THE '48 WORLD SERIES OCTOBER 6 – 11, 1948

Its October so some of us are thinking about the MLB Playoffs as well as the World Series. That got me to thinking about the last time the Guardians (then the Indians) won the world Series. This is what I found.

The 1948 World Series was the championship series in Major League Baseball for the 1948 season. The 45th edition of the World Series, it matched the American League (AL) champion Cleveland Indians and the National League (NL) champion Boston Braves. The Braves had won the National League pennant for the first time since the "Miracle Braves" team of 1914, while the Indians had spoiled a chance for the only all-Boston World Series by winning a one-game playoff against the Boston Red Sox for the American League flag. Though superstar pitcher Bob Feller failed to win either of his two starts, the Indians won the Series in six games to capture their second championship (as well as their most recent) and their first since 1920.

It was the first World Series to be televised beyond the previous year's limited New York-Schenectady-Philadelphia-Baltimore-Washington network and was announced by famed sportscasters Red Barber and Tom Hussey (in Boston) and Van Patrick (in Cleveland). This was the second appearance in the Fall Classic for both teams, with the Indians' lone previous appearance coming in a 1920 win against the Brooklyn Dodgers and the Braves' lone previous appearance coming in a 1914 win against the Philadelphia Athletics.

Consequently, this was the first, and to date only, World Series in which both participating teams had previously played in, but not yet lost, a previous World Series. Currently, this phenomenon can only be repeated if the Miami Marlins or the Washington Nationals play against either the Toronto Blue Jays or the Los Angeles Angels in a future World Series.

Indian Hall of Famers who played included Lou Boudreau, Larry Doby, Bob Feller, Joe Gordon, Bob Lemon, and Satchel Paige. Braves Hall of Famers who played included Billy Southworth and Warren Spahn.

The radio announcers were Mel Allen and Jim Britt.

CUMBERLAND VS. GEORGIA TECH FOOTBALL GAME OCTOBER 7, 1916

Now that we're officially in the football season, I wanted to share this article I came across about the most lopsided football score to date.

The 1916 Cumberland vs. Georgia Tech football game was played on October 7, 1916, between the Cumberland College Bulldogs and the Georgia Tech Engineers on the Engineers' home field of Grant Field in Atlanta. Georgia Tech defeated the Bulldogs 222-0 for the most lopsided score in the history of college football.

Cumberland had disbanded its football program the previous year but was still obligated to play this game against Georgia Tech. The Georgia Tech Engineers' head coach, John Heisman, had been the coach of Georgia Tech's baseball team when it was defeated 22-0 by the Cumberland College Bulldogs earlier in 1916, and was looking to avenge that game. Heisman insisted that the Bulldogs fulfill their obligations to play the game and threatened legal action if Cumberland backed out. Cumberland tasked George E. Allen, its baseball captain, to assemble a football team for the game; he recruited his fraternity brothers and students from Cumberland's law school to play in Atlanta.

Despite receiving the opening kickoff, Cumberland never achieved a first down in the entire match and opted to punt on multiple possessions. The game's infamous score can be partially attributed to 97 percent of the game's plays occurring in Cumberland territory, with 64 of those plays occurring in its red zone. Georgia Tech, instigated by Heisman, scored on every first down it gained. The imbalance of the teams was so severe that the final two quarters were shortened from their customary 15 minutes to 12 minutes.

This would be the last matchup of any sport between the two schools; Cumberland deemphasized athletics in favor of academic pursuits, while Georgia Tech has continued to compete at the highest level of college sports. Current National Collegiate Athletics Association (NCAA) rules preclude a rematch of this game. After World War II, it became regarded as unsportsmanlike to deliberately run up the score to such high numbers, meaning that college football games of more than 100 points have been infrequent since the 1940s.

"WAR OF THE WORLDS" OCTOBER 30, 1938

Orson Welles (arms raised) rehearses his radio depiction of H.G. Wells' classic, *The War of the Worlds*. The broadcast, which aired on October 30, 1938, and claimed that aliens from Mars had invaded New Jersey, terrified thousands of Americans.

On Halloween morning, 1938, Orson Welles awoke to find himself the most talked about man in America. The night before, Welles and his *Mercury Theatre on the Air* had performed a radio adaptation of H.G. Wells' *The War of the Worlds*, converting the 40-year-old novel into fake news bulletins describing a Martian invasion of New Jersey. Some listeners mistook those bulletins for the real thing, and their anxious phone calls to police, newspaper offices, and radio stations convinced many journalists that the show had caused nationwide hysteria. By the next morning, the 23-year-old Welles's face and name were on the front pages of newspapers coast-to-coast, along with headlines about the mass panic his CBS broadcast had allegedly inspired.

Welles barely had time to glance at the papers, leaving him with only a horribly vague sense of what he had done to the country. He'd heard reports of mass stampedes, of suicides, and of angered listeners threatening to shoot him on sight. "If I'd planned to wreck my career," he told several people at the time, "I couldn't have gone about it better." With his livelihood (and possibly even his freedom) on the line, Welles went before dozens of reporters, photographers, and newsreel cameramen at a hastily arranged press conference in the CBS building. Each journalist asked him some variation of the same basic question: Had he intended, or did he at all anticipate, that *War of the Worlds* would throw its audience into panic? That question would follow Welles for the rest of his life, and his answers changed as the years went on—from protestations of innocence to playful hints that he knew exactly what he was doing all along.

WORLD EVENTS IN OCTOBER

5 Oct 1919 – Enzo Ferrari's first race

On October 5, 1919, Enzo Ferrari began his career in automobiles when he drove in his first race. Though he placed eleventh, he soon became the director of the Alfa Racing Division. Ten years later, he established the Scuderia Ferrari racing club that later became his auto manufacturing company. However, he did not produce his first Ferrari race car until after World War II. The wait was worth it --- the car won a coveted title during its first year, thus launching a long and successful saga.

6 Oct 891 – Formosus became pope

On October 6, 891, the controversial Catholic figure Formosus faced excommunication for leaving Rome without the pope's permission. His tumultuous papacy lasted only five years, until his death in 896.

12 October 1810 – The original Oktoberfest

On October 12, 1810, the first incarnation of Oktoberfest unfolded when Prince Ludwig (later Bavaria's King Ludwig I) married Princess Therese of Bavaria. Prince Ludwig's family invited the entire city of Munich to the wedding and reception. The original Oktoberfest featured horse races; however, as the tradition spread across Bavaria, various locales developed their own traditions. The citizens of Munich enjoyed the festivities so much the celebration became an instant annual tradition. Today, beer aficionados worldwide participate in the annual Oktoberfest festivities.

13 October 1884 – The Prime Meridian

On October 13, 1884, President Chester A. Arthur held an international conference at the White House to establish a meridian to divide the two hemispheres. The Prime Meridian is the longitudinal dividing line between the Eastern and Western Hemispheres. Because the Greenwich Observatory in England sits directly on the meridian, many British people call it the Greenwich meridian.

17 October 1814 – London Beer Flood

On October 17, 1814, in St. Giles, London, England, over 1.4 million liters of beer spilled out onto the streets after a large vat in the Horseshoe Brewery on Tottenham Court Road exploded. The blast sent bricks flying over the tops of houses and collapsed a brick wall that killed a woman instantly. Overall, eight women and children were killed. The beer traveled through the streets, and with no drainage system at the time, the liquid poured into neighboring houses and businesses, causing many to drown. A worker at the brewery had noticed a fault in the equipment before the disaster, but his boss had told him that the problem wasn't imperative and that someone could be scheduled to make the repair. Just

hours later, the explosion occurred. Two days after the catastrophe, an investigation into the incident began. Although the brewery had known of the faulty equipment, they escaped any charges and were even recompensed for taxes that had already been paid on the lost stock.

Q: Which US president once co-owned a tavern with his friend William F. Berry?

A: Abraham Lincoln. The tavern, called Berry and Lincoln, was a short-lived business venture, operating briefly in New Salem, Illinois, in the spring of 1833.

Q: The word *laser* is an acronym. What does it stand for?

A: Light Amplification by Stimulated Emission of Radiation. The term was coined in 1960.

Q: Whose portrait was featured on the first \$1 bills printed in the United States? (Hint: It wasn't George Washington.)

A: Salmon P. Chase, Abraham Lincoln's Secretary of the Treasury. Chase designed the \$1 bill and placed his image on it. His portrait was later replaced with Washington's.

Q: Has any independent candidate ever won the U.S. Presidency?

A: Yes, only one man did, and he won two consecutive terms as an independent. George Washington.

Q: What was the birth name of pop star Cher?

A: Her birth name was Cherlyn Sarkisian. When she began releasing music in the 1960s, she used a shortened version of her first name as her stage name. By 1979 her legal name had grown to Cherlyn Sarkisian LaPierre Bono Allman. At that point she had it legally changed to simply Cher.

The purpose of this Association is to promote the moral, social, and civic advancement of its membership, and to perpetuate the customs and cultural aspects of Italian Heritage.
