THE SISTERHOOD

This was started in 1938 by Mrs. Wanless, the wife of the Minister at the time, and initially had a membership of 35 ladies. Its purpose was to provide a place where ladies could meet once a week for fellowship – a social afternoon – which is still the case today, but with a few variations. Speakers are still invited and tea is still served over which the ladies can exchange news and enjoy a chat, but certain aspects of the fellowship have disappeared with the passage of time. One lady used to provide a 'pedlar's tray' filled with various bits and pieces that the others could buy. There was also, until a few years ago, an auction sale which was good fun and, like the pedlar's tray, helped to boost the Sisterhood's funds.

The main benefit of the group is to provide companionship for those who might otherwise be lonely, and the ladies meet occasionally for meals – always a dinner in the summer and a lunch to celebrate the Sisterhood's anniversary. They don't all come from Upwell; some are from Outwell, Lakesend and even Welney, though transport for these members is an ongoing problem. All birthdays are remembered with a card and a pretty handkerchief; and special birthdays are marked with a bouquet of flowers.

The above information was provided by Margaret Barnard, who has been a very enthusiastic member of the Sisterhood for the past twenty five years, making her the longest serving member at the moment. Among her contributions is the provision of the birthday cards and hankies and, when anyone is ill, she visits them – something she thinks is very important. She has been the Chairman but is currently Secretary and Treasurer, quite a responsibility. The Chair is now held on a rota basis by six people.

Up to 1981 the meetings were still held once a week, but since then, owing to a drop in membership and the difficulty of getting speakers, they now take place fortnightly on Thursdays at 2.30 pm from September through to May when they close for the summer. The membership currently stands at 19, but Margaret stressed that new members are always welcome. As well as socialising, the ladies like to contribute to the Church and gifts over the years have included teaspoons, pulpit carpet, tablecloths, cups and saucers, organ screen and aisle carpet with the most recent purchase being a sound system. They also decorate a windowsill in the Church at Christmas and on other special occasions and, although others would be willing to do this, the task often falls to 'Barney' as she lives close by and enjoys doing it.

Barney made a promise to Mary Hancock that she wouldn't let the Sisterhood go and honouring that promise is very important to her. She hopes it will continue for a long time into the future and I'm sure all the current members hope so too.

Welcome to the winter edition of the Community Magazine.

First of all I would like to lay a rumour to rest! The previous edition of this publication was delivered with a serious printer's error, which they corrected at their own expense and delivered a second batch as soon as they could. The pile of magazines

that were put out for recycling were the first batch and not as has been suggested a thousand spare copies that were being thrown away! The advertising covers the printing costs and this magazine costs the Parish Council little or nothing.

Some good news: Norfolk County Council Highways are due to start resurfacing the footpath on Town Street from the shop to Newbridge in the week commencing 10th January. This date will be subject to the weather of course and any over runs that it may have caused on previous jobs, but at least we have a date and can look forward to being able to walk it without tripping over. We understand that all the new footpaths are to be constructed shortly, including the one at the bottom of Lowside. The Parish Council will make a decision about the LED Streetlights at our December meeting. We have delayed doing so in order to be able to visit other villages where they have already been installed and so have a better understanding of what they will really be like if we have them put in here. The N.C.C. Parish Partnership budget for the current year has been reduced from a million pounds to £200,000 with only 50% funding on offer, and bids for further LED streetlighting will not be accepted so it has been decided that it is not practicable to put in a bid for a different project in this financial year.

With great regret I have to tell you that the Cobley family, including our Clerk, Kate, have had to move away from the area for family reasons. Kate will continue to work remotely for the Council in the short term and we are expecting our Assistant Clerk, Kate Bennett, to take over from her in the New Year. Kate has been a wonderful asset to the Council and the Community for many years and she will be much missed. Those of you who used to contact her on her home number will realise that it has been disconnected. However the messaging service on 01945 774272 will continue to be monitored every day and her email address remains the same.

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Well Creek Trust News Autumn 2013

The Well Creek Trust has been active once again this autumn on behalf of the community and for the enhancement

of our local environment. The major project of refurbishing the Salter's Lode Visitor Moorings at a cost to the Trust of £2333 was finalised in



November – see picture of new safety-decked moorings. The Trust provided the materials and the Middle Level Commissioners provided the labour to complete the work. This attractive improvement to the mooring facility will present a welcome to visiting boats from the Ouse upon first entering our local waterway as well as a much needed safe facility for all users.

Another project is planned over the winter period to replace local information boards at the lock moorings, Upwell Church mooring and Outwell Basin, providing information for visiting boaters on local amenities and places of interest. These will be encased weather-proof aluminium at a cost of around £500.

Upwell Church moorings are continually being improved aesthetically and the floral display this year has been much commented on by both visiting boaters and local people. It provides an attractive leisure facility in the heart of the village.

The Trust also undertook its annual task of bulb-planting on 23 November with volunteers augmenting the already wonderful displays with additional planting. The Trust carefully selects those areas which are identified by photographs in the spring as needing some supplements and where practical annually undertakes this task. We know it is very much appreciated as well as widely photographed by many. See photograph of a few of this year's volunteer team.

other creepy crawlies before examining them with magnifying glasses. The Cubs then made plaster casts of leaves they had also collected and recycled plastic pop bottles into bird feeders. The following weeks we assembled some insect houses, which resembled small open fronted bird boxes filled with cut up garden canes. These looked really good and should provide shelter for lots of garden insects.

On October 2nd the Cubs worked on their Home Safety Badge. The requirements for this badge aren't too extensive so we were able to do it in just one evening. The pack split into sixes moving round a series of bases, one looking at dangers in the kitchen by going in there and spotting lots of pre-arranged dangers. Trailing extension leads, matches left open, paint and thinners, saucepans with handles hanging over the edge of the cooker, knives and chemicals and bleach left where they shouldn't be. We then held a fire drill with all the Cubs mustering outside when the bell was sounded. The rest of the evening we made some safety

The following two weeks Phil Shepherd, Ray Lamaca and Richard Bradley from the Peterborough Astronomical Society visited us for the Astronomer Badge. Ray set up a large telescope in the car park with which we were able view the moon, and there was plenty of gasping from the Cubs when they had their turn. Phil and Richard stayed in the hall to give a talk on comets, the planets, solar eclipses, constellations and how to find the Pole Star. On week two we started by making models of the solar system with polystyrene. Phil set up a real time projector and we had our own planetarium in the hall. This was amazing to see as you could not only zoom in and out to see the different stars but fast forward it to different times of the night or weeks of the year. Phil and his team really put on a great show for the Cubs.

We held our conker championship at the end of October, with the Cubs competing for the coveted prize of the "gold conker" The sad thing was so many of the Cubs hadn't ever played conkers before. Congratulations to Alfie Cook for winning this year's competition.

The following week was a games evening with the Cubs making and laminating a snakes and ladders board before sitting down to play this classic game. On November 13 we looked at traditional Scouting skills with the Cubs being given a length of rope and instructions on 6 basic knots and lashings.
