We need an under-shepherd, a dear pastor, to lead us and guide us to the green pastures of God's Word and to the quiet waters of the Sacraments. Consider the example. When I was on my vicarage in NW Minnesota way back in 1994-95, we had a new couple join the congregation through adult catechism which I was privileged to teach and get to know them. I had a sweet car back then! I had a 1981 VW Rabbit Diesel with 250K miles on it. That year on my vicarage, I was in the process of restoring it and

making it as mint condition as I could. That meant getting some body work done. It just so happened that the guy I was bringing through catechism was a body shop guy who was going to help me with the restoration. When I went by his shop one day, he showed me this car that he had been working on. I said that car looks awesome! He said it looks awesome to the naked eye, but he said this car has been in multiple accidents! I said no way it looks perfect! He then took me to the side of the car and told me to look down the side and see the waves in the paint and showed me where it had been wrecked. I would have never noticed if he had not told me.

The point? When it comes to body work, I didn't see it...I totally missed it, because I don't have the expertise; I don't have the trained eye to see the flaws in the paint. But HE DID! The same goes for your pastor and his seminary training with God's Word. Your pastor has learned the Biblical languages of Greek and Hebrew and has studied theology for years! He has the "eye" for false doctrine. He has the expertise of studying the Word of God! Let him guide you and teach you that precious Word. This is one such example of how "YOUR Pastor" can be a blessing to you and how important the relationship is between pastor and people.

So, again, could the church get along without pastors? Some say yes...I say NO! The Church needs pastor because Christ commanded it and gave it to us. Quoting directly from the Reporter article, "*C.F.W. Walther, the first president of the LCMS (1847-1850, 1864-1878), wrote 10 theses (statements) about the Office of the Holy Ministry. In Thesis III, he wrote, 'The preaching office [Office of the Holy Ministry] is not an optional office but one whose establishment has been commanded to the Church and to which the Church is properly bound till the end of time.'*"

St. Paul also writes, "*How then will they call on him in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in him of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone preaching?*"¹⁵ *And how are they to preach unless they are sent? As it is written, 'How beautiful are the feet of those who preach the good news!...'*"¹⁷ *So faith comes from hearing, and hearing through the word of Christ" (Rom. 10:14-17).*

Why are you bringing this up and what does this have to do with suffering with Covid? Well, glad you asked! I just wanted to say, after being away from you, God's flock at St. Paul, I have missed all of you so very much! I have missed seeing all of you! I have missed preaching and teaching...the very things I love to do for you! I miss giving you the precious Body and Blood of our Savior Jesus in the Lord's Supper. I love ministering to all of you! You have shown me with your calls, cards, food delivery, texts, and concern a beautiful picture of the relationship that can exist between pastor and people. The simple fact that we can have this kind of relationship is a beautiful thing and a very picture of the relationship that Christ has with His Bride the Church. Serving one another in love. Caring for each other in our needs. Filling in where needed and still the Church functions as needed! I appreciate the elders, organist, and all who have helped in my absence. I appreciate all of you and all the prayers that you have lifted for Michelle and me since this whole thing started. Know that we will not forget your kindness and your love shown to us.

To that end, we can't wait to be in your midst real soon! The Lord definitely teaches one thing in the midst of COVID...Patience!!! The Lord be with you and we'll see you soon in the house of the Lord! Now I know why David said, "*I was GLAD when they said unto me...Let us go into the house of the Lord" (Ps 122:1)!*

REV. DR. SOLOMON YADESSA

Multi-Ethic Ministry of North Texas

Rev. Dr. Solomon Yadessa is a native of the Oromo people of Ethiopia. Born and raised in a Lutheran family, Solomon began serving the Lord by accompanying his father who was a pastor to 18 congregations. Pastor Solomon's theological studies started at the Mekane Yesus Seminary in Addis attaining two bachelor degrees in Theology and Divinity. Mekane Yesus is the largest Lutheran Church in the world with more than nine million members. Mekane Yesus is in working partnership with LCMS. After working with Mekane Yesus and World Vision International, he came to the US for his Master of Arts degree in Theology, Development and Evangelism at Wartburg Theological Seminary in Iowa.

Pastor Solomon returned to Ethiopia and served at the headquarters of the Ethiopian Evangelical Mekane Yesus Lutheran Church for three years and then returned to the United States and enrolled at Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne, graduating with a Doctor of Philosophy degree in Missiology in 2010.

Upon return to Ethiopia, Pastor Solomon experienced persecutions and was imprisoned for six months for his faith during the communist regime in Ethiopia. The Rev. Gudina Tumsa, then General Secretary of Mekane Yesus Church was assassinated by the same government for his faith and human rights stance.

Pastor Solomon returned to the United States and was ordained in the Texas District in 2016, as a missionary at large in North Texas. He now leads the Multi-Ethic Ministry of North Texas (MEMNT).

MEMNT has strong support from Our Redeemer Lutheran Church in Dallas and Faith Lutheran Church in Plano. Pastor Solomon's mission is reaching out to the refugees and immigrants in the DFW area with special focus on the Vickery Meadow area. The Vickery Meadow neighborhood is approximately one mile east of Our Redeemer with people from around 110 nations residing in a radius of 3.5 miles.



On Sunday, September 12, Dr. Solomon Yadessa will be our Mission Festival Speaker. He will be leading Bible class and preaching for us that day. The service that day will be followed by a potluck meal. Please bring a meat and a salad, vegetable, or dessert. 

WHY THE LCMS AND WHY ST. PAUL LUTHERAN, WFTX?

I was asked, "What drew you to Lutheranism, why the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod, and why did you pick Saint Paul Lutheran Church?" I believe I can answer all three in one word: traditional.

I had my first child almost seven years ago and my second child two years ago. Throughout those seven years, I saw the world devolving into what we have today. It's a complete mess out there. America feels lawless and void. Everyone is their own master, morality and reality is whatever you want it to be, and sexual immorality is unabashedly presented as entertainment in plain view of children. So, naturally I said to myself, "That's not how I want to raise my kids!"

Being raised in Evangelical Churches growing up, I at least knew where to start. I knew we needed Jesus in our home. However, the Evangelical Churches we were attending left us feeling empty and fatigued. We were constantly chasing a "spiritual high" through the rock concert style of the praise band and emotionally charged worship. I was always focused on trying to earn my righteousness through good works. When I couldn't get that "high" or when I fell short of the Law, I didn't want to go back. I was made to feel undeserving, unclean, and unholy. I was missing the Good News of the Gospel! I was missing Jesus! I knew I couldn't go back to that type of church. Seeing society rapidly descending into sin, and feeling the lack of the Evangelical Church, I felt drawn to a simpler way of living. I felt drawn to something with substance.

Raising chickens, goats, sheep, and a vegetable garden brought some fulfillment, and it made me to realize that getting back to a more traditional way of living was the answer, getting back to the basics. The nuclear family was now my goal, but I was still lacking church. With a traditional lifestyle in mind, I started researching Roman Catholicism, but there was just too much that didn't sit right with me.

Praying to saints as mediators, indulgences, and Mary being sinless just didn't match up with my (limited) knowledge of the Bible. Being from German descent, I began looking into Luther and why he railed against the Roman Catholic Church. After a few days of reading, I found myself agreeing with everything I found. I just had to check it out. I began searching for Lutheran churches and was quickly dismayed. I saw women being ordained as pastors, and not only support for the LGBTQ+ community, but APPROVAL of their sin. After another search of the internet I, fortunately, found that this was not the real Lutheran Church. I went back and searched for LCMS churches and first saw St. Paul Lutheran pop up.

The building instantly drew me in, and I thought, "Now that's what a real church looks like!" What are the odds I stumble upon this traditional church building in the heart of Wichita Falls! Being almost 100 years old, the building has a beautifully classic look. At first, we saw the stained-glass windows, but the arched frames pulled our eyes upward to the spires rising even higher, pointing up to the bell tower. Looks only go so far! How was the congregation? The priest? What was the service like? Upon entering, we were quickly and warmly greeted by the friendliest parishioners I've met at any church. We instantly felt as if we were adopted into the family. They made us feel most welcomed by giving us firm handshakes and tight hugs. Christ's love was shining through them. Soon after, Father Cody came and joined us in the Fellowship Hall to begin teaching Sunday school. We briefly shook hands and exchanged pleasantries. Shortly after, I was blown away by the teaching. This Sunday school was nothing like I had ever experienced before. It was quite obvious that he didn't just have the Bible nearly memorized; he KNEW the Bible. Father Cody revealed details I had never even began to consider.

Feeling encouraged after the Sunday school lesson, we made our way upstairs to the sanctuary for the Divine Service. I was pleased to see that the beauty of the exterior continued inside. Dark woodwork everywhere, vaulting upward to the high cathedral ceiling. At the altar, there stood a terrific statue of Jesus. Seeing the pierced hands outstretched, I was drawn to think upon His sacrifice for us. Worship began, and the hymns being sung by everyone was so refreshing. No guitar solos. No strobe lights. Just the organ and our voices blending beautifully together. The sermon was just as educational and refreshing as the Sunday school lesson. Father Cody didn't need to shout to keep our attention. There wasn't any promise of a better life if we just gave a few dollars more. And there definitely wasn't any mention of, "Do good deeds to secure your place in heaven!" No, just Jesus Christ. Crucified. Buried and Risen again. Everything about this place, this church, these people, pointed to Christ. I knew we had found what we were seeking. We were finally HOME!
