They are nocturnal and crepuscular (active at dawn and dusk). Bobcats are excellent climbers and not afraid of water. Their diet consists mostly of rabbits and rodents. Many residents love seeing great blue herons in our community and in the nearby parkland. To keep cool on hot days, these magnificent birds droop their wings. If you patiently observe herons, you may see them hunt and catch gophers. The great blue herons, along with the bobcat, coyote, owls, and hawks are nature's gifts of rodent control.




Together, we're better!

We're excited about our new coalition of cities called Cities Against Rat Poisons. Founded by Poison Free Malibu and Poison Free Agoura, our focus is on education regarding the dangers rat poisons pose to people, pets, and our wildlife. AB 1788 placed a moratorium on dangerous second-generation anticoagulant rodenticides. First-generation anticoagulant rodenticides are available for consumer purchase and use by pest control professionals. They continue to be a significant source of secondary poisoning of wildlife. Listed below are non-anticoagulant poisons that are extremely dangerous and used for rodent control. The poisons do not have antidotes! Keep your pets and wildlife safe!

Bromethalin: The National Park Service reported deceased Puma 67 (P-67) had exposure to five different anticoagulant rodenticide compounds and bromethalin. Bromethalin is a neurotoxin that affects the brain and liver. Bromethalin Is Toxic To Dogs | Pet Poison Helpline

Cholecalciferol (Vitamin D): Cholecalciferol is one of the most potent and dangerous mouse and rat poisons on the market and impacts non-target animals. It causes high calcium and phosphorus levels in the body resulting in kidney failure. Cholecalciferol Is Toxic To Dogs | Pet Poison Helpline

Strychnine: Strychnine is often used for killing ground squirrels, gophers, and moles. It also causes secondary poisoning of animals that eat the poisoned squirrels. The California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) is seeing more strychnine-related wildlife deaths in recent years. Strychnine Is Toxic To Dogs | Pet Poison Helpline





If you use poisons, switch your service to poison-free alternatives. Poisoned rats do not die in bait boxes. They stagger around for three to ten days. When neighbors use poisons, dying rats are often seen in the street or neighbors' yards. Keep your neighbors, pets, and wildlife safe by using alternatives to rodent poisons.
