I believe that there is more uniting us as Santa Feans than dividing us: our shared experiences attending our public schools, hiking in our mountains, playing in parks with our children, and learning at an early age that Christmas is more than a holiday. First elected in 2019, during my time in office I championed policies and initiatives that promote economic opportunity, equity, and increased quality of life for all.

Public Safety Work

As a Councilor, I fight for our safety. Under my watch, Santa Fe Police Officers received competitive pay increases and incentives, aiding in recruiting and retaining the most qualified people to protect us. This led to the lowest officer vacancy rate since 2018. I also approved \$800,000 in down payment assistance for our first responders, so those who risk their lives for our safety can afford to live in our community.

Santa Fe Families Work

As a Councilor, and single mom, I fight for families to get a fair shake. That is why I passed legislation making it easier for childcare centers to open their doors. I also championed a \$900,000 investment for childcare workforce development programs, expanding available slots in daycare.

Livability Work

As a Councilor I fight for a holistic housing system spanning the spectrum from workforce housing to helping those without homes. I did that by:

- Sponsoring a ballot proposal to create a permanent, dedicated funding stream for the Affordable Housing Trust Fund.
- Sponsoring the resolution establishing a Safe Outdoor Spaces pilot program that provides pallet homes with 24-hour wraparound services for some of our hardest to house.

Councilor Jamie Cassutt is a single mom to her five-year-old son. She was raised in Santa Fe and educated in Santa Fe's public schools, graduating from Santa Fe High in 2003. She has a Bachelor's degree in Psychology from Lewis & Clark College and a Master's in Public Health from UCLA. Her experience in the public health field with unhoused and low-income families inspired her to pursue work as a policymaker.
