## 1st Peter

## **Overview**

1<sup>st</sup> Peter is considered one of the General Epistles in the New Testament sections of the Bible. It was written by the Apostle Peter – around AD 64-65 from the city of Rome. (This location is identified in the final verses of 1<sup>st</sup> Peter: "Your sister church here in Babylon sends you greetings..." 5:13) As many scholars point out - Babylon was probably symbolic for Rome.

Peter wrote this letter to Christians living throughout the Roman territories as a source of encouragement and instruction. Many of the early believers had scattered to different regions of Rome to perhaps escape harassment and persecution by the Roman government; some of the locations where these believers were found were – Pontus, Galatia, Cappadocia, Asia, and Bithynia – regions that we now know as modern-day Turkey.

Of note – the believers Peter was also addressing were of Gentile cultures – remember Christianity had begun to spread beyond the borders of the Jewish nation, and here we find the Apostle reassuring and supporting these Gentile and Jewish believers to remain strong in the faith.

The backdrop to 1<sup>st</sup> Peter is like so many other letters we have in the Bible – to encourage Christians in their faith as they dwelt with the persecution and suffering, they faced under Rome rule. One commentator points out that "By about AD 65 the Christian faith had grown so dramatically that it was becoming a threat to the Roman Empire. Believers were feeling the first wave of persecution for their faith, and this seemed destined to grow stronger in the decades ahead.

The first epistle of Peter was written to encourage Christians in these trying times." (\*Bible Handbook – George W. Knight)

Peter would write in his letter to these believers that they were not suffering alone, and that there was the example of Jesus Christ who endured suffering that they could follow.

He encouraged the readers by telling them that Jesus' persecution, death, and eventual resurrection provided assurance and hope for the future. "For the basis of the believer's hope is Jesus Christ and His resurrection – for He alone provides salvation and the promise of eternal life." \*

As we read this letter of Peter, we get a sense that he is fulfilling the commands of Jesus – issued before the Ascension of Jesus, such as:

- a) Feeding and caring for the flock (the sheep and lambs)
- b) Go into all the world and teach all nations
- c) To preach salvation to Gentile's nations that God shows no partiality (Acts 10)
