Caesar, this would have


been Julius and not


Augustus who was reigning

at the time





The second would have been Phillip the son of Herod the Great who inherited the area rebuilt the ancient city and renamed it after Caesar and himself






Prior to that the Pre-Hellenist deity that was worshipped there was Ba'al-gad or Baal-Hermon






It is interesting to note that the Jesus raises this question in a place that was currently known by name of two other well-known personalities
