

# WHAT'S HAPPENING?

Winter seemed to be having trouble letting go this year, but the ice went out on 15 April, temperatures are warming, and we know that summer will be upon us before we know it!

- Our summer series of programs will begin earlier than usual—on **11 June**--in order to learn about General Lafayette and his farewell tour before its 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary on 27 June. Lafayette rode through Sunapee on his way to Newport, Claremont, and Vermont and made two brief stops in Newport. See page 2 for more details of planned festivities in Newport.
- Have you ever wondered what some of our old tools and machinery were built to do? On **10 July**, Greg Young will explain and demonstrate some of it.

- Although electricity came to the center of Sunapee by 1895, the outlying areas were not wired for lighting until 1940. On **7 August**, following our annual meeting, Steve Taylor will talk about how electricity finally changed life in rural NH.

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

# Did you know?..... About Chief Sootanore

Chief Sootanore was a fictional Native American whose story was told by former governor and Sunapee native, John Henry Bartlett, in *The Legend of Ann Smith*, a small book he published in 1931. He writes that he intended it as a bit of a counterpoint to all the stories of violent struggle that surround the interaction of natives with settlers.

The story revolves around the rescue of 8-year-old Ann Smith who was separated from her family in a blizzard as they traveled to a new home in the wilderness. Chief Sootanore found Ann and returned her to her family. The two families lived in this area amicably, and in the end, Ann married the chief's son and the young couple headed west to work with other Native Americans.

The same year that the book was published—1931—Governor Bartlett had a statue of Chief Sootanore erected on land belonging to his family's farm, near Sunapee Central School—land that he gave to the school to be used as a



playground in 1941. Some grading was required to create a ballfield, playground, and speakers' rostrum. The rostrum is a large cement structure used for graduation ceremonies and speaking competitions that remains there today. Speaking prizes have not been awarded there since 1952, but I hear that the kids have taken to calling it "the mansion" and like to hang out there.

The statue was removed when the regrading for the playground was done, and it disappeared during WW II. The plaque resurfaced in the 1960s when Joyce and Doug Richardson found it in a second-hand shop near Keene and purchased it. Last year, Howard Sargent and his family donated the plaque to the Sunapee Historical Society, and we are delighted to have it.

But what became of the statue? Was it melted down for the metal it could provide to the war effort? Or was it sold? Several years ago, one of our FaceBook fans posted a photo of a similar, if not identical, statue located on property in the 1000 Islands area on the St Lawrence River in New York. The photographer thought it was smaller than ours, but we don't know for sure. Whatever happened to it, the statue is part of our past, and is now mostly forgotten!

#### Festivities for the 200th Anniversary of General Lafayette's Visit to Newport

Major General the Marquis de Lafayette came to America at the age of 19 to support our cause for liberty and human rights. His help was essential to the eventual success of the American Revolution. President Monroe invited the General to visit the US in 1824. Toward the end of his Farewell Tour—on 27 June 1825—he traveled from Concord to Claremont. Today, the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of that tour is being celebrated all along his route. Although he passed through South Sunapee (Wendell at that time), he apparently did not stop here. But he did make brief stops in Hopkinton, Warner, Bradford, Newport, and Claremont.



A horse-drawn carriage carrying General Lafayette will arrive at Newport Common to be greeted by the Sons of Liberty, General John Stark (all impersonators), the local chapter of the DAR, and other organizations. The ceremony is expected to include short speeches and perhaps a 3-gun musket salute. Here are the details:
