- *Stock Market Crashes*


What He is Remembered Most for


Without a doubt, what Dr. King is remembered most for was his "I Have a Dream" speech that he delivered on the steps of the Washington Memorial in 1963



What is Most Forgotten About Dr. King

What most people Have forgotten about Dr. King was his stance and posture at the end of his life which was his opposition to the war in Viet Nam and his design of the "Poor People's Campaign





The Choice that he Made

With a Ph. D. from Boston University Dr. King did not have to go into civil rights. He could have become a Black college president. He could have been elected president of a Baptist convention, he could have landed a prestigious pastorate in a major city. But he took up the cause of Civil Rights because of his moral conviction

He Expanded the Dream

It is speculated that Dr. King would have remained alive if he had confined his commentary to race relations and civil rights and had not wandered into foreign policy and international affairs.
