





Territory Profile by Al Getz

The National Wrestling Federation came into existence at the end of a tumultuous decade. In 1968, promoter Pedro Martinez took on wrestler Johnny Powers as a partner in what had previously been known as the National Wrestling Alliance's Buffalo booking office. Together, they added Cleveland and Akron, both in the northeastern part of Ohio, to their territory and split away from the NWA.

Regular house shows were held in Buffalo 2-3 times a month (although it appears they didn't run there at all in the summer of 1971), usually (but not always) on Wednesdays. They ran Cleveland most weeks, typically on Thursdays at the Cleveland Arena, while Akron was run weekly on Saturdays. For about six months, they ran shows most Tuesdays in the Albany/Schenectady/Troy market. The mid-sized metro areas of Rochester, Syracuse, Utica/Rome, and Binghamton in New York all saw documented house shows during the year. Elmira, Kingston, Amsterdam, and Dunkirk, New York all hosted smaller shows, albeit on a less regular basis.

Plotting all of these locales on a map shows that the NWF was active in a much larger geographic portion of New York than the promotion most often understood as "New York". The WWWF held claim to the New York City metropolitan area, which included the five boroughs, Long Island, and seven counties that lay just north of the city. But outside of three northeastern counties in the Burlington VT/Plattsburgh NY market under claim by two warring Montreal-based promotions, the rest of the Empire State belonged to Pedro Martinez and Johnny Powers.

Their promotion was stylistically similar to its two nearest neighbors, featuring the brawling style of The Sheik's Big Time Wrestling and the slower-paced heavyweight product that was prevalent in the WWWF. In fact, they often shared talent with both those promotions as well as the WWWF-flavored promotion Pittsburgh office, which Newton Tattrie (Geto Mongol) likely purchased from Bruno Sammartino in early 1971.

As 1971 began, the promotion recognized two championships: the North American Heavyweight Champion and the World Tag Team Championship. Former professional football star Ernie Ladd was the North American Heavyweight Champion, having won the title in December 1970 after it spent much of the year bouncing back-and-forth between the waists of Johnny Powers and Bulldog Brower.

The lineage of the area's World Tag Team Championship is slightly less clear, though it is generally accepted that Don Fargo & his "brother" Johnny (a young Greg Valentine) were acknowledged as the champs after defeating Luis Martinez & Chief White Owl on January 7, 1971, in Cleveland.

When the Fargos left the territory in the early spring, the World Tag Team titles remained vacant for a few months. On July 22, Kurt Von Hess & Eric the Red won a one-night tournament in Cleveland to fill the vacancy, beating Luis Martinez & Tony Parisi in the finals. Martinez was undaunted by coming up short, and quickly regrouped, pairing up with his former partner, Chief White Owl. Together, the duo beat Von Hess & Eric on September 9 to win the titles. Documented defenses of the title end in late October, though neither Martinez nor White Owl left the territory. In January 1972, a one-night

tournament was held to crown new champions, though it remains unclear as to why they were vacated to begin with.

Ladd held on to the North American title for the first few months of the year (save two weeks where the titles was "held up" in Cleveland due to a double knockout against Tex McKenzie; Ladd "regained" it in the rematch). At some point in the first half of April, Johnny Powers won the title from Ladd. As they engaged in rematches in Cleveland, Buffalo, Akron, and Albany, another challenger was moving up the ranks in hopes of challenging Powers. Canadian-born Walter Paul Sieber had spent most of the previous dozen years carving a path of terror throughout wrestling rings, portraying a stereotypical "evil German" by the name of Waldo Von Erich. In the spring of 1971, he returned to the northeast for the first time in a few years, notching victories over opponents such as Luis Martinez and Mighty Igor as he ascended the territory's theoretical pecking order.

Powers disposed of Ernie Ladd for the final time in Cleveland on May 13 in a steel cage match with the North American title on the line. The following week, Von Erich had his first crack at the champ. When Powers "sustained a gash on his forehead" ten minutes in, the referee stopped the bout, awarding the match (but not the title) to Waldo. A rematch seven days later had similar results: Von Erich won the match, but the title stayed with Powers. This time, Johnny was disqualified after he refused to break his "power-lock" (figure-four leglock) while Von Erich was partially outside the ring. A third title match between the two was held on June 3, this one with "no disqualifications", and it proved to be the charm for Waldo, who won the match and title.

Usually, when a wrestler loses a title, they seek a series of rematches in an attempt to regain the gold, but that's not what Johnny Powers did. As Waldo Von Erich defended the North American title throughout the territory against top babyfaces such as Bulldog Brower and Chief White Owl, Powers showed up one day with a new belt, proclaiming himself the NWF's "World" Heavyweight champion based on a phantom win over Fred Blassie in Los Angeles. (It's good to be the promoter.)

This led to another series of matches between Powers and Waldo. Generally speaking, only one of the titles would be on the line for each match, which provided greater flexibility for finished. Of course, they could always do the standard disqualifications and countouts, but if Waldo's title was the one up for grabs, he could get a pinfall victory (though almost certainly not a "clean" one). If Powers' title was on the line, he could score the pin. At one point, Waldo captured the World title from Powers, making him a double champ. Before the year ended, however, Powers turned the tables, defeating Waldo to win the North American title.

By the winter, the Powers-Waldo feud had gone through nearly every possible permutation, and the two were finally separated. Waldo found himself feuding with the Italian-born Dominic DeNucci, who had spent the previous decade headlining arenas in Calgary, San Francisco, and Australia among other places. DeNucci had a few shots at the North American title when Waldo held it, and when Waldo won the World title, he received shots at that championship as well. On December 2 in Cleveland, DeNucci shocked Von Erich with a "spectacular rolling cradle" and pinned him at the 21:52 mark to win the title.

On that same card, Johnny Powers was not quite so successful. He was set to defend the North American title against Abdullah the Butcher, who had just come to the territory two weeks' prior. Abdullah had spent much of the year north of the border on a reign of terror that stretched all the way from Calgary to Montreal before he came south. As Powers was in the ring waiting for the opening bell, Abdullah slammed him with a metal chair. Powers ended up being "carried from the ring on a stretcher" without the match ever getting underway. A week later, Powers turned the tables (or chairs, if you will) on Abdullah, attacking him before the match and once again leading to no bout taking place.


The two met once more in Cleveland before the year was out, on December 30. Powers lost that one by disqualification, but of course that meant he retained the North American title. The main event on that card featured the latest chapter in the feud between Dominic DeNucci and Waldo Von Erich. For this one, the ring was enclosed by barbed wire. In a match reportedly so violent and gory that a newspaper reporter dispatched to cover the festivities "couldn't watch it" and "had to go out in the lobby", Waldo pinned DeNucci in just under twenty minutes.


While the reporter was not enthralled by the action, he may have been the only one of the 10,029 fans in attendance who felt that way. It was the second largest crowd of the year in Cleveland, behind only the 11,794 fans who turned out on a Saturday afternoon in August for a show billed as the promotion's "third anniversary" and a "family show". The average of the 38 known attendance figures for the 45 shows held in Cleveland in 1971 is 3,690, meaning that end-of-year show was over three times their normal average.


Perhaps inspired by the large turnout for the year-ending card, Martinez aimed high over the next couple of years. According to his son Ron in an interview with Greg Mosorjak posted on Kayfabe Memories, Pedro acquired the Pittsburgh promotion from Newton Tattrie in 1972. He then arranged for Jerry Jacobs, owner of a company named Sports Services, to buy out Powers *and* to purchase the Rougeau's Montreal promotion. Additionally, he ran a major show at Cleveland Municipal Stadium, home of baseball's Indians and football's Brown, in August of 1972. Powers, meanwhile, took his payout and bought a health club in a suburb of Cleveland. All of these moves would turn out to be business failures of varying degrees. By the end of 1974, the National Wrestling Federation was no more, though the following year Pedro Martinez was working with Eddie Einhorn in his attempt launch an actual national wrestling promotion.





Feuds

Here are two charts listing the biggest feuds in the territory. The first chart lists matches that occurred most frequently in all of the primary markets, and the second chart lists the matches that occurred most frequently in individual markets.





The progression of feuds often differed from city to city. This led to each market having its own narrative. If a main event drew well the first time out in some cities, they could build to a rematch the following week. In other cities where it didn't draw well, they may choose to have that first match end in a clean finish and present a different main event the following week.

Below are examples of how some of the bigger feuds played out in select cities.

JOHNNY POWERS vs WALDO VON ERICH

- 5/20 North American title: Von Erich won by referee stoppage due to a "gash" on the forehead of Powers
- 5/27 North American title: Von Erich won after Powers was disqualified for "failure to break an illegal 'power-lock', which had Von Eric partially out of the ring"

- 8/7 World title: match not listed in newspaper results, unknown if it actually occurred








Taking Attendance

In this section, we look at any attendance (and/or gate) figures we have. Unless otherwise noted, these numbers come from newspaper reports. They should be taken with several grains of salt.

We have attendance figures for 38 out of the 45 cards held in Cleveland. The average attendance was 3,675. If you remove the three largest attendance figures, the average was 3,195.



Largest crowds in Cleveland:

- 8/7 drew 11,794 for a Saturday afternoon "family show" for the promotion's third anniversary (top advertised matches were Johnny Powers vs Waldo Von Erich and Bobo Brazil vs Ernie Ladd
- 12/30 drew 10,029 (Dominic DeNucci vs Waldo Von Erich with the ring enclosed with barbed wire and Johnny Powers vs Abdullah the Butcher)
- 11/25 drew 6,011 (Thanksgiving day show with Johnny Powers vs Waldo Von Erich)

We have 1 attendance figure for Buffalo (out of 17 shows): 2/17 drew 7,583 fans (Dominic DeNucci vs Ernie Ladd and Bobo Brazil vs Hans Schmidt)

Of 46 shows held in Akron, we have attendance figures for 2 of them: 4/17 drew "about 3,000" (Johnny Powers vs Ernie Ladd) and 10/9 drew 1,700
