Overview:

This Psalm is attributed to the writer King David, the 2nd king of Israel. David was known, among his many titles, as a worshiper - one who was ever-ready to offer GOD praise. Many of the psalms we enjoy were recognized as being written by David, where he shows us how to praise GOD in all circumstances, situations, and conditions of life. Recall Psalms 34 – another selection credited to him, where he confidently composed these words: "I will bless the Lord at all times, His praise will continually be in my mouth;" or Psalm 9 where he wrote: "I will praise you, O Lord, with my whole heart; I will tell of all your marvelous works." Reading these poetic declarations, we can certainly see that there was something special going on between David and GOD! We can conclude that they shared a close, enduring, intimate relationship – yes, David knew GOD and but more importantly GOD knew David!

Our lesson will take a look at this psalm of praise by the author David and see how he weaves in the verses, this theme of praising GOD for what He does, and has done, and for who He is, as well as his encouragement of others to do the same in corporate praise.

This psalm is considered an acrostic poem – the verses begin with the sequential letters of the Hebrew alphabet. The psalm is also considered to be a hymn of praise to the Lord, the Great King. The theme of giving praise to our GOD is seen flowing in the language of the psalm; the writer also introduces the reasons we ought to praise GOD. We will note these in our study. Lastly, the NIV biblical commentary has pointed out that this is the only psalm where the Hebrew word for praise, "tehillah", is used as the title.
