## **Upwell & Outwell Speedwatch Report.**

While I was writing this I heard about the RTA on Outwell Rd, Emneth at 1:30 on Thursday 16<sup>th</sup> November and could not help wondering if the driver was this person:

On the 25<sup>th</sup> September between 1:00 and 2:00 in the morning someone went past the Fixed Speed

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The week before the Camera was a bit further up towards Outwell on Town St: Here the recorded speeds were 75, 70, twice at 65 and 7 times at 60mph! Most of the rest of the cars travelling past were doing between 35 and 45mp! Town St does not have the monopoly, though: the week after speeds of 65, 70, 75 and 80mph were recorded on School Rd at various times, but fortunately not during school hours.

All this data has been sent to the Police. The new, expanded Upwell and Outwell Speedwatch team have also been out and about on a regular basis. In September 14 people were reported to the Police and in October 11 more speeders were reported. At the begining of November we expanded the team even further so in future will be out more often.

Just in case there is any confusion, throughout the whole of Outwell and Upwell the speed-limit is 30mph, with the exception of part of New Rd and Townsend Rd where the limit is 40mph.

The speed-limit through Three Holes is 40mph until you are past the bend beyond the Village Hall where it rises to 50mph. It stays at 50 right through Lott's Bridge until Lakes End where it drops back down to 40mph.

And to help you avoid becoming a statistic the map below shows the Road Traffic Accidents that have happened in the Outwell/Upwell area and been reported to the Police, over the past 5 years. So now you know where to pay extra attention when you are out driving!

Take care out there, and drive safely.

FROM THE **CHAIRMAN** 

Dear All,

Welcome to the winter edition of your community magazine, and on behalf of the members of the Parish Council may I offer you best wishes for Christmas and the New Year.

Neighbourhood Watch window stickers were distributed with the autumn magazine, but walking around the village it seems that a lot of them have not made it as far as your front window - or door.

Could I explain that the point of these is to make it clear to passers-by that there is a strong Neighbourhood Watch scheme working in the Parish. This, in itself, is a deterrent to crime. Jane Sutton from Coversure Insurance sponsored these stickers but the reason for her phone number on the back is not to advertise her business but to give you a handy place to find it should you want to report anything suspicious. She also administers the very successful Neighbourhood Watch Facebook page which is constantly updated with Police and crime related news. So please put your sticker in your window – and if you can't find it please let me know as I have spare copies. A final list of projects for the NCC Parish Partnership Scheme will be decided at December's Council meeting but making the yellow lines outside the school a mandatory 'no parking' zone is proving

problematic as is extending the 40-mph speed limit in Three Holes. Apparently, these matters require expensive alteration to the legal status quo which NCC Highways is not prepared to consider at this time. Agreed subject to final costings is the purchase of a new bus shelter for the bottom of Townley

Close and Council approved the purchase of a dot matrix warning sign to go on the Upwell side of the very dangerous bend on the A1101 at the Tointons/Green Road cross roads. Proedge Construction, who now operate their business from premises on the corner of Tointons Road have offered a substantial donation towards the cost of this sign as well as installing it at

their own expense. On behalf of all road users I offer sincere thanks. Turning right into Tointons Road travelling from Three Holes is very dangerous and this warning sign should improve safety there. These projects require NCC agreement, but I hope that they will be approved.

Neighbourhood Planning: Thanks to all of you who dropped into one of the sessions held recently in all 3 villages. Your agreement (or disagreement) with the various policy ideas on the displays and your comments has been noted and will become a part of the consultation base that is essential to producing a successful plan.

Emerging themes include a near desperate need for improvement, as soon as possible, to the broadband and mobile phone reception. Draft policies will now be written and there will be a further 6-week consultation period next year before the plan is submitted to KLWNBC. It is just possible that it will reach the final stage (a referendum) late next year.

A phone call from a resident about Remembrance Sunday has prompted me to ask if there are any other service men or women who lived in the Parish who have given their lives in armed conflict since 1945. The War Memorial records the names of those who died in WWI and WWII and the purpose of the ceremony held there every year is to commemorate them by reading the Roll of Honour. If you know of any person whose name should be added to both please contact me.

This leads me to ask for suggestions about ways to mark the centenary of the end of WWI which will be the 11th November next year. Once again please contact me with your ideas.

Closing with thanks to Cllr Bill Pugh who has edited this magazine as well as contributors, advertisers and the distributors.

## **ALLOTMENTS**

Upwell Parish Council has Garden Allotments in Stonehouse Road, Upwell. Amongst others, we currently

have a double sized plot which has been extremely well maintained and cropped over the years & is in good condition. There are grassed walkways around the planting areas which are now ready for clearing ready for Spring planting. We are sorry to see this tenant leave due to health grounds. This plot may be available immediately or in the early Spring. There are a number of other vacant plots, but due to them being vacant for a number of years they are not ready to plant & use without a degree of work & obvious cultivation & preparation. With this in mind, these plots are available rent free until April 2018, to enable prospective new tenants the chance to get them cultivated ready for use next Spring. The Parish Council does



it's very best to keep the vacant plots cleared of rubbish, but this is not always achievable on a regular basis, & it is disappointing to see some of the let plots not being used fully either. Annual rent costs are £7.50 for the single plots & £15.00 for the double plots, with a £50.00 deposit which is refundable upon vacating the plot in a clean and tidy condition. The Parish Council carries out regular inspections of the site to try to encourage tenants to keep their plots at least in a tidy condition if not fully cultivated & cropped. Perhaps with the continued rise in food prices, now would be a good time to consider the rewards in growing your own fruit & veg. combined with a bit of exercise & fresh air too. ## Are you Recycling properly?

My article in the last Parish Magazine about recycling in Upwell caused a bit of a stir, and several people contacted me with a wide range of views and opinions.

Since then, the Borough Council's waste & recycling advisers (Georgie & Carl) have been back twice to Upwell to see if there has been any improvement in the quality of recycling.

Apparently, Dovecote Road and Croft Road have improved, but there is still room for improvement in other areas such as School Road.

The advisers also reported that even though the original level of recycling was pretty good in Upwell, residents they'd spoken to in their visits had since improved their recycling considerably (along with their neighbours). Recycling is now separated out, cleaned, dried, and put in the recycling bin loose. That's exactly how it should be - well done!

Unfortunately, one or two people are still determined to recycle incorrectly, including a resident who wanted to continue dumping used cat litter in the green recycling bin (how would you recycle used cat litter?).

Overall, most people in Upwell are recycling, and are doing it consistently well. Those who are not, are now in a very small minority, which is great news.

The other big recycling news is that you no longer need to use compostable bags in your food caddies. New technology now up and running at the Anaerobic Digestion plant means that plastic bags are now stripped out, so it doesn't matter which plastic bags you use to keep your kitchen and kerbside food caddies clean and hygienic.

You can even use old supermarket carriers to line your kerbside caddy, and if you have any half-used plastic bags of unwanted salad or potatoes, you can now just put them straight into your caddy. All the plastic bags are stripped out, processed, and sent off to generate electricity.

Using plastic bags in your food waste caddies will also help to stop the food waste sticking to the sides. When this happens the crews have to bash the caddy on the side of the bin lorry to loosen the food waste, and inevitably this leads to damaged caddies that have to be replaced at extra cost to the recycling service (that we all pay for in our Council Tax).

As ever, I'm more than happy to listen to any comments or complaints about your bins, though the easiest way is to do it on the Council's website <a href="https://www.west-norfolk.gov.uk/yourbins">www.west-norfolk.gov.uk/yourbins</a> where it will be logged and processed.


The gardens seem to have done very well this year in spite of the seasons appearing to change from week to week. The roses and clematis seem to have done particularly well.

We have three vibrant library zones to help us develop a love of reading within our children. A successful bid to the local council has seen much needed funds being allocated to help us develop reading opportunities for pre-school children. My aim is to run story sessions for pre-schoolers, and help them become used to a school setting, or one larger than they currently attend.

### THE KAYAK IN THE WINDOW

If you have ever wondered about the display of vintage artefacts in the windows of the shop that used to be 'Bridehire', while taking down the British Legion poppy display, the new owner of the building told me a little abut them. Andy Nicholson understood when he bought the shop that to leave the window bare would look, in his own words, like a broken tooth on the high street. So to use the space and give passers by something of interest to look at he decided to display part of a collection that a friend had inherited from his father, who had been an Etymologist and travelled widely in Indonesia and East Africa. The objects in the small window represent his travels and the large one exploration. He must have been an intrepid explorer indeed if the kayak was his main means of transport!

The pump is a not-to-scale working representation of a 'Newcomen Atmospheric Engine' which was a type of steam engine used for draining mines amongst other things.

The sale notice was found walled up in the building by Nick and Rita Pritchard when they owned it but sadly the date is incomplete. Wednesday 20<sup>th</sup> September crops up about every 5 years so does anyone know when Watts Drapery closed down? If so, please let me know.

The conversation moved on to the days when the business there was 'Shopwell' and sold haberdashery, china and gifts. Once more if you have any recollections or photos please get in touch and they could go into the next issue of this magazine.

We have three 13 metre mats available which take up the full length of the hall, & even some limited spare sets of bowls so you don't have to worry about buying or having to bring your own. The group plays every Monday (usually excluding Bank Holidays) & Thursday afternoons from 2.00 till 4.00 & the cost is £3.00 per session with tea, coffee & biscuits included. The hall was packed with 36 stalls, the most we can accommodate, & over 500 people came through the doors. There was a queue for refreshments, which kept the kitchen staff on their toes all day. Exciting plans where mentioned at our last meeting to try & make this an even bigger event in the near future. Thanks to all the committee members, friends & family who helped out on the day.

The hall committee still has an ongoing maintenance plan, with some of the major work now being planned to take place in the early Spring next year, which will mean some disruption, but hopefully nothing like the A47! We hope to keep all events and hirings running whilst work takes place in the gents & ladies toilets & the total refurbishment of the committee room. The kitchen has now been fully repainted & is nice & clean & bright, the committee are applying for a Food Hygiene rating even though food is very rarely actually prepared on site, but it will give a reassurance to users as to the cleanliness of the facility. The old storage container at the rear of the hall has been given a new lease of life by having new doors fitted, as the original doors had become too difficult to operate. This container is used solely for the storage of spare tables, chairs etc. that are not in everyday use.

We are also in the process of setting up a wireless thermostat to control the heating, hopefully this will enable a more economical use of the heating oil whilst maintaining 24 hr heating of the hall during the winter to keep the damp at bay when the hall isn't in use. Previously the heating has had to be set manually meaning so there has been less control of when the heating is running.

The committee's next and final event of the calendar year is the New Years Eve dance, tickets and further details are available from Ros on 01945 773604. 200 Club tickets are now available from committee members, there is a list of winners from previous draws in this newsletter.

#### **NHW - NOVEMBER UPDATE**

Now that the clocks have changed and we are heading towards Winter once again it is important to protect your home and the things you care about.

Being the victim of a burglary is a truly horrible experience – to know that a stranger has been inside your home, amongst your precious possessions and taken things that mean something to you can be devastating for many victims. But we must bear in mind that most burglaries are opportunistic and many can be prevented. Burglars are lazy and would much rather get in through an open door or window.

The NHW community recommend using what is called the WIDE principal when looking at how to secure your home – and it is very simple.

- W Window locks on every window
- I Interior lights left on a timer when you're away
- Double or dead bolts fitted on doors
- **E** Exterior lights on a sensor

Taking these basic steps to protect yourself can offer 49 times more protection against burglary than homes without these measures. Households living within a Neighbourhood Watch area experience 21% fewer burglaries than similar households.

lt's also worth thinking about what you might do in the unlikely event of finding an intruder in your home. The advice is find somewhere safe to call the police on 999 and don't confront the intruder. Remember none of your possessions, however valuable, are worth more than your personal safety. #### WELLE CREEK DREDGING

Phase IV Well Creek Dredging (British Legion Footbridge, Upwell – Isle Bridge, Outwell) – plans are being finalised to undertake the fourth phase of channel clearing and de-silting works from the British Legion Footbridge to Isle Bridge, Outwell, commencing in January 2018. Approval has been sought from Norfolk County Highways for a contractor's long reach excavator to work for part of the proposed working length, along the A1101, as adjacent bank access from Lowside, Outwell is only partially available due to trees and residential garden areas adjoining the river. The proposed working length within the fourth phase is approximately 770m. The dredged material will be transported to the Commissioners' receiving site at Salter's Lode, where it will be left to dry sufficiently to be re-handled and re-used as bank raising material in the future.

### **UPWELL ST. PETERS CHURCH: IS IT WORTH BOTHERING ABOUT?**

St. Peter's church is very much alive, not only as a place for Sunday worship, but for marriages, blessings, baptisms, funerals and a wide range of other activities, including regular Messy Church events. Each year the visitor's book reveals quite a large number of people who visit the church just because they have a desire to make a connection with past family members, who themselves used the church, or because they too had participated in church activities when residing in the parish.

There is a timelessness about the church that encourages people to go just to say "thank you" and, where today we can still get that sense of connection to something far bigger than us. In the quiet of the church we can remind ourselves that the age old



For the church to be open for it's range of activities, a lot of time, money and effort is required. The Financial Statement reveals a total expenditure during 2016 of £28,858. The church building, like many of us, is suffering the "aches and pains of age" that needs regular attention and treatment. During 2016 the required 5th yearly architectural survey of the whole structure, revealed the need for substantial repair and renovation work at a considerable price tag. The church's Fabric Fund balance being woefully below the total amount required. Thus fund raising continues to be a priority.

Those of us who are actively involved in the day to day running of the

church believe there are many residents within the parish that do indeed feel the church really is "worth bothering about," and would be willing to assist in some manner, whether or not they actively participate in any activities. There are two ways in which help can be given.

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
