





# Territory Profile (1971-1973) by David Gibb

David Gibb is a writer and author of "How to Ace Your Comeback"

Sam Muchnick moved to the city he'd become synonymous with at the age of six and allegedly skipped high school graduation in favor of a wrestling show. While he started in the newspaper business, Sam's goal was likely always to angle his way into wrestling, which he achieved by forging relationships with wrestlers and ground-level promotional workers through his day job.

Sam Muchnick Sports Attractions was founded in 1942 and, by the '50s, had established a loop of good-sized cities, running not only St. Louis but also Memphis,

Louisville, Evansville, and Indianapolis. As an upstart outsider with good towns, Muchnick was immediately under attack. Gulas-Welch Promotions gradually ate into Sam's territory from the southeast, while the likes of Jim Barnett and later Dick The Bruiser hip-checked him from the northeast.

Rather than defend the frontiers, Muchnick doubled down on his home base, forming a new company, the St. Louis Wrestling Club. It was that company that began to produce a television program on KPLR titled "Wrestling at the Chase," presenting pro grappling as a respectable black-tie affair.

Muchnick typically promoted cards every two-to-four weeks at either Kiel Auditorium or the larger St. Louis Arena. In the early days, he took summers off, which was not uncommon in the Midwest, especially for a lean, mean operation like his, where bringing in enough wrestlers to do TV was a major expense.

When the fledgling NWA needed a president who could bring all the pirates under one flag, Sam was chosen precisely because he had been undeniably successful at scale and deftly avoided conflict in a region where power changed hands frequently. With that said, Muchnick wasn't just a deferential altruist; he became a master at taking care of St. Louis during his presidency. The NWA World Heavyweight title, the centerpiece of the entire territorial system, was the regular title defended on his shows.

In 1969 or 1970, the three owners of nearby Heart of America Sports Attractions (Gust Karras, Bob Geigel, and Pat O'Connor) purchased a small piece of the St. Louis Wrestling Club from Eddie Quinn's widow, nudging their way into a mutually beneficial relationship. As a result, Muchnick began to recognize their Central States Heavyweight title and use then-champion Harley Race regularly on his live and televised shows.

The first night of 1971 saw Jack Brisco wrestle NWA World Heavyweight Champion Dory Funk Jr. to a sixty-minute draw – one fall apiece – at the Kiel Auditorium. They had faced each other about a dozen times, mostly in Florida, since Funk won the title in 1969, but this match was in front of Sam Muchnick, and that meant something.

Following that match, Brisco and Funk were kept apart in St. Louis for nine months. Dory defended the title against the Midwest's meanest and ugliest, including Baron Von Raschke, Harley Race, and Johnny Valentine. Meanwhile, Brisco got wins over the likes of Jack Lanza and former world champion Pat O'Connor while engaging in a long-term feud with Von Raschke that culminated on October 15<sup>th</sup> in a brutal Texas Death Match.

The day after Brisco's decisive victory over Von Raschke, Wrestling at the Chase aired footage of Jack and his brother Jerry defeating Dory and Terry Funk for the Florida Tag Team titles earlier in the year, setting up a rematch on St. Louis TV two weeks later. That match saw Jack capture a pinfall against Dory Jr. as the time limit expired. Though the 1-0 moral victory in the two-out-of-three falls match wasn't a real "W," it did provide the impetus for Jack to get another shot at the NWA World Heavyweight Championship in St. Louis.

The penultimate show of the year took place on November 19<sup>th</sup>, with Dory Funk Jr. defending his NWA title against Jack Brisco and Central States Champion Harley Race facing Jerry Brisco. Race won his match, chomping a morsel of the main event angle to put the close on a strong year that had seen him beat Dick The Bruiser, Cowboy Bob Ellis, and Pat O'Connor while evolving from being a "Kansas City guy" to one of the NWA president's go-to heels. In the main event, Dory retained his title in a time limit draw, one fall to none, ensuring his issue with Jack Brisco would continue into 1972.

On the January 15, 1972 edition of Wrestling at the Chase, former NWA World Heavyweight Champion Pat O'Connor defeated Harley Race to win the Central States Heavyweight title. With that said, the change was only recognized in St. Louis itself, and a new title belt, the Missouri Heavyweight Championship, appeared in the territory shortly thereafter. A tournament was commissioned to find an inaugural champion beginning in March, with this being one of those territorial situations where "tournament matches" took place on shows throughout the area (and occasionally TV) without any official bracket or list of participants ever being published.

As the tournament played out, Dory Funk Jr. continued to do his thing, defending the richest prize in wrestling against top area contenders like Rufus R. Jones and former champions Gene Kiniski and Pat O'Connor. Once he'd made light work of those opponents, Dory bided his time while two of his best-known opponents – Jack Brisco and Harley Race – battled each other to determine who'd be the next top contender to the NWA World Heavyweight Championship.

In April, Race and Brisco were the last two men remaining in a six-man elimination tag team match, but neither could eliminate the other before time expired, leading to a draw. They drew again in a singles match two weeks later before staying apart until August, when Brisco finally won decisively. Unfortunately for Brisco, he never got that title shot, as a loss to Gene Kiniski cost him his place in the pecking order.

By the fall, the "finalists" of the ongoing Missouri Heavyweight Championship tournament were revealed to be Harley Race and Pak Song. On the September 16<sup>th</sup> edition of Wrestling at the Chase, Race defeated Song, becoming the inaugural champion to shed his skin as an outsider to St. Louis fans and be reborn as an area stalwart. Race put together a string of singles victories to close out the year, positioning himself as the first challenger for Funk's World Heavyweight title in 1973.

Dory Funk kicked off 1973 by defeating Harley Race on January 5<sup>th</sup> in St. Louis, although Race was counted out during the last fall, sparing him a sound defeat. Two weeks later, Race lost his Missouri title to Johnny Valentine.

It's well-documented (especially by territory standards) that Funk's next move was supposed to be dropping the title to Jack Brisco, but Funk was injured (or said he was injured) in a freak accident on his father's ranch, pulling the chair out from underneath Brisco and Muchnick.

With Dory out of action, the Missouri Heavyweight Championship became the title of focus. Terry Funk arrived in the area (likely an intended make-good), wresting the title from Valentine and defending it against Brisco before losing it to Gene Kiniski. Perhaps a little displeased with the Funk family's unwillingness to assist with his projects, Muchnick started using former WWWF World Heavyweight Champion Bruno Sammartino that April.


On May 18<sup>th</sup>, Kiniski repelled Harley Race's attempt to regain the Missouri title while Jack Brisco and Terry Funk wrestled to a time limit draw. With neither Race nor Brisco able to punch through, it looked like Bruno Sammartino – who defeated Rip Hawk for his third consecutive St. Louis win that night – might've been the man on the rise for Sam Muchnick.

Given the story told on the St. Louis cards, it must've been something of a shock to area fans when they learned that Harley Race had defeated Dory Funk Jr. in Kansas City with a vertical suplex on May 24<sup>th</sup>. His first scheduled title defense in St. Louis was June 18<sup>th</sup> against none other than Bruno Sammartino in what can without hyperbole be called a once-in-a-lifetime dream match. The two massive gladiators went to the time limit, giving Race the only St. Louis title defense of his first NWA World Heavyweight Championship reign. The next month, he'd do what choice or circumstance had prevented Dory Funk Jr. for doing: he traveled to Houston, Texas to drop the title to Jack Brisco.

After facilitating that piece of business for Muchnick, Harley Race regained the Missouri Heavyweight Championship from Gene Kiniski and held onto it for the rest of the year, surviving challenges from Kiniski and Dory Jr. The title had already been Harley's stepping stone to the NWA's crown jewel once, and he was hoping history would repeat itself in the future.






A look at the "character arc" for select wrestlers, showing their weekly SPOT Ratings and biggest feuds chronologically.











## Title Holders and Histories

In 1971, St. Louis did not have any championships of their own. They featured the NWA World Heavyweight champion regularly. When he wasn't on the card, the main event was often something akin to a "title eliminator" between top contenders. The promotion began to acknowledge the Central States Heavyweight title when Harley Race became a regular in the spring. Harley defended the title at least 5 times in St. Louis during the year.

# **Taking Attendance**

In this section, we look at any attendance (and/or gate) figures we have. Unless otherwise noted, these numbers come from newspaper reports. They should be taken with several grains of salt.

wrestlingdata.com has attendance figures for 11 of the 17 house shows in St. Louis during the year. Most of these cards were held at Kiel Auditorium, though three of them were held at the larger St. Louis Arena.

The average attendance (for the shows we have attendance figures for) was 9,396. The three cards at the Arena all featured NWA World Heavyweight title defenses. Of the 14 cards at Kiel, just three of them featured World title defenses.
