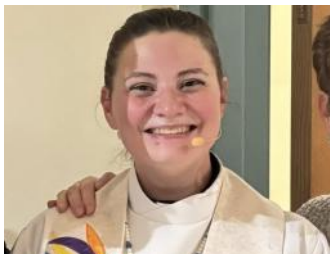

From the Pastor



What are you doing this Lent?

Often we think of Lent as a time for us to engage in some “spiritual warfare,” usually against...chocolate. The habit in certain Christian circles is to think about what we might temporarily sacrifice to God, or how we want to engage in some self-improvement exercises, breaking a few bad habits along the way.

This Lenten season, I’d like you to consider something different. Instead of sacrificing to a God who desires “steadfast love and not sacrifice, the knowledge of God rather than burnt offerings,” I invite you to go back to the Ten Commandments (Hos 6:6). Back to basics, as it were. The two tablets of the commandments emphasize how we are to cultivate healthy, thriving relationships with God (Commandments 1 – 3) and with neighbor (Commandments 4 – 10). This Lent, we are offering two practices to help you engage in relationship-tending practices for both of God’s concerns.

Outreach has designed, and members of the congregation have written, a devotional book for the 40 days of Lent. This Journey through Lent includes personal reflections from the St. Tim community on their own faith journeys—things that have moved them forward, thoughts that have helped them slow down, and ways that they have grown in God. With a Scripture verse and a brief prayer, these booklets offer short meditations that you can take with you on your daily journey. For those that enjoy walking and praying, we’ve included a way to track your movement this Lent on your journey with Christ. I pray you will find this a meaningful resource as we accompany Christ to the cross.

Another opportunity for relationship is our Lenten Letters program! I am seeking people of all ages who are interested in a six-week “secret pen pal” activity. Participants will be assigned code names, matched with children, youth, or other adults in the congregation, and given the opportunity to write brief messages each week to their pen pal. Letters will be distributed weekly—check your church mailbox. The goal is to guess who your secret pen pal is by Easter Sunday. You can write about what you did that week, your likes and dislikes, the kinds of things you do around church and in the community, and ask questions of your pal. You just can’t tell them your real name or age. Pairings will be revealed during our Easter Brunch on Sunday, April 5th! A signup sheet is available in the narthex. I’m happy to answer any questions you have.

I hope that this invitation into deeper relationship with God and neighbor is one you will embrace. Together let us cultivate that steadfast love that God so desires, growing in faith together.

As an educator, I have taught children from a variety of backgrounds. No matter their differences, one need is always the same: a desire for consistency and security.

This is one of the quiet gifts of school. Beyond academics, it offers rhythm, structure, and reliability—something especially vital for students who may not experience that kind of stability at home. The predictability of a classroom, a trusted adult, and a daily routine can become a source of safety.

That longing for consistency does not disappear as we grow older. It simply shifts. As adults, we look for security in different places: steady employment, financial stability, dependable relationships, familiar routines. We build our lives around what feels reliable and controllable.

Change unsettles us. It exposes our vulnerability. Even when we know change may be necessary, we often resist it because it threatens the stability we have worked so hard to maintain.

Against this human instinct, Jesus issues a startling invitation.

In Mark 1:16–20, Jesus calls Simon, Andrew, James, and John to leave what is familiar—their work, their routines, their sense of security—and follow him. There is no detailed plan, no guarantee of safety, no promise of comfort. Only a call: "Follow me." And remarkably, they do.

Jesus invites us into a similar kind of radical change. As baptized children of God, our identity is no longer rooted primarily in our circumstances, achievements, or sense of control. Instead, it is grounded in grace, peace, love, and a life that bears witness to God's work in and through us.

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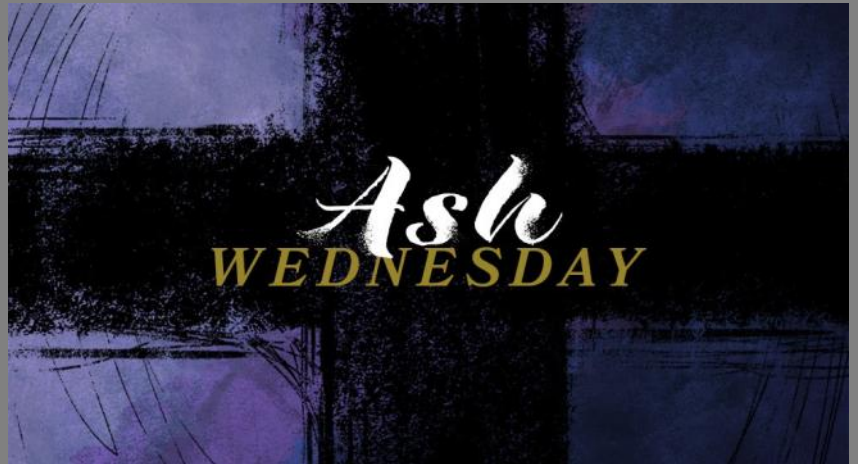
The word radical matters here. Jesus' understanding of grace, peace, and love reaches far beyond what we can generate on our own. His grace welcomes the undeserving. His peace persists in the midst of chaos. His love extends not only to friends, but even to enemies. This way of life is radical precisely because it runs counter to our instincts for self-protection and comfort. We need Jesus—not just his words, but his example—to show us what this kind of life looks like.

Following Jesus, then, does not remove uncertainty; it often increases it. To follow Christ is to accept vulnerability, to loosen our grip on control, and to trust a path we cannot fully see. Yet paradoxically, this is where true stability is found. Not in predictable circumstances, but in a faithful Savior.

Jesus remains constant even when everything else shifts. He is steady when our lives feel unsteady. As we follow him—sometimes boldly, sometimes fearfully—we discover that while the path may be uncertain, the one who leads us never is. In that truth, we find a deeper, truer consistency: not the absence of change, but the presence of Christ, faithfully calling us forward.

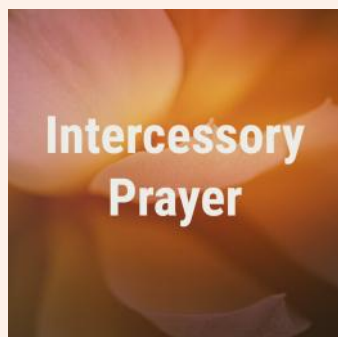

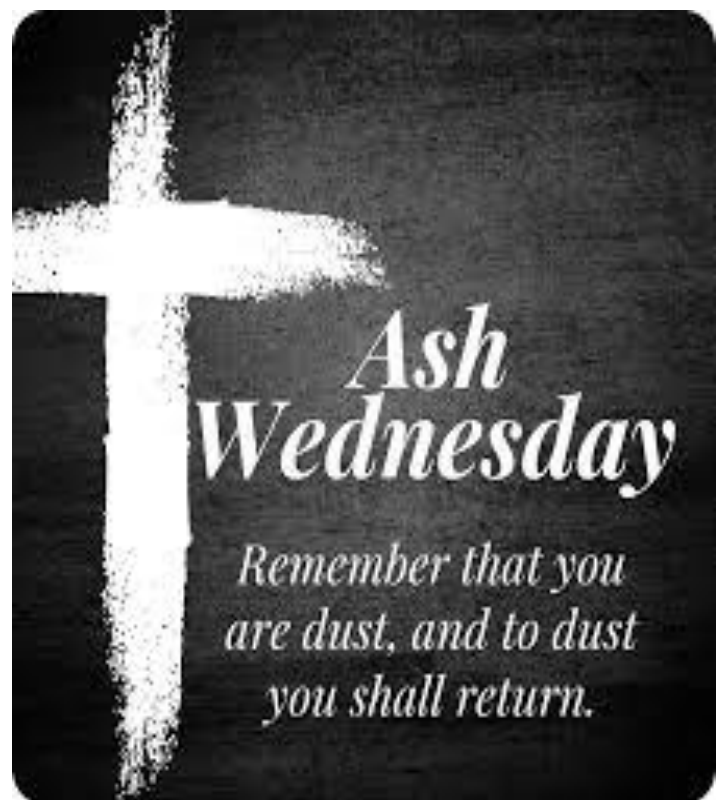

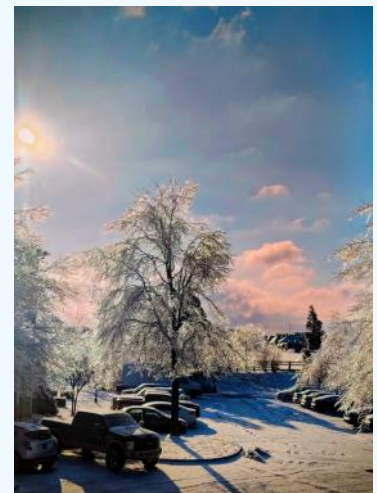
