is the offical **Black History** month, there is no way we can think of Dr. King



without thinking of our history

Permit me to take a moment to recall our history against the backdrop of the Black National Anthem, Lift Every Voice and Sing



Incidentally, Lift Every Voice and Sing was written by James Weldon Johnson, one of the outstanding members of the Harlem Renaissance



This era lasted from the early 1920's right up to World War II

It came on the heels of the Great Migratio where Blacks fled th south to escape Jim **Crow and limited** economic opportunities

The Harlem Renaissance coined the term "New Negro" and abandoned the older term of "colored" that was used by the dominant culture



An assortment of writers, entertainers, sports figures and civil rights leaders made this a pivotal period of our history

In the Old Testament King Josiah rediscovers a copy of the Law in the rubble of the temple and spends the rest of his life restoring Israel's relationship with God

In like fashion, let us use this birthday celebration to remember our past and chart a new path to our future
