ANNUAL REPORT

This report, to be presented at the annual Parish Assembly on April IIth, marks the end of the 4 year tenure of the Parish Council in its present membership. It is pleasing to report that, in the 4 year period, there has been only one change in the personnel serving on the Council. David Barnard resigned from the Council in March and Brian Carr was co-opted onto the Council to fill the vacancy created. The fact that 12 councillors remained in continuous service over the whole period meant that there was a continuity in all the numerous discussions and deliberations undertaken, and attendance at meetings was in the main extremely regular. Interestingly, where it had in the past sometimes proved difficult to recruit people willing to give up the time and effort necessary to serve, no fewer than 7 applicants put themselves forward for this one vacancy. This is obviously an indication of a growing interest in parish and community affairs, but it is also reassuring in that we now know that 3 of the present councillors have decided not to put themselves forward for election this time around. It is all the more important that parishioners participate in the election on May 5th, and that proper consideration is given to the choices to be made on that day. Equally important in terms of continuity and uninterrupted service is the ongoing presence of both the Parish Clerk, Kate Cobley, and our Assistant Clerk, Kate Bennett. Both have given sterling service to the Council, having established a sound and confident knowledge of the tasks to be undertaken, and the many contacts which need to be made in order for proper and efficient cooperation can be established with the principal councils and the numerous agencies and companies with which the Council does

The Council's meeting structure of one full council meeting plus 3 committee meetings per month has proved to be sound and contacts necessary between meetings are normally facilitated by e-mails and or telephone. All meetings are carefully minuted and careful records are kept of correspondence, and contacts with the agencies mentioned above. All financial transactions are recorded in appropriate detail, and are subject to a full external audit. This has always been fully approved. These matters. together with the quarterly production of our popular newsletter, have contributed to our retaining our status as a Quality Council, which is an indication to our parishioners that this Council's business and conduct are all that they should be, as certified by the National Association of Town and Parish Councils.

The currently serving councillors are well aware of the need to keep abreast of community affairs and concerns, and for this reason various members of the Council are also involved with many local groups, societies and clubs. Much additional voluntary work has been carried out on, for instance the War Memorial garden, the Community Garden at the back of the hall and the flower beds at the front. Volunteers have been out gritting difficult areas during the really cold weather, and two of our councillors have given of their own time and effort to repair the railings along Town Street, so that these are once again safe and attractive as a village feature. Likewise bus shelters have been repaired and restored to acceptable standards. Excellent use has been made of the Community service teams, under the guidance of the designated councillor who is highly experienced in this area and who knows the supervisors on a friendly and productive level. The Council owns this village hall, and is particularly grateful to the volunteers who form the Village Hall Management Committee, for their continuing work in ensuring that the hall and its contents are maintained to a high standard, and for directing, through the Hall manager, a highly varied and pleasing programme of activities, events and hirings. The Council's declared wish is for the hall to be at the centre of village and community activities and a glance through the list of hall usage

contained in the current Council

newsletter will provide a good working idea of the pattern of use in any given week. The Council also actively supports the Playing Field Committee in its endeavours and we retain the hope that that committee will one day achieve its cherished ambition to replace the old pavilion with a purpose built new building.

Communication with our parishioners is most important, and the aforementioned newsletter has done much to enhance the knowledge of what the Council does and how it works. We also have a Council website, and the three Council notice boards are kept up to date with dates of meetings, minutes and other relevant information. It may be for this reason that public attendance at Council meetings is rare, but it is worth underlining that these are public meetings, with a time slot allocated for members of the public to ask questions or speak on any relevant matter. The forthcoming elections will be something of a test of the level of interest in and support for your new Parish Council, and I cannot underline too strongly the importance of registering your vote on May 5th, and thus offering those who volunteer for these unpaid duties a clear token of that support.

Farewell!

Although the new Council will not meet until May 9th, this will be the last newsletter for which I shall be the Editor and the last of my 8 years on the Parish Council. Having occupied the Chair since 2005, I have many memories of the ups and downs of those years, but I shall be leaving the Council feeling secure in the knowledge that its meetings format and its formal business procedures are all that they should be. The spirit of our councillors is strong and positive, and I am confident that new members elected will be warmly welcomed and carefully introduced into the work of this, the 3rd tier of local government. I take this opportunity to thank my fellow councillors for all their support and encouragement over the years, and I also add my thanks to the many residents who have also offered support, particularly with regard to our newsletter. I shall leave with some regret, but advancing years and a number of medical issues have persuaded me that it is time to hand over the helm to a new Chairman, and a new councillor. hopefully full of energy and ideas! I shall remain as an active Chair of

the Village Hall Committee, and I have offered to lend a hand with future newsletters as a community contributor, should such help be wanted.

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Parish Council Elections

All parishes rely

on local residents volunteering to stand as parish councillors to make the community a better place to live and work. The local elections on 5th May are being held across the Country for parish and district councillors

Could I Be A Parish Councillor?

Any interested resident can stand as a parish councillor. You do not need to have any experience of local government and do not need to have, or state, a political allegiance. You do need to be nominated by two parish residents and submit a nomination form to your district council by noon on 4th April.

To stand as a parish councillor candidate you must:

- Be a UK or Commonwealth citizen, or a citizen of the Republic of Ireland, or a citizen of another European Union

 member state
- Live in, or within three miles of, the parish or your principle place of work is in the parish.
- Be aged 18 or over.

It is also helpful if you have an interest in local issues, an understanding and willingness to represent the views of the whole community, are able to attend monthly evening meetings and have an interest in learning and developing your role in the Community.

Why Should I Be A Parish Councillor?

There are many reasons for becoming a parish councillor. Most people become parish councillors because they want to improve the local environment and the quality of life in the area. There is a great deal of satisfaction that comes from making a real difference in your local community. Other benefits include meeting new people and building new friendships, as well as becoming more active in the community

What Do I Do Next?

To stand as a parish councillor candidate you must submit a nomination form to your local District Council by 4th April. You can request a nomination form from your local Parish Clerk or the Electoral Services department at Borough Council of Kings Lynn & West Norfolk: by phone or through the website (www.westnorfolk.gov.uk)

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Spring is around the corner and we are leaving our busiest time of the year at the health centre. The incidence of viral respiratory illness, especially, in winter always makes it a busy time. During and just after Christmas it looked like we were heading for another swine flu epidemic with the number of cases rising rapidly but then the infection rate plateaued and dropped and now we are back to normal incidence levels. There was a lot of media coverage about the apparent shortages of flu vaccine at the time. At the surgery we held our campaign as usual in October but had plenty of vaccine left going into December. There was, of course, a clamour for the vaccine again around Christmas and we did use up all our stocks around then. However, we still have single valent swine flu vaccine in stock, and since this was the variety of influenza virus causing the majority of infections it was suitable for anyone who had not received it the previous year. At present the government have not announced any changes to the system for administering flu vaccine this autumn so mark it in your diaries and calendars now; we will be starting with the 2011/12 vaccine in October again. We will announce the dates of the Saturday morning sessions on our website and in the local magazines as usual.

Mention of the website brings me to some news. I have been conscious for some time that our website was looking tired and over the last few weeks we have been putting the finishing touches to a new one. It can be found at

www.upwellhealthcentre.nhs.uk And there will also be a re-direction from the old website address to the new one. I urge you to go and have a look at the new site. It allows for much more interaction than the previous one; you can register, cancel appointments and book tele-

phone consultations on it as well as making appointments and ordering repeat prescriptions, which have been the only options up to now. There is also a lot about the services we offer and quite a lot of health information. You can also register to get newsletters from the practice from time to time. Go on have a look. It is now six months since Dr.Millard retired and his patients have been seeking out a new doctor from among the rest of us left behind. This has meant that some of the patients who have been regulars with the rest of us have been finding it more difficult to get appointments. Just a pointer for everyone; Dr.Haine actually replaced Paul Millard as a partner at the surgery. However, she already had a following of her own having been with us for some years. The new doctor in the practice Vineet Bhardwaj is no stranger to us having spent two six month periods with as a registrar during his GP training. I can thoroughly recommend him to any Dr. Millard patients' still to find a new home.

I am sure a lot of you have been wondering what, if any, impact the government proposals to involve GP's in commissioning services for patients will have on you and the services we offer at Upwell. I am hoping you will see very little difference in the day to day operation of the surgery. However, it is to be hoped that we will see an improvement in the care you receive in hospitals. Unfortunately the changes are coming with a considerable handicap. Although the government have promised to increase NHS funding the squeeze on public spending is very apparent in the NHS. The continuing advances in medical science, especially new drugs and procedures, the aging population, the increased use of more and more sophisticated investigations and the fact that we are doing more than ever to actively prevent disease means that there are going to have to be many economies

made in the NHS
that will affect general practice. The
pressure for us to
spend less on drugs
has been racked up
for some time and
we are always pressurised to prescribe
the cheapest version
of a drug when more

than one type is available. Some of you in the past have complained when we have done this and on occasions you may have been given the more expensive version as a result. In future this is increasingly less likely to happen. If a cheaper version does not suit you it is likely we will try another cheaper alternative rather than prescribe the expensive brand. There is only so much money to go around and it cannot be spent twice so I urge you not to complain if this happens to you it is just another example of the economies we all have to make in the face of huge cuts in overall government spending. This lack of money will mean GP Commissioning will be more difficult than it could have been; I liken it to fighting with one hand tied behind your back. However, GP's are well placed to decide the priorities that will benefit most people. However, there will undoubtedly be many special interest groups who will feel hard done by after these difficult decisions have been

Locally the process to form a GP commissioning consortium is progressing well. The current West Norfolk Practice Based Commissioning Consortium has formed a new grouping, as yet unnamed, elections for the executive of which will take place this month. This group will include the

GP's are well placed to decide the priorities that will benefit most people.

Wisbech practices as well as those currently in West Norfolk and our practice will be putting forward someone for election to the group. As yet it is too early to say more but there should be a lot more news in the next newsletter.

I am looking forward to seeing the daffodils bloom again along the Well Creek but don't get too close to them; they can cause an awful rash!

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New Public Mooring At Three Holes

At the last meeting of the Parish Council, members heard that a proposal was being put forward by the IWA (Inland Waterways Association) to build a public mooring at Three Holes bridge. The IWA is a national charity working to promote the use, maintenance and restoration of waterways and carries out practical projects to enhance rivers and canals across the country.

The proposal was put to the Parish Council's Finance Committee at the start of March. It heard that , while the IWA would fund the £8-£10,000 project, it would be looking to the Parish Council to take on the ongoing insurance and maintenance liabilities. In return it would gift the land and moorings to the Council on completion.

The Parish Council will debate the proposal at its next full meeting on 11th April, which is being held after the Parish Assembly. If you have any comments or queries, please do not hesitate to get in touch with the Clerk or come to the meeting to find out more.

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A Referendum on AV

When you go to vote at the Local Elections on 5th May, you will also be asked to vote in the referendum to change the system for electing MPs in this country. Here is a guide to the issue.

What will the referendum be about? It will ask the public whether they want to replace the existing first-past-the-post system for electing MPs to Westminster with a method known as the alternative vote.

What is the current voting system? For Westminster elections, it's first-past-the-post. The candidate who gets the most votes in their constituency is elected as the MP.

Why do critics want the way MPs are elected changed? They say too many votes are effectively wasted under the current system, with elections decided by a small number of voters in a handful of seats where no single party has a large majority. This discourages people from voting and makes them disengage with the political process. A key weakness of first-past-the-post, they say, is that two thirds of MPs are now elected with less than 50% of support of voters and this undermines democracy. They argue a different system will provide voters with more choice, force candidates to appeal to a broader section of the public and work harder to get elected.

How is alternative vote different? The alternative vote - widely referred to as AV - system sees voters rank candidates in order of preference in single constituencies. People can nominate as many preferences as they like. Only first preference votes are counted initially. Anyone getting more than 50% of these is elected automatically. If that doesn't happen, the candidate with the fewest votes is eliminated and their second choices allocated to the remaining candidates in a second round of voting. If one candidate then has more than 50% of the votes in this round they are elected. If not, the remaining candidate with the fewest votes is eliminated and their second

preferences (or third preferences if they were the second choice of someone who voted for the first candidate to be eliminated) reallocated. This continues until one candidate has 50% or more of the vote in that round of voting.

What do opponents of the change say? Defenders of the current system say it generally leads to stable government and has historically reflected the will of the public in that unpopular governments have been voted out. They argue that first-past-the-post is straightforward and easy to understand. They say parties get elected on a manifesto and are expected to implement it, while under other systems more likely to produce indecisive outcomes, the government is decided after the election by horse-trading and "political fixes".

Why is a referendum being held? A referendum on the alternative vote was not included in either the Conservative or Lib Dem election manifestos. However, the Conservatives - who largely oppose changes to the system - conceded a vote on AV as part of their offer to the Lib Dems in negotiations to form a government after the election. The Lib Dems have long urged changes to the voting system and although the AV system is not their preferred choice, they believe it is a first step towards a fairer system.

Is the alternative vote system proportional representation? No. Parties could still form a government with less than 50% of first choice votes. Campaigners such as the Electoral Reform Society want a proportional system where the number of seats a party wins is more closely aligned with the number of votes they get. For many years, the Lib Dems have supported the more proportional single transferable vote system.

What if I only want to vote for one candidate? If someone votes for just one one candidate under AV, their vote will be counted once in each round that takes place. But any further preferences they could have stated will not be taken into account.

When will the referendum take place? It will take place on 5 May 2011, the same day as elections to the Scottish Parliament, the Welsh Assembly, the Northern Ireland Assembly and local elections in many parts of England. Holding it then will save money as voters are already going to the polls across much of the UK, the government says.

What question will voters actually be asked? The government proposed the following question: Do you want the United Kingdom to adopt the "alternative vote" system instead of the current "first past the post" system for electing Members of Parliament to the House of Commons? Yes or no? In September, the Electoral Commission recommended the question be redrafted to make it "easier to understand". It said the public had a "limited understanding" of the voting systems they were being asked to decide between and this should be clarified. It suggested this revised version: At present, the UK uses the 'first past the post' system to elect MPs to the House of Commons. Should the 'alternative vote' system be used instead'? Yes or no?

When will the outcome be known? The election is overseen by the Electoral Commission. Votes will begin to be counted at 16.00 GMT on 6 May, the day after the poll. The outcome of the referendum is expected to be known later that evening.

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Since many people are alone when they suffer a heart attack, without help, the person whose heart is beating improperly and who begins to feel faint, has only about 10 seconds left before losing consciousness. However, these victims can help themselves by coughing repeatedly and very vigorously. A deep breath should be taken before each cough, and the cough must be deep and prolonged, as when producing

sputum from deep inside the chest. A breath and a cough must be repeated about every two seconds without let-up until help arrives, or until the heart is felt to be beating normally again. Deep breaths get oxygen into the lungs and coughing movements squeeze the heart and keep the blood circulating. The squeezing pressure on the heart also helps it regain normal rhythm. In this way, heart attack victims can get to a hospital.

Tell as many other people as possible about this. It could save their lives! A cardiologist says that if everyone who reads this tells 10 other people, you can bet that we'll save at least one life.

Eastern Counties Bus Depot At Three Holes

The Eastern Counties Bus Garage opened in 1935. The late Edna Dalton remembered the garage being built by labourers who lodged at the RED HART, looked after by Mrs. Fiske.

It housed at least 6 single and double deckers. There was a frequent and regular bus service to Wisbech. Some of the buses collected passengers from Welney and Lakes End first and then from the villages on the way to Wisbech. Three Holes, Upwell 'round the town' as it was known. Outwell, Downham Road side, Emneth, Elm High Road finishing at the Horsefair.

During the second world war the drivers were all male but there were female conductors. I went to the Wisbech High School in 1943 and remember the horrific iourneys we had for a week or two before it was decided that

more buses were needed. The single deck buses were then what were known locally as Cattle Trucks. The seats were all arranged around the sides so that more people could stand in the middle. As I got on the bus at Three Holes I and my friend Evelyn Goose had a seat but long before we got to Wisbech the bus was so jam packed that the conductor could just get inside the door. It was impossible to collect any fares. It was so hot and stuffy many people felt ill. Fortunately this did not go on for too long and eventually there was a separate bus for the High School, often a Double Decker, another for the Boy's Grammar School and the Con-

vent Girls and a general service for people going to work.

The late Audrey Carnson remembered in 'Three Holes: Portrait Of A Village',was last off one morning, having been one of the first to get on, and she counted 109 passengers off the single deck bus. How times have

changed.!!!

The garage was used for Three Holes Jubilee celebrations in 1936, when a stage was erected at one end for a concert of local talent in the evening.

The Methodist Sunday School also had their Anniversary services in the garage, but this was stopped during the war as the buses were not allowed to park outside over night.

The garage closed in 1985 and was sold to Mr Mark Hempson who carries on a scrap cars business.

New Hair Salon For Upwell

The shop in Lister's Road had once been a hairdresser's – it said so on the window – but it had stood empty for ages, the shutters down and no sign of life. Then one day, in the course of my daily walk, I noticed that the shutters were up and there was life beyond the glass. I was intrigued enough to step inside and so impressed by the bright, colourful interior that I made an appointment.

Cassie Golding, the owner, is a local girl who lived in Barroway Drove and went to school in Downham Market. After a short spell in Sixth Form College she left to follow the only career path she had ever wanted and became apprenticed to a hairdresser in King's Lynn where she did most of her training in the salon working with the owner. Cassie looks back on this time

as the most valuable experience she could have had as she was fortunate



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enough to be the only apprentice and therefore received one to one tuition. This enabled her to complete a two year course in fourteen months, followed by a year doing level three after which she was qualified and able to

start building up a client base.

She remembers with gratitude the amount of attention that Chris, her boss, was able to give her and cites this as the reason she had enough confidence to start up her own business after only five years. She had helped him to move to much larger premises where the staff of two became twelve,

"I was his 'right hand man,' and had I not done that I wouldn't have been able to do what I'm doing now."

Cassie took over the salon last June and feels a connection with this particular shop as she is related to the previous owners and remembers coming here to have her hair cut as a little girl. Her family are obviously delighted with what she has achieved and have been very supportive, her dad doing all the work necessary to make the place habitable again, including the decorating. Cassie acknowledges that without him it wouldn't have happened and laughs when she recalls the arguments they had about the name. As he

Gilbert & Sullivan Society's New Production—Iolanthe

The Society had its origins back in 1970, when a lady by the name of Audrey Carnson, already running a youth club with her husband, decided to move from performances for concert parties to the more ambitious project of a G. and S. operetta, - specifically H.M.S.Pinafore. This set a tradition which, 41 years later is still very much alive and well, with a keen and dedicated membership, consisting not only of the performers, but also a strong supporting group of helpers who undertake many of the tasks associated with stage and house management etc. The Society stages a full Gilbert and Sullivan production every spring, and with one exception has done so for all of those 41 years. Obviously, with the passage of years, the Society's membership will have had many changes, but, remarkably, 2 of the original group members from 1970 remain to this day. Pat Askew, who now acts as Social Secretary, is one of these long serving members, and missed only 3 productions in the early 1970's when at university. The second of these, Peter Calver, has been in every single production, always taking a leading role, right up to this day. Peter is the current Chairman of the Society, which obviously owes much to his presence, encouragement and example. In the meantime some members have left, some have joined, and some have left then rejoined! The shows have been produced in a variety of venues over the years, including Upwell Village Hall, a youth club building which used to stand behind that hall, the Angles Theatre in Wisbech, the now demolished Upwell secondary School, and the present venue St. Andrew's Methodist Church in Outwell. As well as the major productions, the Society stages a Christmas Concert and entertains at various events and functions throughout the year. For its $40^{\mbox{\tiny th}}$ anniversary last year, the Society performed H.M.S. Pinafore again, celebrating with the same operetta as when it all began in 1970. In 1971 the production was of lolanthe,, so that the current production is also a 40 year commemoration. In fact this will be the 5th time that Iolanthe has been performed over the years, and most of Gilbert and Sullivan's works have been similarly staged on a regular basis. Society members still have a strong feeling of being indebted to the late Audrey Carnson and her husband, and describe her as their founder and "a remarkable woman!" New members are always welcome, and anyone interested should attend a weekly photographs show the cast of the very first production of lolanthe in 1971.

Community Service At Work In Upwell

It is some 10 years since I became involved with the Community Service Team in Upwell. Community Service was first introduced into the Village by ex Parish Council Clerk, Barrie Myhill, a retired police Inspector for Norfolk Constabulary back in the 1990s.

Their help in maintaining various parts of the village has been invaluable over the years. Projects have included clearing rubbish from the Welle Community Gardens, maintenance of Upwell cemetery and St. Peter's Churchyard, painting the skate park, realigning the children's play area fencing, erecting the posts in the Playing Field car park to stop joy riders from speeding around the car park, painting fencing in front of Upwell village hall, cutting trees, strimming the 'brink' in the field and clearing litter from the dyke around the playing field and Health Centre car park.. One particular clearance of the dyke around the playing field filled 6 black bin bags with carelessly discarded litter.

When time permits the Playing Field committee usually work

alongside the Community Service team. The lads and lasses are normal people. Yes, they have been in trouble with the law that is why they are on CS, but it could be anyone's son or daughter, mother or father etc, it is not aimed at anyone particular element of society or age bracket. I am not allowed to ask what offences have been committed but if they wish to tell me, then that is up to the individual. Meeting with them and talking to them on a regular basis is a learning curve for anyone. I find them to be polite, jovial and most of them wanting to get the job in hand done, work their hours and finish CS. Many are very proud of what they have achieved on the pro-

Groups vary from 6 – 9 offenders or, if we are extremely lucky, we may get two groups, which is always a bonus for the project in hand at the time. Upwell Playing Field pavilion is their base unless we have a really cold snap when the pavilion water pipes freeze and the Church steps in to fill the gap for toilets and refreshments.

The latest project has been to rejuvenate the St. Peter's Church Millennium Garden, created by the late John Medlock. The garden had become untidy and rubbished up and a suggestion put forward by community Service Team Supervisor, Nathalie Bullock, early last year has now come to fruition. The old grave stones that been propped up against the churchyard wall or lying stacked flat for a number of years, have now been laid in the garden to make a feature. New gravel has been supplied by the Church committee, timber and paint has been donated, and equipment borrowed to move the grave stones, some of which are very large and ornate. A bench has been donated by the Parker family has been renovated by one young CS person; who took great pride in sanding it all down and applying teak oil. It was deeply upsetting that local youths had already damaged the bench before renovation. A second bench in the churchyard will be renovated over the next few

Parts of the churchyard were that overgrown it was difficult to see anyone walking through. There were dangerous, large rabbit burrows and graves so covered in rubbish that they were unable to be seen. Now it is the best I have seen it look in years. Anyone researching family history will hopefully be able to find the right graves, although there is still more to be done. Have a walk into the Churchyard and see for your self.

So...if you see CS in the village at the Church, Cemetery, Playing Field or cleaning bus shelters, street benches etc., do not scowl at them or walk on the other side of the road. Stop and have a chat, they do not bite!

Five Bells — Under New Management!



Sitting as it does more or less at the centre of Upwell, the 'Bells' inevitably catches the eye of those driving through or simply out and about their

business in the village shops. Observers will have noted the most obvious recent change, in that the exterior walls have been painted in gleaming white. Those who have ventured inside will have noted immediately that a £20,000 makeover has transformed the pub for the better, Here, too, new paint is in evidence, and the floor now boasts its older oak rather than a rather tired carpet. The tables are no longer sticky to the touch, and the ceiling has been re-plastered, so that the rather threatening patched up hole has disappeared, - hopefully forever! To the regular customer, certain other changes will become evident, including, for examples, lit candles on the tables of an evening.

So, what has happened? Well, back in October, a new company took over the lease, and a new Manager put in place, by the charming Irish name of Mary Heggarty. The company is known as S.D.M.R.Ltd, and

the overall Director is Raghu Kodakandala. This company has taken over and transformed a number of pubs and hotels in East Anglia, including the Ostrich at Castle Acre, the Wenns and the Leziate Yacht Club both at King's Lynn, and it appears that further changes and improvements are planned for the Five

the pub restaurant, meals are now served from 12 noon to 3.0 p.m. and evening meals from 6.00 p.m. to 9.30 p.m., Monday to Saturday. Sunday carvery is available from noon until 6.00 p.m., alongside the everyday menu. Promised also are special lunch-time deals and a 2 for £10 deal Monday to Thursdays.

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Bells. Most staff have been retained, but. new members have also been appointed. There is, for example, a new chef, called Jacob, who proposes to produce a different style of menu, and also to arrange a buffet menu for anyone who is planning a celebration. Jacob previously worked at Knight's Hill hotel in Kings Lynn. A new Bar Manager, who we believe is

called Gilly, should arrive soon, transferring from The Wenns. The Village Hall bar is looked after by the Five Bells management, as licence supervisor, and a large scale extension of the presently available buffet service is planned for introduction almost immediately. Looking after the Village Hall bar arrangements, and contacts with the Village Hall Committee, will be Sam Alderton, who will attend Committee meetings and join in the planning of events. In

Jacob is planning to bring in some new 'meal deals' and create some very special food, nights, such as curry and steak.

Ever popular quiz nights will be held every other Tuesday evening and Poker has found it way onto the events schedule, being held in the restaurant on a Monday evening.

Rarely seen by those of us who live in Upwell, but always available to visitors, are five lettings rooms, with, for example, a double room available at £65 per room per night, including breakfast, and a single room at £45.

We look forward to future developments with interest, and, as for the new menus, the proof of the pudding (and the main courses), will, as they say, be in the eating! N.M.
