





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## News - Scores - Schedule

**20 DRIVERS** showed up April 3 for the final Cimarron Region Autocross practice session prior to the official start of the season later in the month.

A variety of Porsches representing at least 5 decades were on hand, including models 911, 914, 944, 968, 986, 987, 981, 997, 991 and Macan.

The quickest drivers posted best times of just under one minute. Each participant had 5 chances to record their best elapsed time through the course of orange cones. One strategy is to acclimate to the course, and then attempt to progressively improve one's time during each successive run, by identifying sections of the course where more efficient handling, or more speed, or even less speed, will produce lower times. Learning your car's limits, and improving basic driving skills are valuable by-products of autocross participation. In addition, there is much to be learned simply by watching the more seasoned (usually faster) drivers navigate the course. In the end, "seat time" is the only way to become a better driver, as one becomes more proficient with the many autocross techniques.

**DRIVERS** are separated into two random groups. Each driver has 5 or 6 chances to post their best time, depending on time constraints. 2 second penalties are assessed for using "race tires(\*)" or for cone infractions, and leaving the course at any point in a run will be denoted with a DNF (Did Not Finish.)

While one group drives, the other "works" the course with radios to notify the scorers table of run abnormalities, and also reset displaced cones. Group numbers will only be noted in the "box score" when course conditions differ from the first to second groups, i.e. inclement weather conditions, etc.

Course set-up begins at 8:30 a.m., followed by a drivers meeting, course walk, and reduced speed drive through. Each participant then gets 4-6 chances to post their best time. Sessions which count toward the season long championship are \$10; practice sessions are free. Event is open to members (at least 18 years of age) with a valid driver license. Helmets required, loaners available.

There's lots of fun and learning to be had for everyone though. 9 counting events remain scheduled for the season with the top 8 for each driver going towards the "championship." 



## Motorsports Update

### **Safety Rules**

### MOTORSPORT IS INHERENTLY DANGEROUS.

Physics is an absolute and unforgiving mistress which will be respected no matter the situation. As a driver, your best hope is that preparation, skill and luck will combine to allow success on the track. For those who respect physics, happiness awaits, whether through victory, or the mere satisfaction of having challenged yourself. Tears are likely for those who fail to respect the realities of racing.

The role of the organizers or officials at any given speed event is to provide fair competition, but above all, to maximize the ratio of fun to safety. Maximum fun may be crazy dangerous, but maximum safety may inhibit or prevent serious competition. Balancing these demands is the role of any 21<sup>st</sup> Century sanctioning body.

The goal of PCA Club Racing is simple – to allow the owner of a Porsche to have a place to race their car, whatever the model or generation, in a safe environment. Depending on the class of car, the rules are fairly strict or very relaxed, but only when it comes to the mechanical side of engines, suspension, tires, brakes and other related items. There is no compromise on safety. Every driver must use a helmet no older than two generations; every driver's seat must meet FIA specifications or be adequately braced; seat belts must be within 5 years of their original production; every driver must use a head and neck support device, and on and on.

Why? Consider this: during the Golden Age of Auto Racing, drivers perished at the rate of about one a month. As fans we know the names - Clark, Rindt, De Portago, Cevert, Von Trips, MacDonald, and on and on. Our sport will never tolerate this level of carnage ever again, but it takes a concerted effort and visionary leadership to prevent complacency. Many of us have heard the phrase, "Well, it's never happened before." In auto racing this is a foolhardy viewpoint and might cost someone their life. Better this phrase, "If it can happen, it will." Some examples - Talladega, 1987 - Bobby Allison came within a hair's breadth of going into the grandstand. Le Mans, 1955 – Pierre Levegh's car mowed down 80 plus people. Watkins Glen, 1976 - Francois Cevert went under the guard rail. Each of these events, and hundreds more, could have been avoided with foresight and leadership. But they weren't prevented because no one considered the undeniable rules of physics.

PCA Club Racing, like any sanctioning body,

strives for the safety of its competitors as the primary goal. The Boxster, pictured here, impacted the wall at a wellknown oval track during a recent event. While the car



was severely damaged during a high-g impact, the driver walked away. Porsche builds an excellent street car, but the addition of extra layers of safety reduced the odds of serious injury. In the case of the Boxster, the roll cage did its job and there was little deformation and zero intrusion into the driver's space.

Here's another. This incident involved contact with



another car on track, and the force of the impact resulted in the engine being torn loose from its mountings and separated from the transmission. Despite these violent

forces, the driver's compartment was intact, the seat remained securely mounted, and the driver, though shaken up a bit, walked away.

Like rust, danger never sleeps, and we must always be on our guard to prevent a lapse in our first priority. Each participant has a stake in contributing to safety, not only the driver. And the officials must take the lead to set the tone and the priority for safety. Teams grumble about refueling rules during Enduro events, but no one wants a pit fire. Mechanics gripe about having to patch holes in the firewall – but it's called a firewall for a reason. Drivers get awfully hot in those full suits, underwear, gloves and helmet – but they will buy time in the event of a fire. In short, the rules are there for a reason, and despite an "it's never happened before" mindset, it just might – to you.

Commitment to Safety is an imperative in our sport and requires diligence and hard work. The happy and healthy post-event driver is well worth the effort.
