Understanding the magnitude of God Himself being for us

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Our lesson focus is on the study of a loving, powerful, compassionate God, who offers those that are willing to believe a multiplicity of benefits. We will view those benefits through the reading and study of Psalms 103.

Psalms 103 – a psalm written by King David, who understood greatly the magnitude of God's blessings in his life, outlines almost line by line, the varied, vast benefit package offered in God. We will discover what is available for each of us and that it all comes from the One that is able to provide without fail and just as importantly, who wants to give to us. How do we obtain them – it is through our relationship, with Him, our Heavenly Father.

Of note – the praise hymn – "O Bless the Lord, My Soul" written by Isaac Watts, an English Christian minister, hymn writer, theologian and logician (he is credited with writing some 750 hymns) – recounts the wonderful blessings of GOD found in verses 1-5; these blessings range from love and mercy, to forgiveness and salvation from sin and death.

*From Jesus' day until the present the Jewish people have had a tradition of saying numerous short prayers throughout the day called "blessings." These prayers focus on GOD as being the source of all blessings. In the most ordinary things, they found ways of praising GOD. For example: when the first flowers were seen on the trees in the spring, they said: "Blessed is He who did not omit anything from the world, and created within it good creations and good trees for people to enjoy!" Even Jesus prayed these prayers of blessing, following the customs of His day.

Continually praising God for His good gifts reminds us that the world is saturated with GOD's presence and that we are under His constant care. * (En-Gedi Resource Center)
