Friends in Christ,

It's Stewardship Season! Or it will be by the time this month is over.

Beginning September 20/21, we'll start our exploration of the Christian discipline of stewardship, a way of living out our faith that sees all facets of

life from the lens of "gift," and how we use gifts to participate in God's mission in the world. Our theme this year is "What We Can Do: Responding to God's Generosity." Each week as we worship, we'll explore together

There will be at-home devotions and journaling activities for those who want to dig deeper, some "bonus" stewardship activities around the church, games for children and youth, social media engagement, and more.

Now, of course, stewardship season is about money. We're going to talk finances, a lot more than most of us are comfortable with—myself included. It's inevitable. Did you know that, of all the topics the Bible addresses, the human relationship with money is second only to God? Jesus talks about economics more than 250 times in the gospels. So yeah, we'll talk about money, because not talking about money is not being faithful to the gospel and ignores one of God's core concerns about our wellbeing.

But stewardship is more than money! Stewardship includes physical, emotional, social or interpersonal, intellectual, and vocational wellbeing just as much as it does financial wellbeing. And it is all centered and re-centered upon our spiritual wellbeing. The waters of baptism flow throughout all aspects of our lives. There's no part Christ doesn't touch.

As we begin a season of stewardship, we embark on an intentional treasure hunt: looking for God's good gifts in our lives and how we use those gifts to bless ourselves and others. One way you may begin is by using the Wholeness Wheel Labyrinth (below) to pray, noticing what God is up to in each of these areas of your life. How can we leverage our good gifts to be gifts to others?

I'm excited to see what God is stirring in us as the community of St. Timothy, and what God might be calling us to explore as a living, growing, and thriving body of Christ in Sumner County, Tennessee.












## **THANK YOU, EMERSON EADES!**


We commend Emerson on his thoughtful, caring efforts to help those who don't always receive the support and compassion they need.

The Tears of Things: Prophetic Wisdom for an Age of Outrage
Richard Rohr (Author)

In his first major work since *The Universal Christ*, one of our most prominent spiritual voices offers a wholehearted and hope-filled model for the world today, grounded in the timeless wisdom of the Hebrew prophets.

How do we live compassionately in a time of violence and despair? What can we do with our private disappointments and the anger we feel in such an unjust world? In his most personal book yet, Richard Rohr turns to the writings of the Jewish prophets, revealing how some of the lesser-read books of the Bible offer us a crucial path forward today.

The prophets' writings reflect the full spectrum of human maturity. In almost every case, their initial rage and their accusatory words evolve into a profound pathos and lamentation about our shared human condition and the world's suffering. Through astute critiques of culture and institutions, and their journey from anger to sadness, and ultimately compassion, the prophets exemplify what Rohr calls "sacred criticism"—a distinct approach to confronting evil and injustice that acknowledges the wholeness of history, the interconnectedness of every living being, and the reality of a divine and universal love. In this, they set the stage for Jesus, who follows this identical pattern. Drawing on a century of biblical scholarship and written in the warm, pastoral voice that has endeared Rohr to millions, *The Tears of Things* breathes new life into ancient wisdom. It paves a path of enlightenment for anyone seeking a compassionate way of living in a hurting world.

On **Saturday, October 4th at 10:30am** Pastor Amanda will be blessing the animals in Memorial Park at the shelter. Your pet must be on a leash or contained in some manner. Please join us as we bless our loved animals and celebrate God's creation.



FROM THE STEWARDSHIP & FINANCE COMMITTEE— This is a very serious and important season for St. Timothy as we are faced with a very expensive replacement cost for the A/C in the sanctuary. Some might consider giving an extra gift of a STOCK. Also, if you are 70 ½, age or older, here is another way to give from your investments while reducing your taxable income.

Request a QCD (Qualified Charitable Distribution): A Qualified Charitable Distribution allows you to donate directly to a charity like St. Timothy which counts toward your RMD (Required Minimum Distribution) and may reduce your taxable income. Here's how to submit your request to your investment firm:

**Step 1. Select the QCD Amount.** Select the dollar amount for the QCD (Maximum of \$108,000) that will be withdrawn from your account's fund.

<u>Step 2. Verify the Charity (St. Timothy Lutheran Church).</u> Your investment firm will have a database of charities for your convenience. You can verify "St. Timothy Lutheran Church of Hendersonville, TN" as the charity that you wish to receive the amount.

Step 3. After you submit the request to your investment firm, they will mail you a check with the primary address of St. Timothy Lutheran Church. (Usually, the check should arrive within 10 business days. Some investment firms will electronically send the amount directly to the charity.

<u>Step 4. If your investment firm sends you the check,</u> you are responsible to send the check or bring the check to St. Timothy.

Step 5. St. Timothy will send you a receipt of your gift for proof when you file your taxes.
