Food Waste Law in California

Senate Bill 1383 mandates that California residents place organic matter in green carts or grey carts with green lids.

What goes in the bin:

- ⇒ Produce
- \Rightarrow Meat
- ⇒ Dairy
- ⇒ Bakery & Dry Goods





Place items directly into the care
Do not bag organics.
Lid must fully close.

Place items directly in the cart. **Do not bag your organics. The lids must fully close.**

Be Wildlife and Neighbor Friendly!

Wildlife is attracted to food in overflowing garbage bins. If your carts are not closed, wildlife can access the food and bring food to your neighbors property. Overflowing garbage and overturned carts containing food will attract rats. Again, It is important to keep lids fully closed with any food substance. Tree Trimming/Nesting Birds

Did you know? Nesting can begin as early as January and most birds are protected under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act. The Act states that any known "active" nest cannot be disturbed until the babies have left the nest. The California



Wildlife Center notes you can play it safe by trimming trees in the late Fall and early Winter. The birds usually complete nesting by November. For more information visit the California Wildlife Center page: https://cawildlife.org/faq/

Make Coyotes Uncomfortable!

Never let a coyote think your home is a good place to hang out. If you rent your home, it is important to educate your guests and tenants. If you have visitors that bring dogs to your home, let them know about our wild friends. Here are some methods to discourage or deter coyotes.

- ⇒ Make your house an undesirable place to be. Coyotes visit at any time of the day or evening hours. Keep chickens in predator-proof housing. Clear brush before coyote breeding season (February to March). Pick up fruit and never leave small dogs or compromised large dogs unattended in the backyard.
- ⇒ Haze coyotes! Use a variety of techniques such as whistles, air horns, squirt guns, and throw cans filled with coins near them. Yell and wave your arms. ASPCA Hazing Guidelines: coyote-hazing-guidelines.pdf (humanesociety.org)

- ⇒ C.A.R.P. billboards were placed in Los Angeles locations. C.A.R.P. designed a new brochure, and welcomed the growth of Poison Free Conejo Valley! Poison Free Conejo Valley
- ⇒ Poison Free Agoura delivered over 100 wildlife orientation bags in Liberty Canyon, Old Agoura, and Fountainwood communities.
- the City of Agoura Hills in mailing over 800 letters to commercial businesses. The letter provided information on the dangers posed by the use of anticoagulant rodenticides and it was signed by Mayor Denis Weber.
- ⇒ Poison Free Agoura offered four webinars in 2021! Topics included mountain lions, coyotes, poison-free alternatives, and raptors.
