



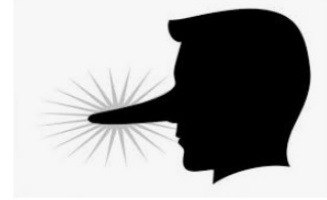

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LONG-NOSED MAN

Who Looks Like Murderer
 of Old Shakespeare.

Inspector Byrnes Makes a Big
 Arrest This Morning.

Forty Suspected Rippers
 in New York.

Burial of Unfortunate Carrie
 Brown Provided for.

Relatives from Salem, Mass.,
 Arrive at the Morgue.

NEW YORK, April 29.—Inspector Byrnes was at headquarters this morning, apparently very much occupied by new developments in relation to the awful murder in the East River Hotel.
 He was locked up in his private office and several women and two men were taken before him.

At 8.30 the inspector sent a message to Capt. White, keeper of the morgue, directing him not to bury the body of Carrie Brown, alias "Shakespeare," the ripper's victim, which has been lying there for the past six days.

The action was said to be due to the arrival at headquarters of two relatives of Carrie Brown, who came from Salem, Mass., and who, it is expected, will provide for the proper interment of the body.

The police have not abandoned the theory that "Frenchy No. 2," the cousin of the "Frenchy" now detained at headquarters, is the murderer.

That the police have not abandoned this theory seems probable by the arrest and commitment to the house of detention yesterday of "Dublin Mary" of 12 Roosevelt st., whose right name is said to be Mary Driscoll.

"Dublin Mary" is said to be better acquainted with the two "Frenchys" than any one in the fourth ward, and "Frenchy No. 2" was formerly her lover before Barber Deenwether of Oliver st. supplanted him in her affections.

It was 9.40 o'clock when Capt. McLaughlin, Inspector Byrnes' right-hand man, arrived at the Oak st. station and began his usual morning consultation.

At 10.30 a ward detective rushed up the steps with a little, short man, apparently a German, with light hair and sandy moustache.

They were followed by Detective McClosky, who had in charge a tall man with a black moustache, who appeared to be an Italian.

The little man was apparently very much excited, but no information concerning either prisoner could be obtained.

Five minutes later a park police sergeant brought in a prisoner that answered the description of the alleged murderer almost as well as the 40 odd other men with long noses, who are reported to have been arrested on suspicion since the murder was committed.

This last arrival, however, was promptly released. At noon Chief Murphy of Jersey City police headquarters telegraphed that he had made an important arrest in the East River Hotel murder case.

He notified Inspector Byrnes that two of his detectives had taken into custody a light-haired and light moustached man who answered the description of Carrie Brown's companion.

He is about 35 years old, about 5 feet 9 inches, and speaks broken English.

The prisoner was locked up in a cell at headquarters to await Inspector Byrnes' arrival.

Mary Minter, who last saw the murderer, was sent to identify the man.

Arrested in Jersey City
 gave the name of Arbie La Bruckman, oth-

erwise known as John Frenchy, and is a cattleman.

He admits that he was arrested and locked up in London on suspicion of having committed the Whitechapel murders.

He also stated that he lived at 51 James st., a block from the scene of the murder of Carrie Brown, but knew nothing of the murder.

He was arrested while at work at the public abattoirs at the foot of 6th st., Jersey City, where he was employed by a cattle merchant.

Inspector Byrnes has sent men over to identify him.
