Overflowing Trash Cans

Food attracts rats and other wildlife.

Food trash is not a good food source for wild animals. It is important to keep the blue **trash cans closed** and **not overstuffed** on or before trash day. **Not only does trash attract rats**, wild animals can tip over trash cans and carry trash to other locations.

Crows

Crows travel in families, have a fan-shaped tail (rounded), produce a caw sound, and have a refined beak.



Ravens

Ravens travel in pairs, have a wedge-shaped tail, produce a croaking sound, have large, shaggy throat feathers, and have heavier bills.

Cholecalciferol (Vitamin D3) Rodent Poison—No antidote

Here is information on a rodent poison that has **no** antidote! Keep your pets safe and use alternatives to rodent poisons.

Ask your veterinarian about poisons and know the locations of emergency veterinarian hospitals.

D. Justine A. Lee, DVM, DACVECC, DABT comments on the danger of D3 ingestion.

"As an emergency critical care veterinary specialist, this is my most hated type of poisoning. Only a small amount can result in severe poisoning in both dogs and cats. This type of mouse and rat poison results in an increased amount of calcium in the body, leading to kidney failure. Unfortunately, this type has no antidote, and is very expensive to treat, as pets typically need to be hospitalized for 3-7 days on aggressive therapy."
