# THE FASCINATING HISTORY OF THE FEAST OF MARY'S ASSUMPTION

On August 15<sup>th</sup>. Each year, Catholics around the world mark the solemnity of the Assumption of Mary, commemorating the end of her earthly life and assumption into heaven. But while the feast day is a relatively new one, the history of the holiday — and the mystery behind it — has its roots in the earliest centuries of Christian helief

The Catholic Church teaches that when Mary's earthly life ended, God assumed her, body and soul, into heaven. The dogma of the Assumption of Mary — also called the "Dormition of Mary" in the Eastern Churches — has its roots in the early centuries of the Church. While a site outside of Jerusalem was recognized as the tomb of Mary, the earliest Christians maintained that "no one was there," theologian and EWTN News Vice President and Editorial Director Dr. Matthew Bunson explained.

According to St. John of Damascus, the Roman emperor Marcian requested the body of Mary, Mother of God at the Council of Chalcedon, in 451. St. Juvenal, who was bishop of Jerusalem, told the emperor "That Mary died in the presence of all the Apostles, but that her tomb, when opened upon the request of St. Thomas, was found empty; wherefrom the Apostles concluded that the body was taken up to heaven." the saint recorded.

By the eighth century, around the time of Pope Adrian, the Church began to change its terminology, renaming the feast day of the Memorial of Mary to the Assumption of Mary, Bunson noted.

The belief in the assumption of Mary was a widely held tradition and a frequent meditation in the writings of saints throughout the centuries. However, it was not defined officially until the past century. In 1950, Pope Pius XII made an infallible, ex-cathedra statement in the apostolic constitution *Munificentissimus deus* officially defining the dogma of the Assumption.

"By the authority of Our Lord Jesus Christ, of the Blessed Apostles Peter and Paul, and by our own authority, we pronounce, declare, and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma: that the Immaculate Mother of God, the ever-Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory," the pope wrote. The decree was seen as the formalizing of long-held Christian teaching. "We have throughout the history of the Church an almost universal attestation of this," Bunson said of the Assumption.

"We have this thread that runs throughout the whole of the history of the Church in support of the dogma. That's significant because it supports the tradition of the Church, but it also supports a coming to a deeper understanding of the teachings of the Church of how we rely upon the reflections of some of the greatest minds of our Church."

What's also notable about the dogma, he added, is that it "uses the passive tense," emphasizing that Mary did not ascend into heaven on her own power, as Christ did, but was raised into heaven by God's grace.

Today, the solemnity of the Assumption is marked as a major feast day and a public holiday in many countries. In most countries, including the United States, it is a holy day of obligation.

Bunson explained that on major feast days, it's fitting to mark the significance of the feast as especially vital by emphasizing the necessity of celebrating the Eucharist that day.

#### THE FEAST

The Feast of the Assumption Festival also locally referred to informally as The Feast is an annual four-day Catholic and Italian American street festival in the Little Italy neighborhood of Cleveland, Ohio, centered on Holy Rosary Church on Mayfield Road near its intersection with Murray Hill Road. Held annually since 1898 (with exceptions in 1917-18, 1942-45 and 2020), the Feast occurs around August 15 in concordance with the observance of the Assumption of Mary. It includes a procession of a statue of the Virgin through the streets leading to the church, as well as a nightly mass. In addition to its religious nature, the Feast is also a general celebration of Cleveland's Italian cultural heritage in its largest Italian neighborhood, which has demographically remained relatively unchanged since its establishment in the 19th century.



Highlights of the festival include live musical performances, carnival and casino games, carnival rides and fireworks. The Feast is also famous for its food, with numerous street booths operated by local restaurants and shops from around the neighborhood selling traditional Italian food and other items to the large crowds that come to the neighborhood from all over the Greater Cleveland area.

#### **EVENTS THAT TOOK PLACE IN AUGUST**

#### August 3, 1492

#### Christopher Columbus set sail

On August 3, 1492, Italian explorer Christopher Columbus set sail from the Spanish port of Palos. in command of three ships - the Nina, the Pinta, and the Santa Maria - on a journey to find a western route to the fabled gold and spice islands of Asia. On October 12, the expedition sighted land, probably Watling Island in the Bahamas, and went ashore the same day.

#### August 7, 1782

### George Washington created the Purple

On August 7, 1782, in Newburgh, New York, General George Washington, the commander in chief of the Continental Army, created the "Badge of Military Merit", a decoration consisting of a heart-shaped piece of purple silk edged with a narrow binding of silver, with the word "Merit" stitched across the face in silver. The badge was to be presented to soldiers for "any singularly meritorious action" and permitted its wearer to pass guards and sentinels without challenge. The honoree's name and regiment were also to be inscribed in a Book of Merit. Washington's "Badge of Military Merit" was awarded to only three known soldiers during the Revolutionary War: Elijah Churchill, William Brown, and Daniel Bissell Jr. The Book of Merit was lost, and the decoration was largely forgotten until 1927, when General

Charles P. Summerall, the U.S. Army chief of staff, sent an unsuccessful draft bill to Congress to "revive the Badge of Military In 1931, Summerall's successor, Merit." General Douglas MacArthur, took up the cause, hoping to reinstate the medal in time for the bicentennial of George Washington's birth. On February 22, the U.S. War Department announce the creation of the Order of the Purple Heart.

#### August 8, 1974

#### Resident Richard M. Nixon resigned

On August 8, 1974, President Richard M. Nixon resigned in the wake of the Watergate burglary scandal. He was the first president in American history to resign. In a televised address, Nixon announced to the American public that he would step down rather than endure a Senate impeachment trial for obstruction of justice. Since1972, Nixon had battled increasingly vociferous allegations that he had known of and perhaps authorized a botched burglary in which several men were arrested for attempting to bug the offices of the Democratic National Committee, located in the Watergate Hotel in Washington, DC.

#### August 9, 378

#### Visigoths routed Romans at Adrianople

On August 9, 378, Emperor Valens of Rome led his army to a stunning defeat by the Visigoths at the Battle of Adrianople in what is now Turkey. Though Valens had officially conquered Visigoth civilizations via warfare between the years of 364 and 369, the Visigoth people quickly grew restless under Roman rule as they were subjected to oppressive measures. Less than a decade after the cessation of war against their people, Visigoth forces revolted, forcing Emperor Valens to engage in battle near the city of Adrianople. Despite early victories and a standing army of nearly thirty thousand men, the Roman forces were hopelessly outmatched by the Visigoth calvary, which inflicted heavy losses on Valens army. By the time the dust settled over the battlefields on August 9, 378, nearly two-thirds of the Roman forces had been slain, including Emperor Valens himself. This vicious and decisive rout of Rome's forces would cripple the Eastern Roman Empire (Byzantium) for many years to come and served as decisive proof of the brutal effectiveness of a calvary in the era's warfare.

#### August 14, 1935 FDR signed the Social Security Act

On August 14, 1935, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed into law the Social Security Act. Press photographers snapped pictures as Roosevelt, flanked by ranking members of Congress, signed the historic act, which guaranteed an income for the unemployed and retirees. He commended Congress for what he

considered to be a "patriotic" act. Roosevelt had taken the helm of the country in 1932, during the Great Depression, the nation's worst economic crisis. The Social Security Act was in keeping with his other New Deal programs, including the establishment of the Works Progress Administration (WPA) and the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC), which attempted to hoist America out of the Great Depression by putting Americans back to work. Although it was initially created to combat unemployment, Social Security now functions primarily as a safety net for retirees and people with disabilities and provides death benefits to taxpayer dependents. The Social Security system has remained relatively unchanged since its inception in 1935.

#### August 23, 1989 Pete Rose gets booted from baseball

On August 23, 1989, as punishment for betting on baseball, Cincinnati Reds manager Pete Rose accepted a settlement that included a lifetime ban from the game. It was known in baseball circles since the 1970s that Rose had a gambling problem. An investigation in 1989 yielded hundreds of hours of testimony from numerous sources that detailed his history of gambling on baseball while serving as the manager of the Cincinnati Reds, including betting on his own team. Although Rose continued to proclaim his innocence, he was eventually persuaded to accept the settlement.

#### August 25, 325 Council of Nicaea concluded

On August 25, 325, the Council of Nicaea, the first ecumenical debate held by the early Christian church, concluded with the establishment of the doctrine of the Holy Trinity. Convened by Roman emperor Constantine I in May, the council also deemed the Arian belief of Christ as inferior to God to be heretical, thus resolving an early church crisis.

# MT. VESUVIUS ERUPTED 79AD

Mount Vesuvius is a somma-stratovolcano located on the Gulf of Naples in Campania, Italy, about 5.6 miles east of Naples and a short distance from the shore. It is one of several volcanoes forming the Campanian volcanic arc. Vesuvius consists of a large cone partially encircled by the steep rim of a summit caldera, resulting from the collapse of an earlier, much higher structure.

The eruption of Mount Vesuvius in 79 AD destroyed the Roman cities of Pompeii, Herculaneum, Oplontis, Stabiae, and several other settlements. The eruption ejected a cloud of stones, ash and volcanic gases to a height of 21 miles, erupting molten rock and pulverized pumice at the rate of 7.8×10<sup>5</sup> cu. yd. per second. More than 1,000 people are thought to have died in the eruption, though the exact toll is unknown. The only surviving eyewitness account of the event consists of two letters by Pliny the Younger to the historian Tacitus.

Vesuvius has erupted many times since. It is the only volcano on Europe's mainland to have erupted in the last hundred years. It is regarded as one of the most dangerous volcanoes in the world because 3,000,000 people live near enough to be affected by an eruption, with at least 600,000 in the danger zone. This is the most densely populated volcanic region in the world. Eruptions tend to be violent and explosive; these are known as Plinian eruptions.

#### **RIN TIN TIN DIED**

11 AUG 1932

Rin Tin Tin (September 1918 - August 10. 1932) was a male German Shepherd born in Flirey, France, who became an international star in motion pictures. He was rescued from a World War I battlefield by an American soldier, Lee Duncan, who nicknamed him "Rinty". Duncan trained Rin Tin Tin and obtained silent film work for the dog. Rin Tin Tin was an immediate box-office success and went on to appear in 27 Hollywood films, gaining worldwide fame. Along with the earlier canine film star Strongheart, Rin Tin Tin was responsible for greatly increasing the popularity of German Shepherd dogs as family pets. The immense profitability of his films contributed to the success of Warner Bros. studios and helped advance the career of Darryl F. Zanuck from screenwriter to producer and studio executive.



After the dog's only appearance in color (the 1929 musical revue *The Show of Shows*, in which he barks an introduction to a musical pageant), Warner Bros. dispensed with Rin Tin Tin's and Lee Duncan's services. The studio was intent on promoting its "all-talking" stars, and silent-film personality Rin Tin Tin obviously couldn't speak. Undaunted, Duncan sought further film work and signed with independent producer Nat Levine, who starred Rin Tin Tin in serials and feature films.

After Rin Tin Tin died in 1932, the name was given to several related German Shepherd dogs featured in fictional stories on film, radio, and television. Rin Tin Tin Jr. appeared in some serialized films but was not as talented as his father. Rin Tin Tin III, said to be Rin Tin Tin's grandson, but probably only distantly related, helped promote the military use of dogs during World War II. Rin Tin Tin III also appeared in a film with child actor Robert Blake in 1947.

Duncan groomed Rin Tin Tin IV for the 1950s television series *The Adventures of Rin Tin Tin*, produced by Bert Leonard. However, the dog performed poorly in a screen test and was replaced in the TV show by trainer Frank Barnes's dogs, primarily one named Flame Jr., called JR, with the public led to believe otherwise. Instead of shooting episodes, Rin Tin Tin IV stayed at home in Riverside, California. The TV show *Rin Tin Tin* was nominated for a PATSY Award in both 1958 and 1959 but did not win.

#### AUGUST 2024 EVENTS, AND FESTIVALS IN ITALY

August 5: Feast of Our Lady of the Snows Every August 5th, Rome celebrates the Feast of Our Lady of the Snows (La Madonna della Neve), memorializing a miraculous summer snowfall in 352 AD. According to legend, a noble Roman couple, John and his wife, prayed to the Virgin Mary, seeking guidance on donating their wealth in her honor. Mirroring their dreamy instructions, a divine snowfall blanketed Rome's Esquiline Hill, outlining where they, and Pope Liberius, would build what's now known as Saint Mary Major — Rome's largest church honoring the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Although historically unverified, this tale of miraculous snow and the ensuing feast, initially titled the Dedication of the Church of Our Lady of the Snows, seamlessly weave into Italy's rich cultural and spiritual fabric, inviting all to bask in Rome's mystical and festive spirit.

### August 10: La Notte di San Lorenzo (The Night of Shooting Stars)

Every year on August 10th, the sky lights up across Italy for La Notte di San Lorenzo, also warmly known as the Night of the Shooting Stars. This evening, intertwined with the timely occurrence of the Perseid meteor shower, invites everyone to cast their eyes skyward to make a wish upon the streaking stars. This event in Italy has more than just astronomical significance: it's deeply rooted in the country's rich historical tapestry, named in honor of Saint Lawrence (San Lorenzo). A Christian martyr from the third century, San Lorenzo suffered a grueling fate, being burned to death under the persecution decreed by the Roman Emperor Valerian. The legend softly whispers that the annually cascading stars symbolize San Lorenzo's tears, gracefully falling to Earth each year on the anniversary of his sacrifice.

All across the country, Italians seek tranquil spots away from lively city lights – perhaps on serene beaches, atop rolling hills, or nestled in spacious parks. Then, with eyes alight with anticipation and hearts tender with unspoken desires, they gaze into the celestial abyss, silently casting their wishes upon every streaking star that graces the night sky.

#### August 11: Sunrise Concert 2024 in Ravello

Nestled above the resplendent Amalfi Coast, the Sunrise Concert in Ravello isn't just an event; it's an ethereal experience where nature and music converge to create an unparalleled symphony of serenity and melody. Imagine welcoming the day atop the cliffs, with the first rays of the sun gently illuminating the Amalfi Coast, all while an orchestra caresses your senses with a live performance. ## August 15: Assumption of the Virgin Mary and Ferragosto

The Assumption Day illuminates Italy with its divine light, celebrating the belief that Mary, Jesus' mother, was assumed body and soul into heaven. #### August 16: Palio di Siena

The medieval city of Siena, nestled in the picturesque region of Tuscany, bursts into life twice each summer for the Palio di Siena. On July 2nd and August 16th, its heart-shaped Piazza del Campo becomes a vibrant spectacle as seventeen contrade (districts) fiercely compete in an exhilarating horse race, with each district represented by a horse and rider, boldly decked in their distinctive colors and emblems. The race day, particularly in August, pulsates with tradition and civic pride, from the early afternoon horse blessings to the electrifying race that entails three laps around the Piazza in the evening.

While August 16th is the pinnacle, the Palio festivities span four days filled with ceremonies, trial races, and traditional dinners. These ceremonies serve as significant build-ups to the main event, immersing locals and visitors in an escalating atmosphere of excitement and collective anticipation.
