As noted in Standard 22 employment is an essential part of the Clubhouse model. Transitional employment is short term (6-12 months), risk free, supported re-entry to the workforce. The only requirement is the desire to work. The Clubhouse manages these positions alongside the employer and the Clubhouse guarantees coverage on all placements during member absences.
