You have the right to recieve a "Good Faith Estimate" explaining how much your medical care will cost

Under state and federal law, a patient may ask a health care provider for a Good Faith Estimate of the price the health care provider and health facility will charge for providing a nonemergency health care service, including costs such as medical tests, prescription drugs, equipment and hospital fees. The Good Faith Estimate will be made in writing and provided within the time frames state in this notice.

- Any Patient Any patient (insured, uninsured, or self-pay) may request a Good Faith Estimate of
 expected charges for nonemergency health care services. When one is requested, you will be
 provided a copy of this Good Faith Estimate within 3 business days of the request (when
 uninsured and self-pay) and 5 business days (when insured).
- Uninsured Patients Federal law requires health care providers to give you a Good Faith Estimate in advance of scheduling or upon request if you are uninsured or self-pay (not using your insurance to pay for the item or service). The Good Faith Estimate will be provided within 3 business days of scheduling the nonemergency health care service or within 1 business day if the nonemergency health care service is scheduled to be performed by the practitioner within 3 business days.

You may ask you health care provider, and any other provider you chose, for a Good Faith Estimate before you schedule an item or service.

Patients who are uninsured or self-pay may dispute the actual charges if they exceed the Good Faith Estimate by at least \$400.00.

Make sure to save a copy of your Good Faith Estimate.
