
The book of Mark is written in 62 AD which is right on the verge of the Jews driving the Romans out of the city of Jerusalem



The Gospel of Mark would have been the most optimistic of the gospel writers because of the anticipation of victory over the Romans at the time



All of the of the other gospel were written after the destruction of Jerusalem and the failed attempt to rid Jerusalem of a Roman presence





The story of the calming of the sea would certainly support the idea that the disciples did not really know who Jesus was during his earthly ministry



Jesus being "omniscient" certainly would have known that there was storm on the sea where they were heading



The spirit of God will not lead you where the presence of God can not keep you

The fact that the disciples awoke Jesus suggest that the storm was too difficult for them to handle on their own

The fact that the wind and the rain were obedient to his voice shows God's dominion over that which he had created



The KJV has Jesus saying "peace, be still"

I suggest that the peace portion of his statement was for the wind, while the be still portion was for the raging waves

Jesus turns back to his disciples to ask, "What is it going to take for you to realize who you

have among you?"

Sometimes Jesus has to bring us through a storm in order for us to revisit or realize who He really is in our lives
