#### VILLAGE WALKS AND OFF-ROAD ROUTES FOR HORSE RIDERS

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It's no surprise that lockdown created a great deal of interest in the local walks and many have been well used in recent months. Council have decided to be more proactive about cutting and maintenance and to this

end have employed a contractor. All the Public Rights of Way have recently been cut and should be accessible – although nobody can stop the grass (and weeds) growing! To find your way around, for those not familiar with the network, the map on the wall of the Five Bells is a good starting point and there is

description of the walks on the map that can be seen on the new Parish Council website https://upwellvillagehall.co.uk/upwell-walks (This is the very new village hall website and is still being developed - at the time of writing not yet complete -ed.)

Otherwise, this link takes you to the NCC map, which also might be useful if you are going further afield over the summer: http://maps.norfolk.gov.uk/ highways/

On the NCC map there are 3 more tracks that can be found that are not on the Parish Walks site. These can be used on two feet or four and have recently been waymarked.

There are two allotment roadways almost opposite and either side of Marmont Priory Lock leading from March Riverside to Thurlands Drove. bv permission of Norfolk County Farms and with their agreement from




tenants. An advantage of these tracks is to avoid the blind bends on March Riverside. The third is Holly Tree Lane, which runs from opposite Lode Farm on Small Lode to the

junction of Chalk Road. Open to walkers and riders, there is a waymarker post at the

Lode Farm end and this track conveniently links up with the bridleway there that runs through to Bardyke Bank or via Tointons Road across to Green Road.

Farmers greatest concern is loose dogs and dog foul. Please keep dogs on leads and do not allow them to foul.

Dog foul in a crop can make it unfit for use. There are also penalties for anyone found to be allowing their animal to foul – anywhere. There has been a local prosecution recently. **Prue Lester** 





#### FROM THE CHAIRMAN

# Summer is upon us, although at the time of writing it seems like it may have finished last week!

Sadly since the last edition of the magazine **Meggan Mercer** has resigned from the Parish Council. I was very sorry to lose Meggan from the council, as our youngest councillor she brought a different fresh perspective to our discussions

and she was also excellent reorganising our website. She will be hard to replace and I want to take this opportunity to thank her for all her

efforts over the last two years, she is already being missed. As a result of Meggan's resignation a casual vacancy was advertised and more than ten parishioners indicated they would like to see an election called to replace her. We have a date for that **election**, **July 22<sup>nd</sup>**. The closing date for applications has passed and I believe there are two candidates. The powers and influence of parish councils is limited but they can do considerable good for the community if people with a genuine care for, and an interest in, the local community get involved.

On the same day there will also be a **local referendum** to vote on the Neighbourhood Plan that this council has put together. There is an article about this elsewhere in the magazine so I won't say much about it here other than the plan was informed by the feedback you gave the council when they asked you for your views a few years ago.

Congratulations to **Melanie Hilton**, our Parish Clerk. She has been working hard to gain her CilCa qualification which she has now achieved; this is a commendable effort as it is by no means an easy qualification to obtain and I know has involved her in a lot of extra work, well done Melanie. Now we have a clerk with that qualification we qualify to get what is known as a "General Power of Competence". This is a significant power and will enable the council to do a range of things previously we were barred from doing. As we learn more about this I will share with you what we intend to do.

As I mentioned in the previous magazine we have started supplementing what the County Council does to keep **public footpaths** passable. I hope you have noticed the improvement in several of the paths. There is also better signage now and a new path is being signed between March Riverside, near the lock, and Thurlands Drove, this isn't an official public footpath but the land owners have agreed to having the path signed and used.

The **Welle Tidy** group are doing great things reducing the litter in the parish and I am sure we are all grateful for their efforts; but you don't have to be a member to do your bit for the local environment. Pick up any litter you see around you as you walk through the village. If you have a dog make sure you pick up its poo: Upwell Parish has 12 dog waste bins located around the parish so there is no real excuse not to use them.

Finally, I wanted to congratulate **Upwell Town FC** on winning the Norfolk Primary Cup beating Watlington 3-2 in Norwich. it is great to see the playing field being used by a football team again and to see the pavilion finished with the beautiful tar mac surface running up to it. It would be grate if the **cricket team** could start again, the facilities are there, anyone out there keen to give it a go?

It has been a quiet few months for the Blunt Trust. We have received several enquiries about potential grants and one educational support grant application has been received. The local scout group are also being encouraged to apply for some support following their initial approach.

Please type this into your browser and have a look; it looks best on a screen larger that on your phone. The site has information about the trust, the nature walk and how to apply for grants. Remember the trust is exclusively for the benefit of the people of Upwell.

We have registered the charity with Amazon Smile. Anyone who uses Amazon can go to the Amazon Smile interface and register a charity which will receive a donation form Amazon whenever you spend money on the site. If you haven't already registered to support a charity on the site and would like to support the trust to help us maintain the Nature Walk, why not go to the Smile page and register our charity. On the Amazon system it is called "**The Blunt Family Charity**". Whenever you buy anything on Amazon, provided you access the online retailer through the Smile page, a small contribution will come our way.

The nature walk is looking much greener and we would be much more advanced with the facilities we want to install if it wasn't for the supply problems we have encountered with various materials. We have started putting gate furniture on the gates at either end and we are about to have constructed our educational centre in the orchard. This will be a threesided building with display boards inside and an area for children to sit and learn. We will be encouraging local schools and playgroups etc to come down and use the nature walk and educational centre to help teach local children about nature, ecology and even perhaps a little local history. There are two picnic tables which we hope to have installed this summer too. The raised bank around the hollow we use for burning has been seeded and has a good growth of grass

coming on it, the area around this has also had wild flower seeds scattered and we hope the area will look lovely in the not too distant future.

We will be having our first AGM later this year, Covid restrictions allowing. Tony Davies' term as trustee is up this year. He has indicated he will not be seeking reelection. Sadly Haidee Norman has also decided to step down due to the pressure of work not giving her the time to commit to the trust she would like. There will therefore be two trustee posts that need filling.

#### Well Creek moorings & fishing platforms

Now that 'no mow May' has passed, the Middle Level Commissioners, who are responsible for navigation of the Well Creek, have cut the banks. Once this is done it is more apparent just how many boat moorings and fishing platforms have been created over the years. Some of the earlier ones are in a very bad state of repair. Newer moorings are more substantial and are built mainly to MLC approved specifications. It is worth noting that moorings along the Well Creek need Borough Council Planning Approval <u>as well as</u> MLC approval. MLC will advise as to the type and size of platforms/moorings permitted.

When the banks are cut, the MLC are not responsible for strimming around the moorings and access steps; this is the responsibility of the owner (usually the home owner directly opposite a mooring with Riparian Ownership Rights). The tidiness of the banks and overall amenity is very often let down by those un-maintained moorings:- the Parish Council as well as residents would like to encourage owners to maintain their moorings: whether it is one you have had installed, or inherited as the result of buying an adjacent property. Likewise, if your mooring is falling into disrepair, it is advisable to have the structure removed if it is no longer required rather than create a hazard for future bank cutting and/or people. It is thought one of the expensive flail mowers used by the MLC received damage due to a bike being left on the bank and not being visible to the operative. This could also happen if a derelict mooring is overgrown. Comments from people who move into the village often reflect how pretty the Well Creek is; please help enhance this village asset by maintaining moorings, fishing platforms, & perhaps even giving those boats that never move a clean too.

### NORFOLK COUNTY COUNCILLOR CHRIS DAWSON

In May 2021 we had a flurry of local elections and Chris Dawson was elected to represent Marshland South in the Norfolk local elections. So we wanted to get to know a bit more about him....

Chris and his family have been associated with and lived in Emneth for over 50 years and he refers to himself as a 'Bowthorpe baby'. He attended the old infant school in the village and then onto Primary school, later attending the old Downham Market Grammar School.

He had been interested in politics and local politics for some time and became involved with the local Conservative Association, so getting further involved felt like a natural progression. Chris thinks that anyone putting themselves up for election, at whatever level, seeks to make a difference and given that Norfolk in the main is a Conservative county, he knew that the collective support would be there to provide a sound platform to make that difference.

Chris is now on two significant committees and he hopes to have additional profile to drive plans forward to

progress a broad examination of the Wash Road closures at Welney and to then focus similar resource to bank slippage matters on the Welle Creek. In addition Chris is looking to support any investment possible in the West of the county, particularly in support of business. He is also keen to explore more open access, pathways and the establishment of public areas incorporating a close association with ecology.

So Chris is going to be pretty busy but when time allows does like walking and gardening but his favourite activity is time with his grandchildren.

### What is a Parish Council in England?

Probably most think of something along the lines of 'The Vicar of Dibley' when a parish council springs to mind! And although it can have its lighter moments, as a rule we do not have to suffer lemon curd with marmite sandwiches! A Parish Council's duties are in general considerably more complex.

In medieval times the 'Feudal System' that flourished had more to do with military obligations which existed among the nobility. It all revolved around three key concepts of 'Lords, Vassals and Fiefs'! William the Conqueror introduced a stricter system which incorporated oaths of loyalty to the Monarch.

Thankfully, these days we have dispensed with the three concepts.

First formed under a Government Act in 1894, a parish council is a civil local authority of local government with variable tax raising powers and are responsible for areas known as civil parishes. It is the level of government closest to the community, with borough and county authorities above it in the hierarchy. The Parish Council is apolitical and councillors do not represent any political parties.

The responsibilities of a parish council are varied but can cover public health, public markets, street lighting, building regulations, footpaths, cemeteries, developing and reviewing council policy, as well as providing a focus for the local community to identify concerns and projects, and endeavour to solve them locally. On their own, parish councils have limited powers to make some decisions. However they do have ability to negotiate with and power to influence other organisations and higher councils that do make the final decisions. In this respect, parish councils are very powerful.

A Parish council is responsible for managing their own budget and is financed through the precept, which is an amount of money calculated as an estimate for the coming year and collected as part of your council tax. Parish councils can also apply for other funding such as grants and awards for certain projects.

Councillors are unpaid and elected to serve for four years. If a (casual) vacancy occurs and a minimum 10 residents on the electoral roll call for an election, this would be held at a cost of circa £2,000 to the Parish. To be considered for election you need to have occupied land or other premises for the previous 12 months or work in the parish or live within three miles of the parish boundary. Councillors can be co-opted which requires the candidate to write a brief resume and attend a meeting for an interview. The councillors will then take a vote and appoint the most suitable candidate.

As well as attending monthly meetings, Upwell Parish Councillors will be expected to partake in sub-committee groups covering local areas such as the cemetery, the war memorial, footpaths, health & safety, highways to name a few and sometimes make site visits if deemed appropriate. In addition, on-going training on a variety of subjects is actively encouraged and sometimes expected.



- *4.* New applications to vote by proxy (not postal proxy) at this referendum must reach the Electoral Registration Officer at King`s Court, Chapel Street, King`sLynn PE30 1EX by **5 pm on Wednesday 14 July 2021**.
- 5. Applications to vote by emergency proxy at this referendum on the grounds of physical incapacity or for work/service reasons must reach the ElectoralRegistration Officer at King's Court, Chapel Street, King's Lynn PE30 1EX by 5 pm on Thursday 22 July 2021. The physical incapacity must haveoccurred after 5 pm on Wednesday 14 July 2021. To apply on the grounds of work/service, the person must have become aware that they cannot go to the polling station in person after 5 pm on Wednesday 14 July 2021.

#### Outwell Fire Station - Norfolk Fire & Rescue Service

I hope this update finds you and your loved ones all fit, well and enjoying the start of our new found freedom during these lovely summer months, compared to that of the last 12 months or so.

You may have seen our appliance and crew out and about a lot more in recent weeks responding to emergency calls. Even though there is still some work to do to sustain 90% plus availability, we are now able to get considerably close. Because of this we have been able to respond to what would be our normal amount of emergency calls, helping those when they need it.

As a station we have attended a variation of incidents including RTCs, Out of control Fires In The Open, Building Fires as well as others including assisting other agencies gaining entry for the ambulance service.

Crew moral is back up now we are able to resume more training and attend courses that had been previously cancelled.

In the last month **FF's Jason Kent and Rowan Fox-Noble** have both passed their Initial Incident Command Course, their first step in becoming Incident Commanders. They have been the first students to attend a new format for this qualification, and have both worked hard to achieve this first step in preparation for their Operational Safety Critical Assessments (OSCA), practicals and writtens. Well done guys, you both deserve what you have achieved.

**FF Ben Lanchester** has been successful in passing his Gateway 1 Practical Assessments, which is the first step for him becoming a competent firefighter. Well done Ben, keep up the good work.

FF's Keith Game and Ollie Skeels will be attending their

Gateway 2 Practical Assessments in the next few weeks, which will hopefully enable them both to be signed off as competent Firefighters. **FF Duncan Perham** has this week attended his Breathing Apparatus in Structural Firefighting Course (BASF). This is refresher training as well as being assessed in real fire scenarios whilst wearing BA, at our Coltishall training centre.

Since my last report **FF Daniel Suckling** has studied for, attended and passed his

Intermediate Emergency Care Course, which trains us to be able to medically treat and preserve life in emergency situations. Well done Dan.

**FF's Duncan Perham, Keith Game and Daniel Suckling** are all now at varying stages of their fire appliance driver training, either preparing for their LGV Course, or their Emergency Fire Appliance Driver Course (EFAD), which teaches them road craft skills to be able to respond to incidents with blues and twos on.



In recent weeks there have been some serious RTCs on our roads and also bonfires that have got out of control and damaged neighbouring properties. So please stay safe, plan your journeys, allowing plenty of time. Also ensure you have suitable water supplies at hand should any bonfires get out of control. But remember, if in any doubt dial 999 as soon as possible.

At present even though some restrictions are easing, we are still limiting what visitors we have on station to those that are essential, so as to ensure crew safety and appliance availability.

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



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
