EVENTS THAT TOOK PLACE IN JUNE

Thursday, 6 June 1944 Allied powers launch D-Day invasion.

On 6 June 1944, the Allied powers crossed the English Channel and landed on the beaches of Normandy, France, beginning the liberation of Western Europe from Nazi control during WWII. Within three months, the northern part of France would be freed, and the invading force would be preparing to enter Germany, where they would meet up with Soviet forces moving in from the east. By dawn on 6 June, 18,000 parachutists were already on the ground; the land invasions began at 6:30a. The British and Canadians overcame light opposition to capture Gold, Juno, and Sword beaches, as did the Americans at Utah beach. The task was much tougher at Omaha beach, however, where two thousand troops were lost, and it was only through the tenacity and quick-wittedness of the troops on the ground that the objective was achieved. By day's end, 155,000 Allied troops - Americans, British, and Canadians had successfully stormed Normandy's beaches.

Wednesday, 12 June 2016 Italian Coast Guard rescues 1,230 refuges

On 12 June 2016, the Italian Coast Guard rescued 1,230 refuges in the waters between Sicily and North Africa during nine separate rescue operations. This extraordinary number of rescues was preceded by days of large-scale operations, bringing the total number to over 4,000 people rescued after the 12 June tally.

Europe started seeing an influx of the migrant refuges in 2015 as people fled Muslim-majority countries - mostly Syria, Iraq, and Afghanistan. The European Union was challenged by the refugee crisis as thousands of displaced refugees poured in from multiple directions. Some Islamic extremists migrated into the region disguised as refugees, adding to the

complexity of strategic processing for those seeking asylum. The journey into Europe proved to be dangerous, as thousands of refugees died at sea attempting to reach shore.

Monday, 17 June 1885 Statue of Liberty arrives in New York.

On 17 June 1885, the Statue of Liberty arrived in New York harbor as a gift of friendship from France to America. The statue, which arrived dismantled, had to be shipped across the Atlantic Ocean in 350 individual pieces. Lady Liberty, made from copper and iron, was assembled on Liberty Island, and dedicated in a ceremony by U.S. President Grover Cleveland the following year.

Designed by French sculptor Frederic Auguste Bartholdi, who modeled her features after his mother, and assisted by engineer Gustave Eiffel, who was later famous for the Eiffel Tower in Paris, the statue was a gift to commemorate the American Revolution and a century of friendship between the countries.

Though it was initially supposed to be completed by 1876, on the centennial of the Declaration of Independence, fundraising efforts slowed the progress. Efforts included a lottery, auctions, and boxing matches in Europe and the United States to fund the construction of the statue's pedestal. The French alone paid an estimated \$250,000, more than \$5.5 million today, for the statue.

Saturday, 22 June 2011 Mobster Whitey Bulger is arrested.

On 22 June 2011, after sixteen years on the run from law enforcement, James "Whitey" Bulger, a violent Boston mob boss, wanted for nineteen murders, was arrested in Santa Monica, California. The eighty-one-year-old Bulger, one of the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted" fugitives, was arrested with his longtime companion, sixty-year-old Catherine Greig, who fled Massachusetts with the gangster in late 1994, shortly before he was to be indicted on federal criminal charges.

Tuesday, 25 June 1876 Custer and his troops die at the Battle of the Little Bighorn

On 25 June 1876, Indigenous forces led by Chiefs Crazy Horse and Sitting Bull defeated the U.S. Army troops of Lieutenant Colonel George Armstrong Custer in a bloody battle near southern Montana's Little Bighorn River, famously known as Custer's Last Stand. Crazy Horse and Sitting Bull, leaders of the Sioux tribe, resisted the U.S. Government's efforts to confine their people to reservations. In 1875, after gold was discovered in South Dakota's Black Hills, the U.S. Army ignored previous treaty agreements and invaded the region. This betrayal lead many Sioux and Cheyenne tribesmen to join Crazy Horse and Sitting Bull

in Montana. By 1876, more than 10,000 Indigenous people had gathered in a camp along the Little Bighorn River in defiance of a U.S. War Department order to return to their reservations. In mid-June, a force of 1,200 Sioux and Cheyenne turned back a column of U.S. troops. On the morning of 25 June, Custer drew near the Indigenous camp and decided to press on ahead rather than wait for reinforcements. Within an hour, Custer and every last one of his soldiers were dead.

Thursday, 27 June 1829

Scientist James Smithson dies, willing his entire estate to the U.S. Government, and establishing the Smithsonian.

On 27 June 1829, English scientist and philanthropist James Smithson died in Italy, leaving a will that gave his estate to his nephew under the condition that the nephew produce and heir. Otherwise, his entire estate would go the United States "for the increase and diffusion of knowledge among men." Because his nephew had no children when he died, the United States reaped the benefits of the estate. valued at more than \$500,000 at that time, or over \$15 million today. For eight years Congress debated what to do with the estate, whether to use the money to create a library. museum, university, astronomical observatory, or research laboratory. Finally in 1846, President James K. Polk signed legislation and officially established the prestigious Smithsonian Institute, which has gone on to become the worlds largest museum.

Sunday, 30 June 1962 Sandy Koufax pitches first no-hitter

On 30 June 1962, Sandy Koufax struck out thirteen batters and walked five to lead the Los Angeles Dodgers to victory over the New York Mets, 5-0 with his first career no-hitter. Koufax went on to throw three more no-hitters, including a perfect game on September 9, 1965, in which he allowed no hits and no walks and struck out fourteen batters.

VINCE LOMBARDI

Born 11 June 1913

He is best known as the head coach of the Green Bay Packers during the 1960s, where he led the team to three straight and five total NFL Championships in seven years, in addition to winning the first two Super Bowls at the conclusion of the 1966 and 1967 NFL seasons.

Lombardi never had a losing season as head coach in the NFL and is considered by many to be the greatest coach in football history.

It's his attitude towards winning and success that made Lombardi such a special coach and

you'll often see Vince Lombardi quoted used by many of the great leaders today.

While he suffered a sudden death from cancer in 1970, his legacy still lives today.

Famous Vince Lombardi Quotes

- "Life's battles don't always go to the stronger or faster man. But sooner or later, the man who wins is the man who thinks he can."
- "The real glory is being knocked to your knees and then coming back. That's real glory. That's the essence of it."
- "Obstacles are what you see when you take your eyes off of the goal."
- "I've never known a man worth his salt who, in the long run, deep down in his heart, didn't appreciate the grind, the discipline."
- "The good Lord gave you a body that can stand most anything. It's your mind you must convince."

FLAG DAY

14 June 1777

In the United States, Flag Day is celebrated on June 14. It commemorates the adoption of the flag of the United States on June 14, 1777, by resolution of the Second Continental Congress. The Flag Resolution, passed on June 14, 1777, stated: "Resolved, That the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation."



The United States Army also celebrates the U.S. Army birthday on this date; Congress adopted "the American continental army" after reaching a consensus position in the Committee of the Whole on June 14, 1775.

In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation that officially established June 14 as Flag Day; on August 3, 1949, National Flag Day was established by an Act of Congress. Flag Day is not an official federal holiday. Title 36 of the United States Code, Subtitle I, Part A, CHAPTER 1, § 110 is the official statute on Flag Day; however, it is at the president's discretion to officially proclaim the observance. On June 14, 1937, Pennsylvania became the first U.S. state to celebrate Flag Day as a state holiday, beginning in the town of Rennerdale. New York Statutes designate the second Sunday in June as Flag Day, a state holiday.

Perhaps the oldest continuing Flag Day parade is in Fairfield, Washington. Beginning in 1909 or 1910, Fairfield has held a parade every year since, with the possible exception of 1918, and celebrated the "Centennial" parade in 2010, along with some other commemorative events. Appleton, Wisconsin, claims to be the oldest National Flag Day parade in the nation, held annually since 1950.

Quincy, Massachusetts, has had an annual Flag Day parade since 1952 and claims it "is the longest-running parade of its kind" in the U.S. The largest Flag Day parade had been held annually in Troy, New York until 2017, which based its parade on the Quincy parade and typically draws 50,000 spectators. In addition, the Three Oaks, Michigan, Flag Day Parade is held annually on the weekend of Flag Day and is a three-day event and they claim to have the largest flag day parade in the nation as well as the oldest. In Washington, D.C., Flag Day is celebrated heavily through the 7th and 8th Wards of the city. It is said that Clyde Thompson is the "Godfather of Flag Day".

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

22 June 1942

The Pledge of Allegiance was written in August 1892 by the socialist minister Francis Bellamy (1855-1931). It was originally published in *The Youth's Companion* on September 8, 1892. Bellamy had hoped that the pledge would be used by citizens in any country.

In its original form it read:

"I pledge allegiance to my Flag and the Republic for which it stands, one nation, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

In 1923, the words, "the Flag of the United States of America" were added. At this time, it read:

"I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

On 22 June 1942, Congress officially recognized the Pledge of Allegiance.

In 1954, in response to the Communist threat of the times, President Eisenhower encouraged Congress to add the words "under God," creating the 31-word pledge we say today.

Section 4 of the Flag Code states:

The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag: "I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.", should be rendered by standing at attention facing the flag with the right hand over the heart. When not in uniform men should remove any non-religious headdress with their right hand and hold it at the left shoulder, the right hand being over the heart. Persons in uniform should remain silent, face the flag, and render the military salute."

The original Bellamy salute, first described in 1892 by Francis Bellamy, who authored the original Pledge, began with a military salute. Shortly after, the pledge was begun, after reciting "to the Flag," the arm was extended toward the Flag, palm-down. In World War II, this salute too much resembled the Nazi salute, so it was changed to keep the right hand over the heart throughout.

THE FIRST CORVETTE

26 June 1953

Chevrolet was in a sales slump in the early 1950s, and like many within the division's ranks, brand manager Thomas Keating was eager to reverse course. His solution? Ordering a sports car for General Motors' bread-and-butter nameplate. Produced under the code name "Project Opel", the sports car was a distinctly American take on the era's British sports cars, cobbled together from a fiberglass body and a 3.9-liter (235-cubic-inch) straight-six engine mated to a two-speed automatic transmission. After making its debut to a warm reception at GM's 1953 Motorama show in New York City, the Corvette became the rare entrant to go on to be produced for customers.

Chevrolet rushed the Corvette into production following the model's debut at GM's 1953 Motorama show. The two-seat roadster used fiberglass body panels and relied on Chevy's tried-and-true Blue Flame inline-six for motivation. While the six-cylinder powerplant produced 115 horsepower in Chevy's sedan, the engineers tuned the engine to make 150 horsepower in the Corvette. A two-speed automatic was the only transmission offered, and all the cars are painted Polo White with a red interior. Too bad there wasn't much lust among buyers for that original 1953 Corvette. Chevrolet produced 300 Corvettes in 1953 and sold just 183 of them. It was an inauspicious

start to the bloodline that became America's sports car.

June 2: Republic Day

Patriotic Rituals in Rome

June 24: Feast of St. John the Baptist

A – The University of Arizona and Grambling State University marching bands, along with trumpeter Al Hirt. The show, titled "Super Sights and Sounds," also featured hundreds of pigeons and a jet-pack demonstration.
