Q You never saw his wife? A. No, sir.

By Mr. House:

Q How long had this defendant been locked up in the station house before you took off his shoes and stockings?

A About three days.

Q Was it four days? A. No, sir.

Q Your best recollection is it was about three days?

A Yes, sir.
