

Mayfast Heats Up Fresh Track

Sunshine and Warm Weather Provide "Slick" Event


Mayfast 2014 is in the books! Southern breezes delivered a preview of summer temperatures and warmed the newly resurfaced track at the Hallett Motor Racing Circuit for the Cimarron Region's annual event May 3-4.

Under cloudless skies nearly 50 cars participated in five groups (red, yellow, white, blue and green) according to skill and experience. After the general drivers meeting, as the first run groups assaulted the track, Gary Bernard, Cimarron Region Chief Driving Instructor, presented a class for novice drivers and anyone interested in a refresher course on safety, driving technique, finding the line on the track, warning flag descriptions, etc. All groups had the opportunity to drive during several sessions both before and after the lunch break.



Many drove both Saturday and Sunday, while some chose one day or the other. Most agreed the event is tiring, but in a good way. The adrenaline rush is addicting, and the learning curve intensive. Not surprising, most of the drivers are already making plans to return to Hallett for OKtoberfast, Cimarron Region's Club Race and Driver Education later this year. Note: Novice instruction and participation is only available during Mayfast!

Mayfast 2014 is behind us already! And what a weekend of fun it was. We were very pleased with the turnout (50 registrations) considering the competition from two other PCA events the same weekend – a PCA Club Race at Circuit of the Americas (COTA) in Austin, Texas, and another Driver Education event at Motorsports Park Hastings (MPH) in Hastings, Nebraska, both of which likely accounted for the absence of many of our "regulars" from our south and north.

Hallett Motor Racing Circuit, its official track name, is a tremendous track, which we are so fortunate to have close to Tulsa. We had participants from as far away as Florida register for and attend the event, which confirms both the quality of the track and the pull of Cimarron Region's Mayfast Driver Education event

We had a safe weekend, with no contact between cars, and no damaging off-track excursions. We were only the second group to help "break in: Hallett's FRESH PAVEMENT. Connie and Scott Stephens, who own and operate Hallett, had all but a small section of the track repaved, along with roads in the paddock. Interestingly, our drivers reported race tires stuck very well to the new pavement, as drivers on new street tires reported some "slick" areas, especially before it got warm on Saturday.

A big Thank You to our Driving Instructors and other volunteers. Included are Gary Bernard, Chief Driving Instructor, John Blocha, Earl Schott, Bill Jacobi, Randy Kaplin, and several others from neighboring regions. We are very grateful to all of the instructors who stepped up to help teach. It is exhausting to be on track all day with students and then get in some runs in your own car. These guys did a terrific job.

We had a kind of "Changing of the Guard" in other areas this year. After many years of depending on Christy Thomas for a smooth job at registration, we can thank Orlando Dumalag for excellence in that role. And how could we go wrong at registration and check in at the track when backed up by our OKtoberfast registration pro (and Region Treasurer) Joy Jones? Thank you to Orlando and Joy.

Rick Stone had been our "gridmeister" for many years, too. But Rick decided, after giving 2 years notice, it was time to have a life outside of Hallett weekends. Rick set such a high standard for managing the grid that we had big shoes to fill. Rusty, from the Hallett staff took the lead, and our volunteers backed him up for a safe and successful event. Thanks go to Karen Heston, who handled paperwork on the grid, and Jay Anderson, Jon Jones, Rod Nordstrom, Curtis Robinson, and Earl Schott who performed tech inspections.

A special "Ride and Drive Around Hallett" took place over the noon hour on Sunday to give everybody a chance to see the whole track and the new pavement. Randy Kaplin paced the event, driving the proper lines for each turn, in his 1955 Porsche Speedster, which he had driven out from Tulsa. Twelve to 15 vehicles of all types followed Randy around the track for low speed parade laps. Drivers' families and spectators really enjoyed seeing the big picture.

And last, but not least, if you admire that very professional Mayfast 2014 T-shirt design as much as I do, please thank Gary Bernard. Gary donates his time and talent with an outstanding design for the T-shirt each year. This year's is one of my favorites, but they are all exceptional.





Most people including myself enjoy looking at pictures and reading about all kinds of Porsche experiences. Maybe you took an interesting trip, or did something cool to your



Let's Hear it for Self-Drive Cars!

Oh yes, they're coming, as surely as you know to not engage the parking brake when you come off the track; As surely as you know your summer performance tires at the rear will last 13,000 mi, and no more, if you're lucky. Self-drive cars are circling, and they'll enter your garage in a matter of . . . what? Probably fewer years than you might think.

Although there do seem to be a few small issues. An op-ed piece ran in the *Wall Street Journal* a short while ago. The op/ed authors are crusaders. They excoriate NHTSA with bulleted arguments like,

"Millions of lives saved" and "Enriched lives for the disabled and the elderly" and "Less wasted time" and "Revitalized cities." Great stuff. A lot of love, peace and happiness here. But they're missing the point. Our point.

You see, we too have a point. A big one, which is not to be taken lightly. We should also weigh in on this urgent public debate. Express our opinion. Join the ranks and say, hell yes, bring 'em on.

Of course, the day will come when you'll have to give in and get one of these self-drive conveyances. If only because there will come a time when you won't be able to buy anything else What to do?


- Youtube! Think in-car videos on your tablet. Pick the car. Pick the track. Pick the year. And, yes, pick the Porsche.

So, friends, join the campaign! Let's rock this issue! Write your local legislator! And do it today!


Self-drive. The way to go. Bring it on.

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Motorsports Update

The Good Old Days by Jon Jones - CRPCA VP



Growing up in Connecticut, I lived about an hour's drive from Lime Rock Park. That iconic track, designed by the great John Fitch, was my introduction to sports car racing and ultimately, my love and appreciation for the Porsche margue. The first race I attended at Lime Rock was a Formula 5000 event featuring the likes of David Hobbs, Sam Posey, and Brett Lunger (trivia: if you have seen Ron Howard's "Rush," Lunger was one of the drivers working frantically to free Niki Lauda from his burning Ferrari). Lime Rock was the site of titanic battles between manufacturers in Trans Am, IMSA, and even SCCA

National competition. The heyday of SCCA Nationals took place there, among other tracks, with factory-backed efforts by British Leyland, Datsun, Chevrolet and others. It was not yet the time of the huge semi-truck haulers but when Bob Sharp showed up with his trailer full of Datsuns or Bob Tullius arrived with his contingent of Group 44 cars, you knew you were in for a treat. Times were changing and whether we knew it or not, we were witnessing the dawn of professionalism in sports car racing. The cars were clean, well prepared, fast and reliable. The teams had matching uniforms rather than greasy jeans and the cars were always serviced after each session. Porsche, too, was represented, in the form of that outfit from Jacksonville, Florida, Brumos Racing.



But Lime Rock was also home to lower level sports car racing as well, SCCA Regionals. While the National scene was becoming increasingly professionalized, and expensive, the Regionals were the entry level for the real shade tree mechanic. The cars were classics – typically hand-me-downs from National competitors - Triumph Spitfires, MGBs, Alfa Romeos, Fiats, they were all there. And while they weren't always reliable, it was a moveable feast of real sports car action. Represented as well were the Porsche 356 and Speedsters (we called them "bathtub" Porsches back then) – always fast and with a wonderful rasping sound that captured the imagination of a young kid from rural Connecticut. Each car had its own personality - for example the huge ductwork used by some Speedster drivers to route cooling air from the right front headlight to the air-cooled power plant out back. Somewhere, someone has a photograph of a lone figure in the pouring rain on the Lime Rock hillside watching those cars pounding around in the spray. That was me, and I've never regretted being a die-hard sports car fan.

As the grey outwits the black on the top of my head, I miss the simplicity of those days, but there is a way to share the magic, and it's called CVAR - Corinthian Vintage Auto Racing. Based in Texas, CVAR mimics most of the class structure of the old SCCA, before they began the consolidation and elimination of classes. A recent trip to Hallett for a CVAR event was like a trip down memory lane. There they all were - the Truimphs, the MGs, the Datsuns, even the Morgans and the Lotuses. And yes the Porsches too, but sadly no bathtubs. Here is a group of men and women who, like me, value the old days of sports car racing. No electronics, no data analysis, no crew chiefs or experts. Just people who love the sport - the purity of propelling yourself as quickly as you can around on four wheels of mechanical grip. I wouldn't have been happier if it was pouring down rain on a lonely hillside in Connecticut.





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
